## Pupils Learn A Language With Three Pillars And A Pizza Box!



Priory's Languages department encouraged pupils to use their imaginations to help them understand the new way of teaching French.



Instead of being taught in different topics, French is now based around the 'Three Pillars' – Grammar, Phonics and Vocabulary.

"I am a massive fan of this new French curriculum," said Head of Languages, Mrs Scully, who is in her second school year of teaching it.

"The new way of learning can be trickier to understand so we gave our pupils a challenge to try and help them.

"They were asked to build a model of the

'Three Pillars' which showed their understanding of each of the pillars, that they were of equal importance and what they offer in terms of language.

"They had two hours to build them in their House teams and then they went in front of a panel of three senior figures in school to answer questions such as: 'Why do you learn vocabulary?' 'What is grammar?' and 'What does 'HABITS' stand for?'

HABITS is an acronym standing for: High frequency language; Automaticity; Building Blocks of Language;

Independence; Talk it! Read it! Write it! Listen to it!; and Sequencing. This helps pupils understand why they are learning French in this way.

Mrs Scully continued: "They were also questioned about careers in French and they showed a good understanding about how you can use languages in a host of different jobs.

"Pupils are also taught ten words a week. This is on purpose so we aren't overloading them and the new vocabulary sinks in.

"We have noticed an impact on our pupils since we introduced this a

year ago. Their pronunciation is better, they have better vocabulary retention and their grammar is improving.

"This will prepare them for a new GCSE and we believe this way of teaching French will be more beneficial to our pupils."

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Oliver, of Year 8 winners, Group 3 Calder, said: "Making the model definitely helped me understand the Three Pillars better."

Year 8 Phoebe said: "Building the model was fun and enjoyable while the presentation was nerve-racking. I had missed one of the lessons so this helped me catch-up and helped me understand it better."

Year 8 Emily said: "My job was to concentrate on the careers aspect and they are all now engraved in my brain!"

Leon, of Year 7 Group 1 winner Hodder, who won overall, added: "Our model had three pillars on a box and we included the 'HABITS' so it was a good way to learn."




STEM Club lead and Assistant Head of Science, Mrs Potter, said, "After great teamwork making the

In recent weeks, Year 8, Junior, and Year 7, Henry, have both made a toy for their younger siblings.








The club runs every Monday after school 3.10pm-4.10pm in TE4, all are welcome, regardless of skill or ability. Contact Mrs Lockwood for more details.



"It was on the ground floor, so I climbed through, climbed over the settee and saw her on the floor. She was conscious. I unlocked the door, kept the lady calm and an ambulance came.

"I thought that was it but the police lady said I would get something special."

The PCSO was Liz Coleman who was attending the emergency but couldn't access the property without George's help.

George and his mum went to Chorley police station at a later date and got presented with his special award from the Superintendent for Lancashire, Gary Crowe.

"My position is first where I throw the first stone and sweep the rest of them," said Troy.


Team Waring played six matches over four days, winning them all to be crowned the undefeated UK British Junior Champions.

The team will now go on to the World Junior B Championships as the England Junior Curling Representatives in December in Finland. If they win they will qualify for the World Junior A Championships in 2025.

"It's a very technical game," said Troy. "I like it as it keeps me active.

"It is a great achievement for our team to go

to the World Championships, it's a chance to visit Finland too as I have never been before.

### Culture Day - Friday, 3 May

Next Friday, we will once again be celebrating Culture Day.



At Penwortham Priory Academy we pride ourselves on our diversity and vast cultural community. In our school this academic year, we have on average 15 different ethnicities and over 20 different languages spoken!

Having a day to celebrate our culture is something that has been requested by many of our pupils and we agree that it is extremely important for children to be proud of their identities, faiths and cultures, but also to share their background with their peers.


On Friday then, students are invited to come to school dressed in clothing that reflects either their own particular culture, represents their special country's flag or embodies a national team kit, such as rugby, hockey or football.

If they do wish to wear their own clothes for the day, then we ask that you make a donation of £1 via SCOPay. Money raised will go to the Red Cross and Friends of Mulanje Orphans (Malawi).

There will be a food sale at break/lunchtime in the Auditorio on the same day where students can buy many different foods from other cultures. In addition, students may bring in their own cultural food (this can be homemade or store bought) that can be shared amongst their classmates. In this case, we also ask that you provide the school with a list of ingredients in the food so that they can ensure that children with any allergies or dietary requirements are safe to eat it.

