### What can you do?

Reinforce the importance of hobbies, such as to build confidence, learn new skills, help to choose a career, meet new people, disconnect from technology and discover new interests.

#### Mental Health - Time to Talk has been the theme in both the assemblies and the Character & Culture sessions this week throughout all year groups.



The free NHS online counselling and emotional well-being website, 'Kooth', has been introduced to all pupils. The service is funded by the National Lottery and provides free, safe and anonymous online support for young people. Developed especially for children and young people, the platform is accessible through mobile, tablet and desktop.

The site is staffed by a wide variety of qualified counsellors who are available Monday - Fridays 12pm-10pm and Saturday / Sundays 6pm - 10pm. It is available for young people aged 11-25.

#### How does Kooth work?

It's an online counselling service, where you enter the chat waiting room, then you get to chat with a counsellor 1:1, it's set up almost identical to MSN or Facebook chat. You can also use message boards, forums, play games, and set up your own blog page. Kooth counsellors are real-life trained mental health professionals, and have details of their qualifications on their own 'About me' boxes, so you can choose which you think would suit you. Kooth also liaises with mental health services, if you are already seeing a counsellor in real-life, then they may ask permission from your counsellor to work with you.

- You can talk about this independent learning in job interviews and on your university statement

Finance will be covered in PSHE sessions with Year 7s being introduced to this topic in June and Year 11s gaining a deeper understanding in April. Pupils can also access these resources via Doddle, Priory's homework platform.



### **English Literature and Language Revision Guides** (Year 10)

A reminder that English Literature and English Language Revision Guides are available to purchase via school. The guides, endorsed by the examining board AQA, normally retail for £6 each however we have managed to secure these for just £4 each (Literature) and £4.50 each (Language).

The **English Literature** revision guides explain the whole text in a clear and easy to understand way, as well as offering close analysis of certain sections of the text. Pupils will need a maximum of five of these according to their class study:

The English Language revision guide is a comprehensive guide to both English Language papers. All students are studying the same papers and there are no tiers in this subject so one guide covers all.

# The Maths Department Like a challenge?

The Head of Maths, Mr Kenrick, will be testing our brain power each week with one of his puzzles.

Here you will find a puzzle or a problem solving task - these can help to build students' perseverance, mathematical reasoning, ability to apply knowledge creatively in unfamiliar contexts, and confidence in tackling new challenges. Why not have a try yourself!

The Miller took his friends aside and showed them nine sacks of flour that were standing as shown below. "Now, listen all" said he, "while that I do set ye the riddle of the nine sacks of flour. ## **Priory Gardeners Sow The Seeds Of The Past**

## Penwortham Priory Academy pupils are sowing seeds in a new way – making use of abandoned bottles.

Gardener Mr Farron found some old milk bottles in the school archives and has adapted and recycled them for his and the pupils' use.

"All schools tend to have areas where they store things and ours is under our stage," said Mr Farron, who has just helped Priory win two Royal Horticultural Society North West in Bloom Awards for their outstanding gardens.

"The school was built in the 1950s and at that time free milk was given to children.

"I was looking under the stage for some props for the garden and I found the milk bottles covered in dust. They had names on them like Coop and UCP and could hold one-third of a pint of milk.

"The bottles brought back memories for me, being a former milk monitor, and certain older members of staff.



"I decided to make use of them and show the pupils how to recycle them and we have planted bulbs in them and are watching them develop. We have put them in different types of compost and we are logging how they grow over a period of time.

The pupils are interested, they want to know and we are also using the milk bottles to brighten rooms up by putting our home grown flowers in them."

Year 9 pupil Connor said: "I help Mr Farron most mornings and I enjoy working on the gardens."

Megan, Year 8, added: "I enjoy learning about all the different plants and flowers and learning about the environment. Doing things like this, helps us understand the environment more."



# Mrs Gidden's Cool Readers Club

Priory's Head of English, Mrs Gidden, has been really impressed with many of our multi-talented pupils and wanted to highlight their love of reading while excelling at other pursuits.

#### This week we interviewed Year 7 pupil, Lily.
