Last month we met up with five of our sporting stars - *Oliver, Umar, Phoebe, Martha & Jack* - whose dedication and hard slog is getting the results they deserve. Here's Phoebe, Martha and Josh's story...

## It's a hat-trick of successes for Priory pupils as they have hit the big time with their hockey skills!

Year 10 Phoebe has gained a coveted place on the England Hockey Performance Programme for 2021/22 while Year 9s Josh and Martha have been selected to represent Lancashire Under 14s, after all came through tough trials.

All are members of Preston Hockey Club and what makes their achievement even more amazing is that they are in a minority in their squads as they are from a state school, with most county and national hockey players coming from independent schools which have funding to play hockey regularly in school.

Phoebe has been attending Performance Centre trials over the last few months, which is the England hockey pathway which could lead to elite level hockey.

She has represented Lancashire at Under 12, 13 and 14 level and was nominated by her county coaches to attend the England trials.

64 girls started out at the North West trials at Fylde, with Phoebe up against girls from Cumbria and Greater Manchester as well, and she was selected in the final 36.



Phoebe, 14, who plays left midfield, said: "I have been playing hockey for five years, my mum is the Junior Head Coach at Preston Hockey Club, so I got into it through her. I train five days a week.

"There were eight trials and it was really nerve-racking as it was so competitive. When I got the email to say I had been selected for the Performance Programme I was excited. I have started attending their training events in Fylde. My dream is to play hockey in the Olympics."

Martha, who plays right midfield, attended six hours of trials for Lancashire Under 14s at the AKS School in Lytham.

"I have played for Lancashire at Under 13 level and then went for Under 14 trials," said Martha. I like hockey as it's really fast. I train five times a week and it's exciting to receive the Lancashire kit and represent your county."

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Josh, 14, has been selected for his county Under 14s as well.

"I got into hockey through my dad and while I can play any position, my favourite position is right wing. I have been at Preston Hockey Club for 11 years, I have been playing almost all my life and played for Lancashire Under 13s. The trials were at Fylde Hockey Club and they were tough but I was happy to get through. I don't know how far I want to take my hockey, I just enjoy playing it with my mates."

Phoebe's mum is the Junior Head Coach at Preston Hockey Club and also Lancashire Under 13s girls coach.

Mrs Bolton said, "Phoebe, Josh and Martha all have the odds stacked against them and all have done exceptionally well to be selected for their county and upwards. They went into trials against pupils from independent schools who have around 4-6 hours of hockey a week within school, play inter-school competitions at weekends and have extra hockey training at school.

"They play so much more hockey at independent schools while Priory is similar to the majority of state schools where hockey is not a sport in focus and that's just the way it is. It's meant all three have had to work extra hard to make their impact. I am Under 13s Lancashire coach and 60 girls are invited for trials for 20-24 places and the majority are from independent schools.

"Martha has been selected for U13s and U14s so she is in the top 20 in Lancashire which is a fantastic achievement.

"For the England Performance Centre, you have to be selected to go for the trials and be an outstanding talent. There are 16 Performances Centres around England which have a squad of 24 in each and Phoebe is in the minority coming from a state school but all three haven't let it deter them."

Well done to all three of you and we look forward to hearing more about your successes in the future.





as the popular Masked Reader competition, where a teacher read a script with a few clues but a voice changer disguised their voice and the pupils had to identify the teacher.

















We have been fortunate to be invited to work with an eminent local artist on a design project in conjunction with The Harris Museum & Art Gallery



The two artists visited school yesterday to meet with our top Year 9 artists and guide them through the brief and initial concepts.

Gavin has just finished working alongside Preston artist Chris Dorning on a mural at the back of the Black A Moor pub in the city centre. The artwork, which was commissioned as part of the 'Paint Preston' project funded by Preston Town Fund board, supersedes Gavin's acclaimed work down the side of what was Yates', Bolton Court.