On this day, students will be also be talking about their culture with their classmates, doing lots of activities to celebrate their identity, learning basic sayings in each other's languages and listening to music from around the world. There will be a quiz in Learning for Life and each department will have

a short presentation highlighting famous people from various cultures that relate to their subjects.



Throughout the week, Henna painting will also be taking place at break and lunchtime in the Auditorio. Permission letters for this activity can be obtained from the school office and the cost for this is £2 (cash only).

Mrs Cowell will also be running one of her cookery workshops on Tuesday evening where pupils will be making Greek cheese pies (booking essential).

We are very excited to celebrate our cultures at Penwortham Priory Academy and are sure that the students will have a fantastic day.

### **Tommy Leaves WW1 History at Priory**

Pupils will notice a new addition to the 'Lest We Forget' Memorial Garden – Corporal Tommy.

Tommy was carved by John Winders and has been donated to Priory by John via Preston South Rotary Club, in return for a £500 donation to children's charity Derian House by the Rotary Club.

Rotary Club's Geoff Todhunter takes up the story.

"John Winders, a friend, took up wood-carving as a retirement hobby and has carved a number of birds, animals and other characters. Rather than accepting payment he requests that a donation be made to his preferred charity, Derian House.

"When he was nearing completion of his World War 1 soldier he was wondering where it could be erected and I undertook, on behalf of my Rotary Club, to try and find somewhere suitable.

"Penwortham Town Council approached local schools on our behalf and we are delighted that Penwortham Priory Academy gladly accepted it for their Memorial Garden.

"The end result is that Derian House will receive a significant donation from Rotary; John is delighted to know the statue has found a



suitable home; the school will receive a nice focal point for their Memorial Garden and the Rotary Club pulled it altogether."

John said: "I got the wood last April and it took me until October to make Tommy. I got the idea from the soldier in Astley Park and I thought I would have a crack at it.

"It's different to what I normally do, I have made many animals and characters, including Paddington and Mr Toad, and they are in the grounds of Derian House and it's lovely to see Tommy in a school."

Lead Teacher for History Mr Eccles said: "I am very impressed with Tommy, he's magnificent.

"It will get pupils talking about history and our Year 8s are currently studying the Great War so it's a nice coincidence."

Principal Mr Eastham said: "It really does have the wow factor. We are a community school and this is a fitting place to have this carving.

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"We are blessed with having outdoor learning spaces and we hold our Remembrance Ceremony in our Memorial Garden every November so this is a fantastic addition to our learning environment.

"We have already noticed pupils looking at Tommy and hopefully this will stimulate discussion about him and history."

Gardener Mr Farron said: "Corporal Tommy is a welcome addition to our 'Lest We Forget' Memorial Garden, John is very talented and it is extraordinary. We just have to find a regiment for him now!"

Derian House representative Anne-Marie Fishwick said: "We are grateful to John for all the work he does for us and to come to Priory to see his latest carving.

"John asks for a donation to Derian House instead of for his work and this helps to raise our profile in different communities."

## Year 10 Pupil Gains Coveted Place on an Adventure of a Lifetime



Year 10 pupil Emily will have the experience of a lifetime after successfully securing a coveted place to go to Malawi next year.

Emily has been a member of 5th Penwortham Scouts since she was five-years-old. She saw an advertisement on Facebook for the chance to go to Malawi in July/August 2025 as part of a contingent of West Lancs Scouts in aid of the charity Friends of Mulanje Orphans (FOMO).

"We had to attend a selection day where there were 70 applicants for 30 places," said Emily.

"It was tough as there was an interview and then a number of team-building exercises"

"I was waiting for the email for a week and then it said I was in and I couldn't believe it, I can't tell you how excited I was."

"My brother had gone to Switzerland previously for the International Jamboree and so I was looking for a chance to go abroad with Scouts and this will be amazing.



"We are going to support FOMO and staying in Malanje where we will work across multiple different centres - refurbishing the buildings, taking part in different projects and cooking food, which we have to buy from the market. I am slightly worried as there will be no cheese!

"We will also have a few days to do our own things, such as go on a safari or climb the local mountain.

"We have to raise £500 for the charity so I am going to sell some of my artwork at my scout church, do a garage sale, sell things at car boot sale, a sponsored walk and bake sales. Scouts will also support us with fundraising ideas.

"I am beyond excited. I like Drama and can sing and play the ukulele so I can entertain everyone too!"

### It's wrap for 'Scratching The Surface'

Pupils took to the stage for a different Priory production this week – Scratching the Surface.

