

We play music through the school's speaker system during break and lunch. Chosen by Mr Taylor, Lead Teacher for Music, this is designed to offer exposure to the curriculum in different ways, and support pupils' appreciation of music across the school.

We will focus on one theme each week across a genre, a country or from history. The theme could also link to the season or an event in school. Next week it's...

#### **Rock Ballads**

Those emotionally-charged, agonising, tormented pieces of music which ebb and flow gently, and then suddenly – when you least expect it – erupt with the gush of a tsunami.

The lyrics are overthe-top and sung in a pleading, heartwrenching manner,

with exaggerated statements about plummeting to the ground on broken wings, doing it for the glory of love or holding on and never saying goodbye etc.

In a musical sense, they are often performed at a slow tempo, with a big sound wall of a backing with rock elements, like distorted guitars, loud, heavy drums and belting vocals. The lyrics are usually romantic - either a celebration of a great love, a lost love or an unrequited one, and sung by someone with a formidable singing voice.



Regardless of the results however, we recognise our 2023 leavers as precious and unique individuals, and throughout their final year with us, they have shown how determined and hopeful they are, demonstrating remarkable levels of resilience. Here's how they got on...

**Hannah** was delighted with her grades as she achieved three Grade 8s and four Grade 7s among her results.

"I was pleased to get a 7 in Maths, an 8 in History and an 8 in French. I want to go to Newman College and study French, Biology, Law and Criminology."

Eliza said she was 'very happy' with her results.

"I got two Grade 8s and four Grade 7s. I was especially happy with a Grade 7 in my English Literature as I didn't think I would pass.



"I am going to Preston College on an acting course. I have been in all the school productions – Matilda, Game Over and Mary Poppins. I want to go into acting."

Lucas achieved an amazing four nines, two in Science and one in Maths and Further Maths along with two 8s among his results.

"I wasn't expecting all the 9s although I was hoping. I am still trying to calm down!



"I want to go LUSoM to study Maths, Further Maths, Physics and Computer Science. I want to be a rocket scientist or something with nuclear fusion."

## GCSE Results Day: Their Stories



Head Prefects Ben and Fatima, and Senior Prefect Maya, were three of our top achievers, here they tell us how they got on with their GCSE results

Head Prefect Ben was happiest with his English Literature result.

"I expected a 5 or 6 and I got a 7 so that was amazing!

"I got five Grade 8s as well. I want to go to Newman College and study History, Geography, Politics and Maths. I want to be a lawyer."





**Head Prefect Fatima** was absolutely delighted with her results.

"I failed my history mock examination but got an 8 so I am amazed!"

She also got three Grade 7s among her results and will go to Newman College and do a BTEC in Sport and a Biology A-Level as she wants to be a physiotherapist.

"I am so happy," she added.

**Senior Prefect Maya** was the top performer at Priory. She achieved three Grade 9s and four Grade 8s and a Level 2 Distinction Star in Engineering.

"I was hoping for good grades but did not know if I would get them. I am especially pleased with some of my Grade 8s as I thought I may get a 6 or 7 in some. The Engineering qualification was something extra in case I want to do an apprenticeship in the future.



"I want to go to Hutton Sixth Form and do Business and History and another subject, I haven't yet decided."

Uzair was with his proud mum Lubna.

"I am so happy," he said. "I got three Grade 8s, three Grade 7s and two Grade 6s. I am so pleased, especially as I got a 7 in Maths and I thought I would get a 5 or 6. I also got a 7 in Art.

"I want to go to Newman College and study Biology, Chemistry and Psychology and do something in medicine."



Jake celebrated two Grade 9s, four Grade 8s among his results.

"I wasn't that nervous," said Jake. "I want to go to Runshaw College and study Maths, Further Maths, Biology and Chemistry.

"My mum is a pharmacist and I want to do something with medicine in the future."

## **Priory's Eco Committee Visit Whitefield Primary School**



Pupil Report by Oliver C, Year 8

Before the summer break, the Eco Committee visited Whitified Primary School to meet their Eco Ambassadors. Following their visit, Science teacher Mrs Massey asked the pupils to write a short article. Here's Year 8 Oliver's report...

On Friday 16 June, the Eco Committee took a trip to Whitefield Primary School to discuss what each school was doing to help their environment.

We began by talking about our plan to put paper-only bins in each of the classrooms. We then continued by saying that we were re-using plant pots to make pot-figures. Another thing that we mentioned was that we were thinking of putting signs out to remind teachers and students to keep the lights off when possible.



Their Eco Club (their version of the Eco

Committee) began by talking about the more recent things that they had done, like lowering the ceilings in some of the classrooms and switching their bulbs for LED lights to save energy. Also, they had put signs out to ensure that teachers and students alike will turn the lights off when possible.

