Water way to end the term!

Geography Field Trips (Years 9 & 10)

Year 9 and Year 10 Geography pupils have had the opportunity to complete the first of their fieldwork skills trips by visiting the Wycoller Beck and investigating river theories studied in class.

The main aims of the visit were to allow pupils to study a river landscape first hand and enable each student to develop skills in measuring, observing and recording how river features change along the long profile of a river.

In class, students have studied the Bradshaw Model of river theory and rather than just accepting what our Geography teachers in school have taught students, they have been given the opportunity to go out and test the theories. The work carried out will greatly enhance their knowledge and understanding of how a river works.

Wycoller Country Park offers the perfect spot for students to carry out a safe and accessible river study, whilst offering beauty in the surroundings. After testing river velocity, width, depth and rock size and shape at two sites along the river, students had a picnic lunch at the beauty spot next to the lake with the cheeky ducks before completing a third comparison site with an ice lolly on the way home!

Mr Watters, Lead Teacher of Geography, commented *"It has been superb to be out of school again after recent events. Students adhered to the strict guidelines we implemented to help safeguard each other.*

She told us: "Books should be like sweets, not Brussel sprouts, books are magic!"

Cressida gave our budding authors some great tips on becoming a writer. They ranged from doing lots of research into topics that might be relevant to your story, to drawing a map of the world you want to create. She also recommended using tiny bits of truth to make stories, characters and settings more real.

English teacher, Mrs Elliott, added, "We were also thrilled when the first question asked to Cressida, from the 100s that were undoubtedly submitted beforehand, was from our school! So lovely to see Cressida Cowell saying "Hi to Penwortham Priory Academy" whilst waving (via Zoom) at our lovely pupils!"

Read for Good is a charity that encourages children to read, inspiring reluctant readers to give reading a go, and keen readers to read more widely. Education Secretary Gavin Williamson has written an open letter to secondary school and college parents and guardians in England to talk about the importance of regular testing when it comes to keeping covid out of the classroom.

The Prime Minister announced on 14 June that step 4 of the roadmap would have to be paused for up to four weeks because of the spread of the new variant.

With the increase in cases with variants of concern, it is important to continue regular testing in order to detect cases of coronavirus, stay ahead of the virus and keep covid out of the classroom.

This means that regular asymptomatic testing for all will continue, and we need you and your children who are in secondary school or college to carry on testing at home, twice a week.

As you know, testing has been playing a vital role in our response to the virus. It is helping to break chains of transmission by identifying asymptomatic positive cases quickly. This means those who test positive can self-isolate, keeping other pupils and students in face-toface education. Reporting all test results, positive or negative, helps the health experts have a clearer picture of any potential outbreaks in different parts of the country.



I want to thank you all for your efforts so far. I know that this has been an enormously challenging time for families, who have faced many pressures over the past 18 months. Your continued support in helping us fight the virus has been vital.

Secondary pupils and college students, households and their bubbles, along with school and college staff have now completed more than 50 million tests since these were introduced back in January. That really is an incredible number and we need you to continue your efforts.

It is wonderful to see so many children back in school and through your actions we can work together to keep everyone safe ensuring we can also keep your children in school with their friends.



NHS Blood and Transplant needs your help. They have an upcoming blood donation session at GHS Cultural Centre, Preston on Wednesday, 30 June, with lots of available appointments. You can book an appointment to donate blood today.

NHS Blood and Transplant are working closely with the rest of the NHS to keep supplying lifesaving blood to hospitals during the coronavirus pandemic and need people to keep donating as normal. They have extra safety

measures in place and every precaution is being taken to eliminate the risk of covid-19 transmission at their blood donation sessions.

Black, Asian and minority ethnic donors are also specifically needed right now, because:

- Some patients who receive frequent blood transfusions need blood to be closely matched to their own
- A number of blood conditions, like sickle cell disease which is treated through blood transfusions, most commonly affect black, Asian and minority ethnic people
- The best match typically comes from blood donors from the same ethnic background

While people from all communities and backgrounds do give blood, fewer than 5% of blood donors who gave blood in the last year were from black, Asian and minority ethnic communities. This is despite BAME communities representing around 14% of the population. NHS Blood and Transplant wants to try and readdress this balance.