Lead teacher for Art, Mrs Hopes, said, "We were delighted to be selected by The Courtauld as one of two Preston schools who would be involved in the collaborative. The original project, prior to 'lock-down', was to work on a collaboration inside the art gallery. Post lock down, and on closure of The Harris, the project evolved and we were approached once again.

"It has been fascinating to watch Gavin and Toya work with our young people, in order to develop ideas to be included in the piece, which will feature on the front of the Harris site from May onwards.

"As a designer, I have enjoyed working with the artists today, creating the intermediary between them and the pupils. I also enjoyed being party and involved in the discussions at the end of the day, as work was selected to go forward to the final design and the debate regarding translation of small-scale studies and concepts to enlarged artwork in the outcome."

access to football in schools by


2024. They believe girls should have the same opportunities that boys currently have to play.

### Year 8 Pupils Take Part in 3D Printing Workshop

Sixty lucky Year 8 pupils were selected by Head of ICT & Computer Science, Mrs Qadri, to take part in an exciting #InspiringLancashire Project on Wednesday, funded by BAE Systems.

Priory has been given a 3D printer as part of the link-up and we have worked with CREATE Education to deliver the school-based 3D Printing Workshop Day.

Mrs Qadri said: "I took part in a course on 3D printing and BAE Systems were selecting 50 schools across Lancashire to gift a 3D printer to.

"I applied and thankfully Priory ended up being one of the schools. I had a training day at CREATE Education in Chorley and part of the project was that BAE Systems, through CREATE, will offer a 3D Printing Workshop Day as well as a day of careers advice.

"BAE Systems want to create more jobs in the future in the Lancashire area and they hope, by training pupils on such items as 3D printers and show how they are used in their business, this will give them an understanding of the careers available to them and the chance to stay in Lancashire for the jobs.

"A 3D printer is expensive, around £3,000, so we are delighted to have one in school.

"At the Workshop, the pupils designed a mini rocket ship and printed it as well as learning simply CAD/CAM skills."

Lead teacher for Drama, Miss Howell tells us...



# When the past came back to Priory

It was back to school for Priory's first ever Head Girl and her conclusion on the new-look Priory was 'it's amazing'.

Mrs Sonia Ward (nee Taylor) is now 82 and was invited back to Priory by Principal, Mr Eastham, to have a look around the school, which opened in 1953 with Sonia among the first group of pupils to join.

It's obviously changed structurally since she was Head Girl of Penwortham Secondary Modern in 1955 but Sonia insists the atmosphere and feel of the school is still the same.

"They say your school days are the best of your life and I was happy at Priory," said Sonia. "I cannot see any pupil not being happy here as it's an amazing school."

Sonia laughed as she was shown photographs from her year group and form from her time at Priory. She said: "I was Head Girl and Roy Rich was Head Boy. I have spotted him on some photos Mr Eastham has shown me and I can remember a lot of my classmates when I see their pictures. It's so beautiful to see.

"I don't know how I got the role of Head Girl. I think the headteacher and staff nominated me, but I was honoured to get it. I remember our jobs as prefects was to search the school as pupils then had to leave the buildings at break and dinner and some were always trying to hide indoors from the cold. Our job was to find them!

# Top Year 7 & 8 Pupils Take On National Challenge



Year 8 Daniel M was 'Best in School' at the recent Junior Mathematical Challenge (UKMT) as he collected a Gold Award.

Around 60 Priory pupils in Years 7 and 8 took part in the hour-long, multiplechoice national challenge.



The problems are designed to make pupils think, encouraging mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

#### Maths teacher Mr Hunter said:

"To recognise the highest performers in the Challenge, the top-scoring 50 per cent of participants across the country are awarded with Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates.

"Daniel was our 'Best in School' with a staggering 101 points from the 25 questions while Oliver S was our 'Best in Year 7' and these also received a badge on their certificates to denote this.

"We have six pupils who collected a Silver Certificate – Evie C, Lucy J, Niamh P, Jayden H, Oliver L along with Oliver S.



