Locker Keys Last call for returns

Read for Good Readathon -The Final Story

Priory pupils read everything from recipes to full books in their Read for Good Readathon week before the end of term.

The charity Read for Good encourages children to read, inspiring reluctant readers to give reading a go, and keen readers to read more widely.

Pupils can choose whatever they want to read - from comics to classics and audio books to blogs - they are

not being assessed; it's all about reading for fun.

To motivate them during the week, pupils in Year 7-9 raised money in sponsorship which helps to provide a regular supply of new books and a resident storyteller to every major children's hospital in the UK.

"Read for Good is a charity which buys books for children in hospitals as obviously second hand books can't be used due to infection risks. It also organises for people to go into hospitals and read to the children," said English teacher Mrs Elliott.

With money still coming in, the good news is that we're on track to raise over £800 which is absolutely fantastic, particularly in the current climate.

Mrs Elliott continued, "We are absolutely delighted with the level of response we've received over the last 2-3 weeks, particularly from our Year 7s and 8s and believe it is testament to their kindness and their positive attitude towards reading.

"We just wanted Priory pupils to read whatever they want, from a recipe to a newspaper to a chapter of a book to a whole book, and get sponsored to raise money for Read for Good. It's all about encouraging them to read something they will enjoy and reading for fun, for a good cause."

As well as helping children in hospital and advancing our pupils' reading skills, the school will receive free books worth 20% of our grand sponsorship total – so there really is something in it for everyone!

MEET THE GOVERNOR Alex Saint-Agnan

Community Governor

Governors are volunteers who work together with the executive leaders of the school to set its vision, ethos and strategic direction. They hold the executive leaders to account for the school's educational and financial performance for the good of all pupils



Clerk to the Governors, Mrs Spencer tells us, "Community Governors are invited by the current governors to join the governing body. Community governors bring their own experience and skills, and can act as a link with the community in which the school serves. These governors usually live or work in the community of the school area and are committed to the good government and success of the school."

Here we meet Alex, a community governor who joined Priory's governing board earlier this year after being invited by the Chair, Mr Kevin Burke.



Introducing himself to the Priory community, Alex begins, "For ten years, at an early stage of my life, I dedicated my time to travel around Europe to experience the local culture and learn other languages. I have a passion for English and Italian, French being my mother tongue. I am a passionate linguist and it is now settled in my way of life."

"Since I moved into the UK thirty-one years ago, I put these languages skills at great use. I had the opportunity to work for many British corporations in Global Finance and International Trade Import/Export.

"Today, I provide my services as an International Trade Development and Documentation Officer to the North & Western Lancashire Chamber of Commerce. It is an exciting and busy time for our local exporters as the UK is now independent from Europe.

"My wife has been a MFL secondary school teacher for more than 25 years before she retired. Let's say that I have been groomed into the British education system all that time! I have had a great interest in

modern education for years which has allowed me to assess, make comparison or similarity between different teaching procedures and cultural approaches.

Alex ends with, "As a linguist, I would like to think that I could give to pupils ten strong key reasons and benefits in learning modern foreign languages nowadays. I believe that it would greatly contribute to their personal development, self-confidence which would take them to places that they thought were not possible."



Year 11 Assessments and GCSE Grading

Year 11 pupils will not be sitting GCSE exams this year. Instead, as a school, we will submit Centre Assessed Grades for all GCSE subjects by 18 June 2021.

The Centre Assessed Grades awarded will be an assessment on the standard at which pupils are performing based only on what has been taught over the course. This judgement will be based on a range of evidence relating to the subject content that has been delivered, either in the classroom or via remote learning.



Teachers will use evidence such as work that has already been completed, mock exam results, homework or in-class tests, and the results from the forthcoming assessments in school. The grade awarded will not be based on any one single evidence source.

For GCSE Art & Design, grades will be based on a pupil's portfolio only. For vocational subjects, teachers will have told each class what is required and parents may contact the teacher for further clarification.

Summer Assessments

All pupils in Year 11 will take part in a series of internal assessments throughout April and May. These will all be delivered in a classroom environment but will be under modified exam conditions. The assessments will only form part of the Centre Assessed Grade. Pupils who are entitled to special access arrangements will receive them.
