Faith Day

Year 10 pupils all took part in a Faith Day on Wednesday.

The overall theme of the day was Medical Ethics and covered topics including The Sanctity of Life, Abortion, Euthanasia and Organ Donation.

All the sessions were full of debate, with many pupils displaying opposing arguments to some of the big questions being asked. They looked at balanced arguments for each of the topics together with religious views, whilst formulating their own opinions. Specific case studies were used in order to give the pupils real-life insight to how the issues affect individuals.

RE Teacher, Mrs Holland, who led the day, said, "The pupils were a credit to the school with visiting speakers from the Crossgate Church leaving with a really positive impression."









The Theatre

Pupils travelled by train to catch the matinee performance of 'The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-time' at the Piccadilly Theatre.

The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time tells the story of a gifted boy called Christopher Boone. He investigates the killing of a dog and in doing so has an adventure of self-discovery.

Head of English, Mrs Gidden said, "The children are currently studying this wondrous, enlightening book and having this experience enriched by the live show was a real treat. Pupils were exceptionally behaved and we received several compliments from the public, I was so proud of them."

Ms Young has been a keen promoter of astronomy, as Priory is one of the few schools in the area which offers an Astronomy GCSE. Priory has strong links with PADAS - Preston and District Astronomical Society, of which Ms Young is a member – and the astronomy students were the first to examine some five-billion-year-old meteorite which was found in the Western Sahara Desert.

The astronomy students have also visited the Moor Park Observatory to see Preston's refurbished historical telescope and attended a talk on the 1927 solar eclipse. Ms Young also took four students, invitation only, to attend the interment of Professor Stephen Hawking's ashes next to Sir Isaac Newton at Westminster Abbey.

Thursday saw an excited and extremely well behaved group of Year 8 pupils travel down to London for the day.



Priory's Assistant Head Teacher Ms Young has been made a fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society.

Ms Young said she was privileged to be awarded the honour after being nominated by Dr Stacey Habergham-Mawson, Project Manager for the National Schools Observatory at Liverpool John Moores University.

"It's a huge privilege to be a member of a society so steeped in the history of astronomy," said Ms Young.

Pupils are most welcome to come and help although they must be accompanied by a responsible adult.


Litter pickers will be provided by South Ribble Borough Council, however you will need to bring your own gloves. Footwear suitable for muddy groundwork is essential.

> The successful bridge had to support the weight of 100g when placed at the centre of their construction, as well as being wide enough to 'drive' a toy car along its full length.


Bonus points were given for the heaviest weight it supported until destruction.