Many received the Bronze Award and pupils not among the high scorers received a Certificate of Participation.

"There was some outstanding problem solving by our Priory pupils. It's great to have these maths competitions back in school, especially in Key Stage 3."

Daniel said: "I wasn't expecting a Gold Award. I can do maths quite well and I enjoyed the challenge." Evie said: "It was a fairly difficult Challenge with a lot more logic than expected." Lucy said: "As it was multiple choice, a lot of it was a process of elimination." Best in Year 7 Oliver S said: "I am proud to be 'Best in Year 7' and I enjoyed having a go."

Daniel went through to the next round, the 'Junior Kangaroo,' which he sat on Tuesday afternoon. We will receive his results over the coming weeks - good luck Daniel!



# Year 9s Have An Enterprising Way To Get Into The New Business Course

Priory is looking to find the next Steve Jobs or Joe Wicks as they launch their new qualification, NCFE Level 2 Business and Enterprise, from September.

It's available for Year 10s and Head of ICT & Computer Science, Mrs Qadri, will be teaching the course.

She has already given the Priory pupils, working in small groups, a taste of what to expect by asking Year 9s to research and produce a presentation or poster on an entrepreneur.

Megan H's group selected Walt Disney. She said: "He was one all three of us already knew something about so we worked together on Walt Disney. We did find out some new facts, such as he moved around a lot when he was younger."

Sam's group selected fitness guru Joe Wicks and admitted: "We knew about him before but he came to everyone's attention during lockdown."



Mrs Qadri said: "We got them to choose from a list of 20 entrepreneurs and find out about their business, how they started, what they give to charity and so on. I think they found it interesting.

"We used to teach the Business and Enterprise qualification a few years ago but then we introduced Computer Science and this took over. However Computer Science has been running for a few years now and we decided to put Business and Enterprise back on the Key Stage 4 curriculum and pupils have shown a great deal of interest in it.

"It's the equivalent to a Level 2 qualification, it's vocational and is an equivalent to a GCSE.

"The course involves looking at entrepreneurial characteristics and business aims and objectives; legal structures, organisational structures and stakeholder engagement; marketing mix and market research; internal and external influences on business; human resource requirement for a business start-up, sources of enterprise funding and business finance and a lot more."

Year 9 pupil Grace said: "I want to do this qualification as I feel it will help me in the future. I am really excited about starting it."

Umar will be a hit on your television screens next week as he shows off his cricketing prowess. He is taking part in a TV programme where he is coached by former England and Lancashire all-rounder Andrew Flintoff, now a presenter.

The programme is a BBC One series called 'Freddie Flintoff's Field of Dreams' where 'Freddie' will put together his own side in a bid to change people's perspective of the sport.

From Preston, the former England international visited under-privileged parts of Lancashire to find 11 teenagers for his side who will be called 'Freddie's First Eleven.'

It was for teenagers who had not considered the sport before and is challenging the idea that cricket is a game for the posh, privileged and the privately-educated as Andrew broke the mould, being state-educated.

"I liked watching and playing cricket and I was involved with the BYDS Youth Club in Broadgate and got selected from there," said Umar.

"They said they wanted to do a documentary about cricket and give people like me an opportunity which I might not otherwise have. It was filmed every Tuesday at Preston College. We were trained by

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Andrew Flintoff, who is really down-to-earth, and Kyle Hogg as well. They taught us different types of cricketing skills and it has been really good. I would say now I am a bit of an all-rounder. The idea is for our team of teenagers to play against league teams made up of people around our own age.

"I have been interviewed a lot for the programme and they have been to my house and interviewed my family as well."

Freddie said: "Cricket is not an easy sport and some of the boys had never picked up a bat before. I was also dealing with kids who thought it was posh and boring so I had to change their minds. I got far more invested in the boys' lives than I thought I would but I care more about them as people than their cricketing ability at the end of the day. It was definitely worth it."