The play was an educational performance in a bid to help people talk about the sensitive subject of self-harming and how it affects, not only the person doing it, but family and friends as well.



There were a lot of words to learn, and some worrying moments of whether the show would go on earlier in the week, but the cast, under Lead Teacher of Drama, Miss Howell, got there with two strong productions.

Miss Howell said: "There was a lot more learning of lines; it's not the glitz and glamour of our usual performances - it's about raw emotion on the stage. With it being 'verbatim', it had to be word perfect.

"A few of the cast struggled, which is understandable, and there was a worry whether we could actually put the performance on but we got there in the end."

Year 7 Lillia said: "It's been amazing to be involved with this. It was a bit stressful but I want to be an actress so this has been an important experience for me."

Year 9 Ben said: "There were a lot of words to learn but I think I got most of them. I was in Legally Blonde and this was a lot different and

more challenging. I have chosen to study Drama at GCSE next year as I enjoy it."

Year 9 Phoebe said: "It has been extremely stressful but I have enjoyed it at the same time."

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Year 7 Macie said: "It's been a challenging production, it's so serious, but I have enjoyied performing on stage."

Year 7 Ted added: "I am going to take GCSE\* Drama and am thinking about whether to be an actor."



## An interview with the playwright

The week before their performance of 'Scratching The Surface', the students were lucky enough to spend some time with Mark Wheeller, its playwright, via Zoom.

Mark Wheeller is one of the most-performed playwrights in Britain. He is widely recognised for his contributions to the field of theatre education and his powerful plays that tackle social issues. One of his plays is recognised as one of the most performed contemporary plays in the world, having been performed over 5000 times.

His other plays include 'Game Over', which Priory pupils performed in 2022.

The Zoom meeting with Mark was an amazing opportunity and arranged



by Miss Howell. It provided an incredible experience for the students who were able to ask questions about the interviews that took place with the family and how the individuals reacted to the questions.

Students asked questions such as, "How did they react to the questions you asked?" and "Were there any moments that really stood out to you?". One particularly interesting question posed to Mark was, "Did you, as playwright, know much about self-harm before writing this play?" Mark, at the time also a Drama teacher,



said he was unaware until writing the play that there was an issue with self-harm among young people. When he wrote the

play he discovered that it was a bigger issue and it almost became a pandemic.

Lead Teacher of Drama, Miss Howell, said, "It was a very informative talk and the students came away realising that self-harm was more than just cutting. On a

professional level, they also got to understand

what this style of theatre entails and had a peek into why 'verbatim' is important.

"The zoom meeting really created buzz within the cast and gave them passion to add to their characterisation. One really effective piece of advice that Mark gave the students was, "Don't try to imitate the characters, but bring yourself to it".

Penwortham Priory Academy was proud to host its first ever Palace Shield cricket match on Saturday.





### Next week, it's all about: Eurovision

This playlist will bookend the Eurovision Song Contest broadcast from the beautiful city of Malmö, Sweden next weekend, so effectively in school, eight days of cheese, drag and key changes.

Whether you feel that the Eurovision Song Contest has met its 'Waterloo' or you 'save all your kisses for' it or you like it 'just a little bit', this annual contest will be happening on Saturday, 11 May.

The Eurovision Song Contest began as a technical experiment in television broadcasting: the live, simultaneous, transnational broadcast that Europe has now been watching for nearly 70 years was in the late 1950s, a marvel.

The first Eurovision Song Contest was held on May 24, 1956, and saw seven nations compete: the Netherlands, Switzerland, Belgium, Germany, France, Luxembourg and Italy. Austria and Denmark wanted to take part but missed the deadline, and the United Kingdom sent their apologies as they were busy with their own contest that year. Switzerland's geographical centrality in Europe made it a natural node for the terrestrial transmitters requiredforthis experimentinlive, simultaneous, transnational broadcasting.

Over the years the format has evolved into the week-long, boundary pushing, technologically innovative, multi show spectacular we (may) enjoy today.

With seven victories, Ireland is the most successful country at the contest alongside last year's winners, Sweden, while Luxembourg, France, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom won five times.

This playlist contains some lesser known entries which gained short-lived fame in one particular year but also some songs which have since become huge hits and famous the world over.

We are hoping that the experiences planned for Year 8 will inspire more individuals to consider STEM careers in the future".





### Fairness in Football #LetGirlsPlay



PE teacher Miss Beesley is determined to 'let girls play' football as part of a national initiative.

