Year 9 Pupils Put History Into Life

Year 9 pupils at Priory have brought history to life this week by learning all about Anne Frank – and they have been teaching it themselves to the younger year groups.

Anne Frank Educational Trust has set up an exhibition at Priory where pupils can learn about what happened to Anne during World War II but also relate the issues then to nowadays.

Anne, a Jew, wrote a diary when hiding from the Nazi's in 1942 before she died in Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in 1944. Her diary showed the impact of prejudice and hatred on individual lives – a lesson still applicable today.

A group of Year 9 pupils have learnt all about Anne's life from Molly-Mae Smith, the North-West Project Officer at the Anne Frank Educational Trust, and now they are tour guides at the exhibition in the Hex Building.

Lead Teacher for History Mr Eccles said: "I worked with the Anne Frank Educational Trust at my previous school and I saw how pupils engaged with the topic when it was taught in this way. We have been studying the history of the Nazi's before Christmas and are now studying their persecution of the Jewish people and the messages of discrimination and tolerance. It's a different way of learning history - it's not just teacher-led, the pupils have been taught it themselves and they are teaching it to others."

Year 9 Josie said: "I may take GCSE History so doing this has helped to increase my knowledge of that period. I knew some of the story of Anne Frank before but I have learnt a lot more since I started being a guide."

Logan said: "I like history, especially the World War II period. I learnt more about Anne Frank's origins, her family and going to Germany and it's good to pass the knowledge on."

Lara added: "It's such a sad story, there is no happy ending. I admire how courageous Anne was and how she fought for her rights. I like having the chance to make sure everyone understands it and learns lessons today from it."

The country of egalité, fraternité, liberté, wine, Citroens and les gilets jaunes. Most of this music is the embodiment of the Gallic shrug.






farewell

Performance Group Set Goals For Mental Health

Priory pupils watched a moving performance of 'Squad Goals' to help them to understand issues of mental health, develop coping strategies and what they can do to assist those in need.

Altru Drama Group explored issues of suicide, self-harm and parental depression through their performance, centred on a rugby player called Jamie who is destined for the top until a bad injury halts his career. This forces him to withdraw, he doesn't talk about it and, in the final scene, the audience finds out he has committed suicide with the emphasis on how sad this is, how it affects other people and how, if Jamie had opened up, he might not have taken his own life.

There is also a character called Caitlin whose mum has been struggling with clinical depression for a number of years and how Caitlin cares for her and uses websites to gain support and Ruby, who used to self-harm but how, on reflection, she realises it didn't help her.

The young people in the play talk about coping strategies for teenage life and give each other positive coping mechanisms which the audience can use.

The session was specifically for Year 7s and 8s to encourage pupils to talk, to get things out in the open and emphasise that there are plenty of people willing to help.

Miss Ackers organised the event and said: "It was powerful for the right reasons, this message needs to hit home. It upset some pupils but it explored important issues that you need to speak about in school.

"It's important to have a knowledge of mental health and it was about educating our pupils.

"The play was designed to raise awareness of mental health and give our pupils the skills to recognise the signs and help each other."

Pupil George said: "It was very powerful and you shouldn't underestimate mental health, you shouldn't just dismiss it, it's more serious than that."

Kayla said: "I learnt that it's important to ask people if they are ok and not to judge them."

Bryanny said: "It was sad that the people in the play didn't talk to anyone and it helped to show that there is always someone to talk to, it's important to open up."

Josh added: "I learnt that you shouldn't judge anyone, everyone has their own feelings."

The story is acted out in a very sensitive and careful way – with the emphasis that Jamie had options to talk to people and open up. The play ends with the young characters promising always to talk to each other, and to their families, about their issues and never to keep things inside as Jamie did.

Making & Shaking in Year 8 Geography

In Geography this week, students of Year 8 have been designing and then building their own earthquake-proof buildings before evaluating their success - with some fantastic results.

The building of their design comes following a sequence of lessons that have allowed students to explore our dynamic world and our unpredictable tectonic plates. The topic - "Can we dig to the centre of the Earth?" - has given students an insight into the geological timescale of our planet and enables them to piece together the puzzles of Pangaea and continental drift first theorised by Alfred Wegener. Interweaved throughout the topic has been the impact of earthquakes on people and the environment and we culminated the half term by designing and building our own models.

The overall winner was Will C (D2) - who successfully managed to use minimum resources to maximum effect; embracing many of the classic design features of such buildings including cross-bracing and a pyramidal design that meant toppling over was not an option during the replicated 30 second earthquake.

Well done to Will.

There were many other interesting and clever designs and Mr Watters and I were extremely impressed with all the hard work and commitment that was dedicated to the task.

The NHS tutor said: "It is always interesting to see which of the 350+ NHS careers really inspire the pupils".


