Priory Pupils Take Second Place at Runshaw College Science Competition

Thursday saw four Priory pupils venture off to Runshaw College for an afternoon of activities in Science subjects and to compete to win the Runshaw Science Cup.

The Krypton Factor competition, aimed at gifted and talented Science students, is designed to enable pupils to participate in activities from Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Geology. The event encouraged students to use their own scientific knowledge to solve problems such as 'The Hunt' and 'CSI Cretaceous'. Students also took part in a forensics investigation using entomology to determine time of death!

Well done to Johnny J, Ben W, Kate H and Olivia T who put in a fabulous effort to take second place on the day. Science teacher, Miss Conynhgham, who accompanied the pupils said, "The day consisted of three activities; finding chemistry and physics clues, measuring live maggots to be able to work out how long a body had been dead for, and using geology to find out which dinosaur had killed another. Our team came second and really enjoyed their day."

The day before saw another group of pupils - Colin C, May R, Ryan S and Imogen K - attend the college's Forensic Psychology: Offender Profiling Workshop. This hands-on event demonstrated how psychology is used to help identify the likely perpetrator of a crime. It also gave pupils the opportunity to develop their research skills and powers of analysis and evaluation. A very interesting trip!

During this time we expect the rest of the school to obey no entry signage around exam rooms and show respect by keeping noise to an absolute minimum.



The Red Box Project is a community-based, not-for-profit initiative, which aims to support young people throughout their periods by providing red boxes filled with free period products to local schools.

The Red Box Project was founded in March 2017 by three friends who wanted to give young people in their local area access to sanitary products. After reading about 'Period Poverty' in the news, they were angered at the idea that young women were missing out on their education because they couldn't afford the products they needed during their period.

Recognising that the need was nationwide, they invited individuals from across the country to be a part of this movement and the response was overwhelming. Red Boxes are filled with tampons, pads, tights and underwear which were then delivered in to local schools.

Any girl who needs a sanitary product may ask for supplies at the school office or see Mrs Clementson.



Word PHE Week

Each week Progress Leaders will be introducing a new word to pupils in their AM or PM Preptime.

'Assist' is a word taken from the Academic Word List, therefore making it applicable to all subjects. Teachers will using this word when explaining tasks involving paired work to re-phrase 'help your partner...' to 'assist your partner...'.

The tip is to raise awareness of discourse markers for comparison. In English pupils will need to compare two sources and devise multiple arguments when writing non-fiction. Discourse markers are also helpful for comparing religions in RE and, in History lessons when comparing historical events and sources. Pupils should familiarise themselves with them for use in their work.

Discourse markers can help when comparing. They are great to use in written responses in which you are asked to compare two sources or situations.

Pupils:

Do you need to change your Accelerated Reader books?

Remember, the only times you should be changing them are:

Before school | AM Prep | Break | Lunch | PM Prep | After school

Make sure you are organised and have changed them before your English lesson.

Remember: All pupils should carry their reading books; they should not be left in classrooms. You MUST be able to produce your AR book if you are asked to by a member of staff – it's part of your uniform!

Progress leaders will routinely carry out equipment checks during Prep times and those that fail to show their reading books will receive a sanction which could lead to a detention. Pupils that have lost their book will receive a 'lost book letter' to take home.
