Year 10 pupil Stephen is determined to work with animals when he is older and Priory allows him to spend a day a week striving to achieve his dream.

Stephen attends Myerscough College every Wednesday to study Agriculture. It's a Level One Certificate & Diploma in Practical Countryside Skills - Agriculture and Countryside.

The course covers large animals, crops, land management and machinery over the two years.

"I really like animals so this is good for me," said Stephen, who also excels at maths at school. "I have four chickens at home and I really want a dog!"

"I like being around animals and going to Myerscough allows me to do this. I work with big farm animals like sheep and cows and it's hard work doing things like checking their feet and cleaning them. They are the same size as me! We work with two farms and so get hands-on experience of life with animals.

"I am not sure I will be a vet when I am older but I watched a programme on RSPCA officers and I may try to go into that."

At Priory we want everyone to achieve their dreams, whatever they may be, and allowing Stephen to do this one day a week is supporting his aspirations.

orders and make cancellations.

VeriCool, the online system which allows parents, pupils and staff to pre-order break and lunchtime food now allows you to view orders after they have been checked out as well as cancel items.

Enabled this week, users can now see everything you have ordered in advance and also remove what you no longer want. Users can cancel orders for after the current day by clicking on the red 'refund' button at the left of each item. Please note that users cannot refund/cancel that day's order so if a child is not in school please email enquiries@priory.lancs.sch.uk before the cut-off time - 9am (break) or 11.10am (lunch) - and we will cancel the order for you.

You'll be pleased to know that you can now access the online portal from most mobile phones and tablets as well as any PC / laptop although you must do this via a web browser until the app becomes available.

John Kirkpatrick Class of 1961

John was one of the first Head Boys at what was then Penwortham Secondary School. Sadly, he passed away in Royal Preston Hospital last month following a short illness.

On leaving school John joined Lancashire constabulary as a police cadet and became a police constable in 1963. In an illustrious career lasting more than 32 years, he retired in 1994 as Chief Superintendent and Divisional Commander of Central Division comprising Preston and South Ribble.

John's grandson, Patrick, attended Priory from 2017-2019 before moving to Scotland. John was very proud that Patrick attended our school and has kept in touch with his Penwortham classmates.

We have found John's name in Priory's first admissions register (see below), starting 1953, and a photo from 1958, when John was on roll at the school.

It's very fulfilling for us to hear of how Priory pupils go on to contribute so much value to the community. We'd like to thank a friend of John's, Mr Jameson, for getting in touch and we pass on our condolences.




Year 11 Maths Interventions - Tuesdays

Noun


1. the act of getting rid of something *e.g. the rubbish was for disposal*

At Penwortham Priory Academy the Learning for Life curriculum is designed to support the promotion of excellence for pupils and do all it can to improve their life chances.


Pupils have two 20 minute Learning for Life lessons each week where they will participate in the curriculum shown opposite.