England Football and Barclays say 'it's everyone's game' and 'want every girl to have equal access to football in school and in the community in 2024.' They held a 'Biggest Ever Girls Football Match' in March nationally encouraging as many girls as possible to play football on that day.

Miss Beesley made sure the Priory girls had access to part of the 3G pitch.

She said: "It's about changing views. A lot of the time the 3G pitch is seen as a boys area so it's making sure girls

can get on the AstroTurf and play football. It's making sure everyone is treated equally when playing sports and given equal opportunities.

"The girls are so enthusiastic, especially the current Years 7 and 8, who want to play football and we want to encourage them so they can play more games and there are more leagues for girls locally."

Priory's Year 10 girls football team have been together since Year 7 and have reached the quarter-finals of the Lancashire Cup. The girls play for a range of teams, including



Rochdale AFC, Penwortham Town and Buckshaw while, at Lostock Hall, they are coached by former Priory pupil Jazmin Attwood, who captained Lancashire Under 16s to national final victory when at school.

Year 10 Caitlyn said: "Boys sometimes say girls can't play football but we want to show them we can."

Year 7 Lola said: "I wouldn't say I am the best at football but I enjoy it. I support Liverpool and have been to Anfield many times. I also enjoy watching the women's games. My friend Willow is probably better than a lot of the boys!"

Willow, who plays centre midfield for Lostock Hall, said: "I do get annoyed when the boys are on the 3G pitch and won't always let us on, I want more opportunities for women to play football."

Girls from all year groups may access the 3G pitch at break and lunch. Supervision is provided by Mr Eastham and Mr Gee, and girls are welcome to

play against each other or the boys, either will be accommodated dependent on numbers.

### When Science Becomes Electric!

Last Wednesday pupils in Year 7 and Year 8 attended an in-school STEM workshop. The session, led by BAE Systems, the Royal Air Force and the Royal Navy centred around the theme of electricity and its generation.

Pupils were very enthusiastic to join in with the session where volunteers built a model circuit and discussed how the moving electrons created the current. When discussing electricity generation, pupils considered the pros and cons of each energy resource and how, although there are many such as coal, oil, biofuel and geothermal to name a few, each one works ultimately in the same way by turning a generator.

The group also discussed electrostatic build up and demonstrated this with a very brave pupil who had a hair-raising experience on the van-der-graaf machine.

Electricity generation was demonstrated by using a simple generator as well as teachers taking part in a bike generator to produce enough electricity to create a colourful display behind the bike.

The very engaging hosts ended the workshop by discussing the varied range of engineers that exist, and the 27 engineers that were required to make a mobile phone!

Assistant Leader of Science, Mrs Potter, said, "The session was an excellent

opportunity for the pupils to become engaged with the topic of electricity. It has provided an introduction with the pupils getting hands-on and visual demonstration experience of the topic before they actually cover it in the classroom".

Team GB, Aldi and Get Set launched their 'Design a Meal for an Athlete' competition for young people up to age 14.

It's to celebrate the Olympic Games in Paris this summer and pupils had to decide what makes a healthy meal, choose an athlete from the list provided and assess their likes and needs and then design a healthy, balanced and tasty meal for them.

Mrs Lockwood organised the competition in Priory and selected one pupil from each house to put forward to the national competition where pupils could win a family trip to the Olympics and £1000 for the school, amongst other prizes.

She said: "We wanted to get our pupils involved for a number of reasons. The competition was really good timing to raise awareness of the Olympics this summer. We are also always trying to get the pupils invested in a healthy balanced diet, something which is in our curriculum.

"It also gave the pupils a chance to think more about a healthy lifestyle for an athlete and I was blown away by the entries. They were beautifully illustrated, most included nutrients with the athlete in mind and they had to dig deep with their knowledge.

"Their entries have now been sent off to the national competition, to be judged by their athletes."

Akemi, from Hodder, won. She chose boxer Delicious Oria who 'needs lots of protein' and whose favourite foods include 'avocado, chicken and salmon'.

Akemi said: "I selected proteins and carbohydrates as well as his favourite foods for him to perform well. I learnt about the various foods from Mrs Lockwood and by cooking at home – I also enjoyed colouring in the illustration."

Holly, from Ribble, was second and she selected vegetarian Paralympic swimmer Alice Tai who eats 'beans and lentils for protein.'

Holly said: "I selected Alice because she is female and my dad was vegan so I know about the various foods. I wanted to make her meal healthy, balanced and colourful."

