Award Pays Tribute To Former Pupil

Head Girl Sasha was presented with the inaugural Sam Pegram Character and Culture Award.

Sam was a former Priory pupil who was working as a British aid worker when he was tragically killed in an Ethiopian air crash in March this year. His parents were honoured to have an award presented at the school in Sam's name and the first award was given to Sasha.

Character & Culture lessons, through teacher Mrs Hopes, began last school year and are now being implemented in Priory three times a week. The Sam Pegram Award is for a student who had shown LORIC attributes – Leadership, Organisation, Resilience, Initiative and Communication – as part of the PiXL Edge Awards.

Sasha has completed the Apprenticeship PiXL Edge Award, has encouraged her peers to complete it and assists younger pupils with it. She has also demonstrated kindness, a key factor of PiXL Edge, by contributing to Priory's charity collections and bake sales.

- "I was tremendously honoured to be awarded this trophy," said Sasha. "It was a big surprise. I have volunteered at Longton Library and helped to organise a two-day event there called Sense Fest.
- "I have helped and organised charity events at school, I have publicised kindness day, I have gone into primary schools to teach their pupils about history and I have worked both in school and in the community.
- "I have enjoyed working with the younger pupils at Priory. I like to try out different things and the PiXL Edge Award has given me this opportunity."







After months in the planning, the Penwortham Priory Academy Library was officially reopened on Monday.

The school has purchased an abundance of new books, from the latest fiction and non-fiction to poetry and classics. We were also grateful to receive donations from parents too which have supplemented the replenished stock. The dedicated team of librarians have spent many a break and lunchtime sorting, sifting and logging - all to make the reading experience at Priory all the more rich.

At the break-time ceremony, Headteacher Mr Eastham, warmed up the crowd of eager bibliophiles, emphasising the importance of reading regularly, how it improves vocabulary and enriches all academic subjects. The honour of cutting the ribbon was given to Year 10 pupil Cerys S, who was selected as Mrs Gidden's literary trailblazer after reading over 12 million words on the Accelerated Reader programme.

As the ribbon fell, party-poppers flew and the crowds surged forward to grab their books from the towers of colourful shelving.

Any Priory pupil may borrow a book from the library. Once a book has been chosen, take it to the desk to be scanned and date-stamped by one of the Librarians. Pupils can keep the book for as long as they need. When returning books, please make sure it is put on the returns trolley so that we know it is back with us (don't put it on the shelf!).

There is a reconfigured lounge where pupils can gather to discuss their choices or simply to have a comfortable place to enjoy the adventure of their new reading companion.

What's it all about?

Last year we embarked on introducing a new personal development curriculum for pupils, known as Character & Culture, which seeks to develop pupil's character attributes and foster a greater culture of kindness, respect and keeping each other safe.

The school sees great value in the personal development curriculum and in the new school year pupils will have three 20 minute sessions a week to explore and develop their own character and culture.

In character units, pupils will explore character attributes of Leadership, Organisation, Resilience, Initiative and Communication (LORIC) as it is widely acknowledged that these areas not only raise achievement in youngsters but are highly sought after in candidates applying to colleges and places of employment.



All pupils at the school are provided with the opportunity to engage in LORIC activities and receive certification for doing so through the PiXL Edge Award. Past pupils in receipt of the award have included details in college and apprenticeship applications, have been asked to interview and have discussed this achievement further with college staff and employers, who have been impressed that such skills are now formally recognised.

Mrs Hopes, the Leader of Character & Culture, said: "My new role has evolved over the academic year, as we decided as a school, to have a greater focus on developing pupils holistically. We know as educators and parents ourselves that our main role is to ensure pupils leave us achieving their best in academic currency. However, our vision is to ensure that we also develop well-rounded pupils who can go out into the world and make it a positive place".

Mrs Hopes is also Leader of Personal, Social, Health, Education (PSHE) and co-ordinates the curriculum of the five drop-down days. She said: "The

Character & Culture lessons will also include units on Physical and Mental Well-Being, 'Orate' (reading and listening skills), E-safety, and Futures (career pathways), which interlink with our PSHE curriculum, ensuring thorough coverage, foster informed debates and decisions now and in the future.

We are aware the sessions have had immediate impact as we have already heard students debating topics around school which stemmed from the session content".

In the coming year Mrs Hopes is looking to:

Further opportunities in volunteering in the community, create greater links with local cadet groups, provide extra curricular health and wellbeing activities, and to introduce a Mental Health Week to complement last summer's Healthy School Week.



The Head of Maths, Mr Kenrick, will be testing our brain power each week with one of his puzzles.






