A Message From The Headteacher

Dear All,

Usually at this time of year I would contribute to this edition of our Priory newsletter by welcoming you back following our normal Easter break. Yet these are far from normal times and so I simply hope that, at the start of this new summer term, you are all safe and well.

As we start this summer term, a summer term the likes of which we have never experienced before, I am sure each of you will join me in offering our very best wishes in particular to our Year 11 pupils who, rather than preparing to sit their final GCSE examinations in the next few weeks, are preparing themselves instead, to go on to further education, employment or training. "I'm delighted to be returning to a new role, I love the English department at Priory and I'm so thrilled that I will be working alongside Mrs Gidden to continue to make English at Priory the most captivating and inspiring it can possibly be. You Can Still Do **Accelerated Reader**



Mrs Gidden has now written a comprehensive guide in the form of Frequently Asked Questions which should answer everything, as a parent or pupil, you may want to know about Accelerated Reader (AR). This can be downloaded from the school website at >>

We've mentioned it lots of times but what actually is it all about?

At a glance, AR is a computer-based program that schools use to monitor reading practice and progress. It helps teachers guide pupils to books that are on their individual reading levels. After reading a book, pupils take short guizzes to check that they have understood it.

When pupils start on AR they take a STAR test, this determines the types of books that each individual should be reading. Pupils are allocated a colour accordingly to their level and should chose books with a matching coloured label on its spine.

It is recommended that pupils spend between 15-20 minutes per day reading. Doing so can improve creativity, reading age, reading speed, spelling, punctuation, grammar and vocabulary.

The iconic Elizabethan-style playhouse already had its own public streaming platform in the form of Globe Player, but watching it has always come at a fairly steep rate, with productions rented or purchased at individual prices that usually exceed a month's full access to many TV streaming platforms. Now that has changed...

Shakespeare's Globe also plans to make available all 34 productions from its 2012 Globe to Globe series. That's a Korean 'A Midsummer Night's Dream', a Macedonian 'Henry VI Part