They took us around the grounds and showed us the many things that they had done to the outside environment, for example, letting the grass grow wild along the edges of their field and planting meadows as part of their long-term project. They have also put out pot pollinators to ensure that bees and butterflies thrive. By getting more bins and creating a litter picking crew, they hope to deal with the litter that is dropped. They also have a gardening club to grow fruit and vegetables. In their Jubilee Garden (a small area of wild forest) they have got a bird feeder to attract more birds. To help with this task, they have got bird boxes but they are both out in the open and so will move these closer to the bushes.

Priory's new Head Prefects will begin their role at our Open Evening and are relishing their new responsibilities.

Martha, Alex, Lewis and Cameron were selected following a hustings which was held in the last week of the summer term.

Candidates had to make a presentation for three-five minutes on the following:

"Imagine you are presenting at Priory's Open Evening and you are required to give a talk on the academic and pastoral aspects of the school. What would you say to portray the school in the best possible light?"

Staff and Year 11 pupils then voted on their preferred choice and these four pupils were our worthy winners.

Alex, who says he is in every sports team he can be, admitted: "I was terrified giving my speech! I talked

about what the school does for you – there is so much to do, whether it's academic or sports.

"I also said there is something on offer for everyone to get involved in. I must admit we only had to talk for three-five minutes but it felt like 20! I was surprised I had been selected."

Lewis said: "I talked about the facilities and how supportive the teachers were. I also talked about how they could find your interests. In Year 7 I would never have thought I would be interested in drama, it wasn't even on my radar, and now I want to take it further at college. Miss Howell is one of my favourite teachers and she has made a really big impression on me. I have been in the shows Mary Poppins and Matilda and I would say, while I was never shy, my confidence has increased a lot."

Martha said: "I discussed how the teachers were really helpful and supportive and the confidence I have got from my teachers. I like History and PE. I was shocked when I heard I had been selected."

Cameron, who wants to be a lawyer, said: "As well as all the above, I talked about how welcoming and inclusive Priory is. It's a friendly school."

The appointment of Head Prefects, House Captains and Prefects is an important aspect of Priory's reward system. Year 11s are given this responsibility to demonstrate they can represent the school in a positive and mature manner. They will have had good attendance and discipline and are expected to take part in school events and extra-curricular activities.

Pupils embraced building a European monument out of straws, with the Eiffel Tower and the Leaning Tower of Pisa proving popular, under the watchful eye of Mrs Bailey.

Mrs Bailey said: "The pupils have been so enthusiastic, they have had a great time and it's got them thinking about European countries."

Mr Taylor's music class had maracas, drums, cymbals and more as they played and danced to European songs.

Mr Bullock gave the pupils a run around in the Sports Hall with a game of Handball, one of the most popular sports across Europe. Passes and goals were claimed in Spanish as well as scores announced in the language.

But it wasn't just the Year 7s who got to engage with the theme; teachers were meeting and greeting pupils at the door using a European language and incorporating language into lessons where practical - taking the register using 'je suis ici' or 'Hola señor/señorita', numbers in Maths for example.




### The Piano at Priory

### Class of 1970 Go Back To School

Former Head Girl Janet Edwards and Sports Captain John Bennett, the Class of 1970, visited Priory as part of our 70th anniversary celebrations as well as to meet the new Head Prefects.



Janet is believed to be one of the first pupils from Priory to go to university and enjoyed a successful career as a midwife. She stayed in touch with John, who was Sports Captain for Croft House and went on to be a Geography teacher, inspired by his teacher at Priory.

Janet (nee Clough), now 69, said: "Priory has changed a lot but there are some things which are still the same such as the same reception.

"I remember one of my jobs as Head Girl was to follow our then Headteacher Mr Summers, in his black gown, onto the stage for assemblies. We had to stand there while he spoke.

"I also remember organising the collection for the Poppy Appeal and, as prefects, we also had to stop pupils coming through the main entrance at break and lunch time but we were allowed to!

"I went onto Liverpool University to study Geography, inspired by our then Geography teacher Ernest Reynolds, his blackboard skills were incredible.



"I remember, pupils who wanted to go to university went to Penwortham Girls or Hutton Grammar School. I had done my O'Levels, as they were then, and I went to Penwortham Girls to talk about wanting to do three A-Levels as I wanted to go to university. I wanted to do History, Geography and Literature. As I had come from Priory, they didn't think I was capable of doing three but I stood my ground and did all three!"

John said: "As Sports Captain, I had to organise all the team events and internal competitions. I was inspired by Mr Reynolds as I went on to be a Geography teacher at St Albans, now Albany High, and Stanley High School in Southport.

"I remember a trip to Hothersall Lodge at Priory and also not taking time over my homework and Mr Reynolds saying: "That was not worth wetting your pen for." I wasn't the most studious!

"Priory has changed beyond recognition but in a good way. My children came here and they have gone into the police and teaching."

Janet added: "It's superb that children in South Ribble have the chance to come to such a vibrant school."

Both had a tour around the school with our current Head Prefects Martha, Alex, Lewis and Cameron and laughed about the how punishments had changed.