Third placed Charlie, from Douglas, also chose Delicious Oria and said: "He needs a lot of protein and is a strong athlete and I gave him variety as well."

Fourth placed Elliot, from Calder, also selected Delicious. He said: "Choosing his meal helped me understand everything taught in class a bit more. I like cooking and I had a lot of ideas."



# Year 7 Welcome Lancashire Police To Explore The Dangers of County Lines





On Tuesday this week we welcomed PC Jason Ellwood from South Ribble's Safer Neighbourhoods Team. Jason visits schools in South Ribble to talk to Year 7 pupils about County Lines and how to avoid getting involved.

The County Lines workshop is designed to educate young people about the dangers of being groomed into drug trafficking by criminal gangs. These workshops raised awareness amongst our Year 7s about the risks associated with County Lines - a term describing gangs using young people to transport drugs and money from cities to rural areas.



The workshops cover how gangs operate, target vulnerable youth, and recruit through social media. They also address the consequences of involvement, including violence, exploitation, and criminal convictions.

Miss Smith said, "We are so grateful that Jason was able to come into school to teach our youngsters about potential risks that they may unknowingly get involved in.

"The workshops also contributed to the pupil's understanding of the Fundamental British Value - Rule of Law which is developed over the five years here at Priory. Having spoken to one of our parent teachers, she was happy that her daughter had been given this information so early in her development of independence and found the sessions informative as an adult.

"We are hoping to run further sessions with the Police later in the academic year, focusing on legalities and crimes impacting youngsters in our local area, and involving Year 9 in 'Cells' workshops when the touring group visit us in July".



In a series of articles, we'll shine a spotlight on each team as we explore their contributions and learn more about the people who keep our school running seamlessly. We begin with the Estates Team.

Priory changed has dramatically since it opened in 1953 and over the last 20 years there has been significant investment in its facilities to ensure students have the best environment to learn in. The school has a dedicated Facilities Management Estates Team with individuals who take great pride in their work and have the skills to keep the estate functioning as well as it can for all users of the site.

Strategic Estates Development Manager, Mr Bolton, who has been at the school for over 22+ years,

oversees the Estates and ICT Teams at the school. Mr Wilkinson is the Estates Operational Manager, whose small team works on the site ensuring Priory always looks its best, from classrooms to the school fields. With over 14 years of service, Mr Wilkinson's role is to co-ordinate its proactive and reactive repairs and maintenance for the site. He has trained as a joiner and plumber and other members of the team also have a varied skillset.

The Estates Team covers everything from keeping the school tidy on a day-to-day basis to maintaining the award-winning gardens that Mr Farron has developed over the years and contribute to everyone's wellbeing.

With the help of consultants, the school has applied



for government grants for new buildings and refurbishments such as the Science Building, Humanities Building and Hex Block. It has also established members of the team to enable the use of the school facilities



outside of school hours so the local community can use it for sporting and other community-based activities and events.

The Estates Teams mission statement is: "An estate that gives an exceptional, lasting impression to all users."

"We take a lot of pride in our work and we expect everything to be done to the highest standard which is why we have an on-site team of six staff who share that ethos," said Mr Bolton.

"We have found in the past that some contractors don't always share our values but we care about the site and hopefully that shows. An example of this was the grounds contractor and the school itself now takes responsibility for the groundwork.

"The school has developed a lot over the years and the emphasis is always on creating the best environment for learning.

"We also share our skills, equipment and experience by working with several primary schools in the local area so it benefits everyone.

"In the last 12 months, we have had a grant approved from the Football Foundation for a tractor to help with the maintenance of our grass football pitches. This now means that the estates team can take care of all



the grounds work around our site and also work with Penwortham Primary School to look after theirs

"In addition, we applied to the Football Foundation for funding to help maintain the grass pitches for all the junior football clubs that use the school fields. We have been successful in this application and have been awarded some funds to help with this. It's a six-year plan which includes seeding and other maintenance works throughout this time. This will benefit our pupils and also the grassroots football teams who use our site in the evenings and weekends and so we are giving something back to our community.

"We have other groups and clubs who use our site in out of school hours such as a church groups, martial arts, dance and fitness groups and this allows us to generate a small income that we can use to reinvest in the facilities for the benefit of everyone.

"We have just completed a project to replace all the fire doors on the ground floor in the main school building after receiving government funding. Our next project is to introduce the 'Priory Pod' near the 3G pitch which will sit as a takeaway food service for the students, to take the pressure off the dining room service. We are hoping to have this completed by the end of the summer."

