New Gating System and Access into School

Just a reminder...

From Monday next week, as part of our procedures to ensure the continued safety of all in school, there will be no general vehicle access onto the school grounds.



At the beginning of the school day, pupils can access the school grounds using the pedestrian gates leading onto the yard, through the pedestrian gate opposite the main reception or via the new pedestrian gate leading from the leisure centre car park.

At the end of the school day, pupils can leave the school grounds via these same pedestrian gates.

Pupils arriving by car should be dropped off and enter through any of these pedestrian gates.

Only school buses will have authorised access onto the school grounds.

Pupils, parents and other visitors arriving during school hours will need to press the intercom at the pedestrian gate opposite the main reception for authorised access.

The safety of pupils and staff in school remains paramount and we thank you for your support in ensuring Priory remains a safe and secure site.

Early Opening of Penwortham Bypass and A59 Temporary Closure

A message from the City Deal Infrastructure Delivery Team, Lancashire County Council

The County Council is about to announce the early opening of the new Penwortham bypass, John Horrocks Way. The road is now scheduled to open on Monday, 2 December provided that no unforeseen circumstances prevent this.

Coinciding with the opening, a section of Liverpool Road will close for three weeks, while the final work is carried out on the junction with the new road. This can only be done once John Horrocks Way has opened and traffic levels have reduced along Liverpool Road.

The work will affect vehicles travelling on Liverpool Road between the new bypass and the junction with Howick Cross Lane. There'll be no access during this time onto Howick Cross Lane and Howick Moor Lane from Liverpool Road itself. There will be signed diversions in place for the duration of the closure and the service bus companies and school transport providers are being informed through the relevant County Council service.

Pedestrian and cycle access will still be maintained on the A59 as present using the Northern (Penwortham bound) footway and the signal controlled pedestrian crossing at Howick primary school throughout the temporary closure.

County Lines Workshops

On Monday Lancashire Police's County Lines team will be at Priory to run sessions with Year 7 pupils. Each class will miss one of their usual lessons to attend the workshop instead.

This Monday the following groups are involved in the education sessions: 7E1 7E2 7E3 7W1 7W2.

The aim of the session is to help pupils recognise what being drawn into a County Lines group looks like, strategies to avoid being drawn in, who to alert for themselves and others, the penalties and repercussions for getting involved.

What is county lines? Criminal exploitation is also known as 'county lines' and is when gangs and organised crime networks exploit children to sell drugs. Often these children are made to travel across counties, and they use dedicated mobile phone 'lines' to supply drugs.

The lighting workshop saw students take on the lighting desk, which is no mean feat, and how to operate different lighting states creating mood and atmosphere.

The students that took part in the costume workshop were given a brief that outlined a character within a certain time period. Students needed to research ideas before they were let loose on the costume cupboard!

These workshops have allowed all students to embed and extend their prior learning.

Priory Pupil Has Heart-Felt Support For Charity

Year 8 pupil Connie may need another operation after being born with a hole in her heart – so she is making sure she raises funds for Alder Hey Children's Hospital.

Connie, along with friend Amba, held a cake sale at school as well as selling items from Alder Hey, such as a giant calculator which Headteacher Mr Eastham bought.

"When I was born, I left hospital and everything was ok," said Connie. "However it was my auntie who spotted I wasn't breathing correctly when I was around six months old. I went to Alder Hey and was found to have two holes in my heart. They operated and it was a success. However I have been having regular check-ups and have been told recently I may need another operation.

"Having this hasn't stopped my life. I love horse riding at Eccleston Equestrian Centre although I do think I get a bit of slack in PE if I am struggling to do something!

"Knowing I may have to go back, I decided to fundraise and raise awareness for Alder Hey.

"Amba likes cooking so she baked a cake and we made biscuits and brownies.

"It was well-received and we also sold Alder Hey items; Mr Eastham bought a big calculator as his son was born with a heart condition. We raised £85 in total.





"I want to do more things to raise funds, like a Tough Mudder or something."

Learning Manager Mrs Nayler said: "The girls came to me with their idea to raise funds but, to be honest, they did it all themselves. They asked Mr Eastham permission to use the LEAP room to sell their cakes and I just supervised it all."

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Researchers found that pupils who frequently **THINK** Researchers found that pupils who frequently read newspapers, magazines, comics About *It* and non-fiction books did not achieve significantly higher Pisa* scores in reading than those who did not.

However, pupils who read fiction almost every day scored approximately 26 points more in their reading tests than those who never read such books - the equivalent of around 10

months' additional schooling. according to the Organisation for Economic Co-Operation & Development (OECD).

*PISA is the OECD's Programme for International Student Assessment. Every three years it tests 15-year-old students from all over the world in reading, mathematics and science. The tests are designed to gauge how well the students master key subjects in order to be prepared for real-life situations in the adult world.
