






Each week Progress Leaders will be introducing a new word to pupils in their AM or PM Prep time.

Whilst 'Relevant' is a word taken from the Academic Word List, therefore making it easily applicable to all subjects. Teachers will embed this word in to the learning objectives and questioning.

The tip of the week is another homophone. 'Affect' and 'Effect' are often confused. When the teacher uses this word in their speech, pupils may be asked which would be used if the sentence were to be written down. Teachers will mark the incorrect use of either word by putting a 'g' in the margin for 'grammar' and pupils may be asked to explain why 'affect' is appropriate rather than 'effect' (vice versa), as it is important to understand why certain homophones are used in order to apply them correctly.

This week Headteacher Mr Eastham received an email from a member of the public which, linking with the PixL theme of the term, he thought he would share with everyone:

Dear Mr Easthan,

On Monday, 14 January I was returning from Preston and caught the No 2 bus outside Preston Railway Station at 4.11pm. The bus was already crowded with various passengers which included many young people from a school, the name of which I am not aware. Once we reached Penwortham, quite a few pupils from your school got on. As the journey continued, pupils from the first school as well as your school got off at the various different stops along the route. During the time I was on my journey (to Banks, Southport), all the pupils from both schools were impeccably behaved. I didn't once hear bad language or raised voices and there was no shoving or pushing. All the pupils said thank you to the driver as they got off.

I feel it is very important to acknowledge the good behaviour and manners in young people as nowadays there are too many in this world who are only too quick to criticise and complain about any bad behaviour in the younger generation. Your pupils (together with the ones from the other school) are a credit to you and their parents.

Chi Chan Class of 2002



Former Priory student Chi Chan has praised his education at school as he spearheads research into HIV-AIDS.

Chi was Head Boy while at Priory and said the encouragement of the science department has inspired him to dedicate his life to finding a cure for HIV-AIDS.

"The years I spent in Priory and in Preston has laid a solid foundation for my subsequent achievements and adventures," said Chi. "I came from the then Portuguese colony of Macau in Southern China, with only a tenuous grasp of the English language. I arrived at the doors of Priory in 1997 with equal

parts of hope and apprehension.

"From day one, the staff and pupils of Priory, as well as the wider community of Preston, treated my family and I as one of their own. It was within this nurturing environment that myself, my sister, and my cousins, all proud graduates of Priory, were able to achieve our full potential.

"One of my proudest moments in my life was to be elected Head Boy at Year 11 but my true passion lies in science, something I discovered in the labs and classrooms at Priory."

Chi completed his A-Levels at Runshaw College and then was accepted into St John's College, University of Cambridge and obtained a degree in the Natural Sciences. He then moved to the University of Glasgow, completing a PhD in Virology.

"Soon after I handed in my doctoral thesis on retroviruses, I was hired as a Postdoctoral researcher by New York University to work on the molecular and cell biology of the AIDS virus, HIV-1. I spent four years there before moving onto the Frederick National Laboratory for Cancer Research in rural Maryland.

"At the moment I am living in Portland, Oregon as I work at one of the most prestigious medical research centres in the world, the Vaccine and Gene Therapy Institute.

"I am currently working to improve our understanding of how HIV-1

causes disease at the tissue level. So far, I am co-author of 11 academic papers on the biology of HIV-1 and other viruses.

"Several of the projects that I am involved in are novel therapies that aim to cure HIV-AIDS, so that the spread of this disease can be halted and patients will no longer need to take antiviral drugs for the rest of their lives."

As well as studying, Chi has met past presidents and future prime ministers and he has travelled around America.

"Nevertheless, I owe much of my success to the knowledge and life lessons I learned in Priory."