The event closed with a breakdancing class where the girls hip-hopped their way to receive their certificates.





"I used to want to be a vet, then went off the idea but this has made me want to do it again.


"I love animals. I enjoyed it at the vets, watching surgeries, entertaining the animals and ensuring there was plenty of stock."

# Priory pupils prove they're some of the best at national Maths competition

Imogen received a Silver Certificate. She said: "It was challenging."

Mr Raynor's Year 8 class received four Golds, 14 Silvers and nine Bronze certificates, some of the best results Priory has had in the competition.

He said: "The UKMT Junior Maths Challenge is done under test conditions in school and it is a challenge, trying to apply the knowledge they have learnt in lessons to the questions. We are absolutely delighted with the results, they are outstanding."


Cakes were handed out personally at breaktime by the girls so that they could thank each member of staff in person.

# Year 8 Pupils Discover Careers of the Future with 3D Printing Workshop



Sixty Year 8 pupils were selected by Head of ICT & Computer Science, Mrs Qadri, to take part in

an exciting #InspiringLancashire project last Thursday, funded by BAE Systems.

Priory was given a 3D printer as part of the link-up and we have worked with CREATE Education to deliver the school-based 3D Printing Workshop Day. Mrs Qadri had taken part in a training day at CREATE Education in Chorley and part of the project was that BAE Systems, through CREATE, will offer 60 Year 8 students a 3D Printing Workshop Day as well as a day of careers advice.

"BAE Systems want to create more jobs in the future in the Lancashire area and they hope, by training pupils on such items as 3D printers and show how they are used in their business, this will give them an understanding of the careers available to them and the chance to stay in Lancashire for the jobs," said Mrs Qadri.

At the workshop, the pupils designed a mini rocket ship and printed it as well as learnt simple CAD/CAM skills.

Year 8 Sophie said, "I found the day and its tasks very fun. The designing on Onshape for the rocket was challenging at some points but I eventually got the hang of it. I would try to 3D print again if I have another chance."

it now and in addition the practical work (launching rockets) was fun and showed that 3D was even able to make launchable rockets!"

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Muhammed B, said, "Today was a very good day. I have done lots of stuff with 3D printing. There are lots of jobs to do with 3D printing like engineering, food and even hospitals. We did rocket experiments outside. It was lots of fun!"

Students were working at a much faster pace than when we ran the event last year and they even managed to personalise their rocket ships with their names.

"I will have a big job to get all their designs 3D printed in different colours over the next few weeks," said Mrs Qadri.

Now that students have developed their design skills, they will also be taking part in an Inspiring Lancashire Challenge Project where they will have to design a prototype product (or a part for a product) that will either:

- help in one small way to improve the environment in or around a local waterway (river, canal, lake or sea) or
- improve the habitat for one or more species of local wildlife.

Look out for more information about this project in the Autumn term.





This week we welcomed our new intake of pupils and their parents as they began their journey at Priory.



Our Learning For Life day for Year 10 pupils was on the theme of Personal Safety and this included a presentation by Wasted Lives.




Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service, who delivered the session, brought with them a

To ensure our pupils were informed about what a General Election is and who the political parties are, four of our Learning for Life lessons leading up to 4 July have been dedicated to explaining the event.

Pupils learnt about what our constituency is called (South Ribble), watched videos, and key terms were highlighted.

Yesterday, just like the adults in this country, Priory pupils went to the polls. Ballot papers were given out in Learning for Life for every pupil to vote. Teachers counted the votes and the results were announced to the whole school today to coincide with what was happening across the nation.

Over the four sessions, pupils learned about >>

- What is a General Election? What is our constituency called? Who can vote? Who can people vote for?
- What do political parties believe in? Who can people vote for in South Ribble? Party election broadcasts and bias.
- The South Ribble parties Conservatives, Labour, Liberal Democrats, Reform UK, Green and others.
- Pupils were given an overview of what each party promised to do about three key issues in the election: Education, NHS/social care, Immigration

Teachers also explained the practical side of voting (how we vote), who might win across the UK, 2019 vs.

2024, and what will happen on 4th July. Some also got to watch the main four candidates introduce themselves at a recording of the South Ribble Hustings which took place at Penwortham Golf Club on Thursday, 27 June, where they also spoke about BTECs and young people's mental health, ending with quick-fire questions from members of the public in attendance.