John said: "We used to get the slipper if we had done something wrong and the girls were rapped on their knuckles with a ruler or had to write lines."

Janet had presented the school with her yellow summer dress, lovingly made by her mum.

"You could buy them but we didn't have a lot of money so my mum made it from a pattern and there was also a straw boater to go with it."

Following on from the visit, Janet wrote,

"Thank you for inviting John and I to come to Priory to meet the new head prefects. I was very impressed with Martha, Lewis, Alex and Cameron; they showed a genuine interest in our experiences and engaged with us one hundred per cent. Their enthusiasm for the school was very apparent hence needing more time to show us all areas that they were so proud of. Without being patronising they showed maturity and respect.

"I was a little apprehensive ahead of the visit as to how they would find two individuals from a different era approaching their seventieth birthdays, my apprehension was unfounded!"


We would like to acknowledge and pay tribute to the Head Boy of Class of 1970, Trevor Rainford, who sadly passed away earlier this year.


## STEM Club Tuesdays









Priory's Year 11 historians embarked on a journey into the past by visiting Thackray Medical Museum last Friday.

"I did actually go into industry for a year but


thought I would get bored with doing the same thing. That's the main difference in teaching – no day is ever the same!"

## Lancashire FA Supports Grassroots Improvements at Priory



Lancashire Football Association visited Priory on Monday to see how the recent funding awarded to us had impacted on the school and the local community.

The investment towards the floodlights and ground maintenance by the Football Foundation has provided improved facilities, not only for our own pupils, but for clubs that use them beyond the school day.

Priory's Strategic Estates Development Manager, Mr Bolton, spoke to Lucy Roberts from Lancashire FA about the work we have carried out and the impact the funding has had for everyone, including the support we are now able to provide to our local primary schools.

Mr Bolton said, "We applied for two grants from the Football Foundation run by the FA. The first was for grass pitch machinery to help with running our own grass pitches' cutting programme on our fields.

"We worked with the Grounds Maintenance Association, of which we are members, to assess the quality of the grass pitches for grassroots teams playing on them. The report identified a need for equipment to enable Priory to cut the grass more regularly plus also allow for equipment to help with the basic decompaction of the grass allowing for better grass growth and improved drainage. Three of Priory's staff also undertook training courses associated with grounds maintenance works."





Mr Bolton went on to explain what the second grant meant for Priory, "The further funding enabled us to upgrade the old floodlights on the 3G pitch from 24 no. 2000watt fittings to new 12 no. 1600watt LED fittings and included the addition of smarter controls to hold off lights when not needed. This has enabled us to not only improve the lighting levels on the pitch but we're also saving energy now that there are fewer floodlights."

The school has four football clubs that are regularly using the grass pitches at weekends and in the evenings for training.

#### And it doesn't stop there...

We are intending to apply for further grants for the grass pitches which will enable more complicated works to be carried out by specialist contractors to add to the work we have already started. All this will mean greater use of the pitches for grassroot football.

Delivered by South Ribble Borough Council's Cycling Development Officers, the advance course equips pupils with the skills needed to stay safe in more challenging urban situations.

During the two hour session, pupils learned how to:

- Use the best riding position for any situation
- Ride alongside other cyclists
- Ride on more complex roads including busier roads, more complicated junctions and faster roads with speed limits above 30mph.
- Negotiate more complex roads such as junctions controlled by traffic lights, multilane roads or cycle lanes.
- Respond confidently when a situation changes. For example, when a vehicle pulls out in front of you.



Cycling Development Officer, David Boyle said, "We focus on skills pupils might want to practice more, or a tricky road where they travel often."

He went on to say, "All the pupils were an absolute credit to the school and represented it to an impeccable standard. Behaviour and application were second to none. The Level 3 will set them up for a life of freedom on wheels and I genuinely felt the pupils had grown in skill and confidence."

PE Teacher, Mrs Bullock, who organised the sessions at Priory, said, "All the pupils commented on how much fun it was and would all like to do it again!"

A particular well done to Callum M, Year 8, for his maturity and enthusiasm. Callum has been invited to support the Development Officers next week. Sessions will continue over the next two weeks.

"I have a number of pieces from them and the


necklace is beautiful."






## School Mascot: Pupil Volunteers needed



Pupils saw the old Victorian prison cells of C-wing, the civil and crown courts (which are still in use today) and even had the chance to be locked in a 17th century cell.

The existing building will be demolished later this year, but temporary facilities will be used during the redevelopment to ensure the Foxton's services don't close.

Cllr Jennifer Mein, Preston City Council, added: "We welcome the news that the centre has been able to secure the funding they need from the Youth Investment Fund and it can now move forward with their plans for a new youth centre in Avenham. The new facility will provide additional support, safety and resources for those young people that need it the most."

Lines, dance routines and songs had to be learned, props made and lighting perfected - all of which delivered superb performances - but it was difficult to say who stole the show as there were so many stars!