# Year 9 Spend A Day in the CELLS



On Monday, we welcomed the CELLS team to work with our Year 9 pupils all day. CELLS stands for - Choices, Education, Learning and Lifelong Skills project.

This crime prevention charity turns negative pasts into positive futures through teaching children and young people across the North West about the consequences of crime through sharing lived experiences. Workshops included learning about age and the law, Joint Enterprise, County Lines, the dangers of being involved in drug distribution, gangs and weapons, the reality of prison life, online grooming as an entry point and the impact on families. The workshops also included a visit to a mobile prison cell which came on site.



Lead Practitioner for Personal Development, Miss Smith said "Although we do not have crime figures in our area which match those of Liverpool and Manchester, rural young people can be more susceptible to being drawn in to crime gangs unexpectedly. The workshops aim to make young people more aware of gang strategies to do this, the kinds of crimes they could get involved in and the consequences of being involved.

She continued, "The workshop team gave first hand accounts on the impact of actions from their 'previous lives' on their lives and those of others, including their nearest and dearest. They spoke about the realities of being imprisoned versus experiences witnessed through social media.



"The pupils spoke positively regarding what they had learnt and the impact the sessions had had. Our staff came away from sessions full of praise for the session content and the way sessions were delivered."

The CELLS team enjoyed their day with us and commented how polite, respectful and intelligent our young people are and would like to visit us again in the future to impact on the potential futures of more of our youngsters.

Gary Jackson (Class of 1966) caught up with Ian Heyes (Class of 1968) as the pair last saw each other at school.




lan said: "I haven't seen Gary since I was at school and I recognised him immediately! I love coming back, I came back to the 50th and 60th anniversary events.
















Bamber (their maiden names) went on a cruise for our 60th birthdays. We also meet every Thursday for a quiz!"

"It's a powerful message to our current pupils that it's their school for life. It's the same site, it's in the same place, but we continue to evolve over time."






# Year 9 & Year 10 London Performing Arts Residential Trip

Class of 2022 pupil Rhianne Leach has successfully secured a place on the prestigious BAE Systems Aerospace Engineering Degree Apprenticeship Programme.

Rhianne wanted to thank Priory Teacher of Design Technology and Engineering Mrs Shaw for starting her on the path to her dream of becoming a Chief Engineer by helping her with the NCFE Level 1/2 Technical Award in

Engineering at school.

"I wanted to take the Engineering course at Priory, however I was limited by the number of subjects I could take. I had to prioritise the subjects I needed for college.

"Mrs Shaw made sure I could take the engineering qualification in my own time, two nights a week after school and in my lunch break. I sat my exam at the same time as everyone else and received a Level 2 Distinction \*.

"The support I was given by Mrs Shaw provided me with the foundation that I am now building upon and helped to spark my ambition within the subject.



"I always wanted to do something STEM related, having always had an interest in physics and maths. It was only when I went to look around universities that I saw these subjects being applied and how worthwhile and useful it was. I saw how engineering looks in the real world and decided that it was the path that I wanted to follow.

"I will be completing industry placements alongside university study in order to obtain my Bachelors Degree in Aerospace Engineering. It's the next step towards my dream of becoming a Chief Engineer.

"But ultimately, the first step was the work that Mrs Shaw helped me to complete throughout my earlier studies."

Rhianne went to Lancaster University School of Mathematics (LUSoM), and applied for the extremely competitive BAE Systems' position.

"It was an extremely long process. There was the initial application, then an AI screened interview followed by an extensive personality test and gamification. The final step was a two hour in person interview with two Engineers.

"Overall, BAE Systems nationally receives 20,000 applications for all their apprenticeship positions, for which there are 600 available across all the sectors.

"I received a phone call just before starting my A-Levels to say that I had been selected for one of the 30 places on the Aerospace Scheme. I start in September and will be initially based at the Samlesbury site.

"The chance to travel around the world really excites me. I am aware of many people who have travelled to Japan, Germany and many more countries that the company works with. There are some truly amazing opportunities that this degree apprenticeship will open up for me."

### Class of 2022 pupil Hannah has thanked Priory for helping her pursue her dream career in Japanese.

Hannah became fascinated with learning Japanese while watching animated cartoons and wanted to watch without subtitles.

When she came to Priory she wanted to study Japanese language but obviously it's not on the curriculum.

However, Priory found a way to help Hannah with the support of Head of Languages, Mrs Scully – and she will now study Japanese at university.

Mrs Yates said: "Hannah had been learning the language by herself at home. Mrs Scully was able to guide her through the curriculum but we also needed someone to help her with the spoken language so we put an appeal out on social media to see if there was anyone local who could help.



"Mrs Small, who is a Japanese national living in the area, came forward and she came into school every Wednesday lunch-time and helped Hannah with her GCSE."

Hannah spent Monday and Wednesday studying Japanese in school, out of lesson time, as well as studying it independently.

While in Year 11 Hannah took the Japanese foundation level and got a Grade 5 – the highest she could achieve on that paper. She kept up her learning with Mrs Small independently, alongside studying A Levels, and last year came back to Priory to sit a higher level GCSE, this time achieving a Grade 8.

Hannah now has an unconditional offer from UCLan, as well as York St John, to study TESOL with Japanese - teaching English as a second language in Japan. She will go out there on placement in the third year to teach.

Hannah said: "I love Japan as it's such a different culture and it's so interesting learning about the history of Japan. It is a tough language to learn but it is worth the effort.

"Without Priory, and the support I received from Mrs Scully and Mrs Small, I wouldn't be where I am now. I didn't

take French and I would have probably opted to study something more mainstream at higher level. Having the opportunity to do this has definitely changed my life choices for the better."

Mrs Small still comes into Priory, offering an extracurricular lunch time club in Japanese language and culture for all pupils every Wednesday.

# Year 8 Can Look To The Stars With GCSE Astronomy



Year 8 pupils can reach for the stars by taking an optional GCSE in Astronomy from September, when they move up to Year 9.

Science Technician Mr Evans leads the course which will be after-school every Tuesday during term time. Learning starts in Year 9 and the course is completed in Year 10, when pupils can take their Astronomy GCSE a year early if they want to.

GCSE Astronomy covers a range of topics from Cosmology, Exploring starlight, Sellar evolution and Planetary motion and gravity.

Mr Evans said: "It's an added extra after school and pupils take their GCSE a year early.

"There is coursework and an exam and, I will be honest, it is quite tough – a few people start it and drop out. It is an enjoyable course to teach though and a lot of pupils thoroughly enjoy it."

Year 9 Freya said: "I wanted to do an extra GCSE and I find Astronomy interesting. I knew it would be hard, there is a lot of maths and there is quite a lot of information you learn which you don't learn in science. Doing a GCSE a year early is good practise for Year 11."



Year 9 Evie said: "I am interested in space which is why I chose Astronomy. If you get a GCSE in Astronomy people think you are really smart! It's maths and physics, with a little bit of history of physicists. I enjoy it and Mr Evans is a good teacher. To any Year 8s, I would say if you like Astronomy and if you want another qualification give it a go."



Year 10 Thomas said: "I took Astronomy as it's an extra GCSE and I found space interesting, how insignificant but unique we are! It is difficult but I have managed to stay with it. I would say to a Year 8 if you are smart enough, go for it."

Niamh said: "I have always liked space but it was a lot harder than I thought. The coursework was quite nice — sitting, staring at the stars! You do have to be dedicated to take it though."

Daniel added: "A Year 11 recommended me to take it and, while it's difficult, space has always been an interest of mine.

"I think 15 people started on the course and there are just six

of us in the Year 10 class now so you do have to persist with it."

In our final week, Year 10 GCSE artists took part in an online workshop with The Courtauld, an internationally renowned centre for art.

The Courtauld works to advance how we see and understand the visual arts, and is known for its teaching, research of art history and a major public gallery.

During the workshops, Courtauld Lead Educator Fran Herrick, delivered an introduction to art history with a focus on the Impressionists and art historical techniques. Pupils also explored a virtual tour of the gallery where they viewed the permanent collections as well as temporary exhibitions.



Mrs Shaw said, "The class also did a session on curating where they had to identify images from The Courtauld's collection, give it a title and write an introduction to their 'art exhibition'.

"The Courtauld cares for one of the greatest art collections in the UK, sharing these works with the public at The Courtauld Gallery in London. Its collections include Van Gogh's Self-Portrait with Bandaged Ear and Manet's A Bar at the Folies-Bergère so I was thrilled to be able to bring a taste of this to our young artists. Hopefully, we will be able to arrange a trip to the gallery in the coming year."



Last week, seven different primary schools from across the area joined us for an afternoon of science activities for the first of Priory's science competitions.


The pupils, from Year 5, took part in a range of Science activities including quizzes where they had to identify famous scientists, lab equipment and put their general knowledge of Science to the test.

of trips to sites of cultural and historical significance in the Preston and Penwortham areas.


