Pupils in Years 7-9 will therefore have lessons and receive homework from their new subject from that date.



Year 7 Pupils Mark Their Lines in Geography

The Year 7 pupils have been using cardboard, wood and paper to make contour models in the annual geography competition.



Lead Teacher for Geography, Mr Watters explained: "Every year at Priory we have a competition across the four houses and in individual classes. It's part of developing their map skills and they make contour models either in class or at home, or both, and try to get the scales and height as accurately as they can.

"It's about creativity and accuracy and they can revisit them in Year 9 and work on them and redevelop them. They will keep adding to them using Ordnance Survey maps and Arc GIS, using satellite images which can be drawn in 3D.

"We have hundreds of entries every year and the pupils enjoy it, planning their models, constructing them, and the best bit... winning prizes!

"It's always extremely difficult to select the winners as it's such a high standard. Pupils tend to use wood, cardboard, paper and fillers and paint them."

One of the winners, Year 7 Jessica, said:

"I made my model with wood and I am proud to win an award for it."



Jasper said: "I enjoyed the challenge of using different colours to show the height."

Caleb added: "It took me around three hours to make mine out of cardboard."

Mr Watters and Head of Humanities, Mr Metcalfe, selected six of the best from each of their Geography classes. The models will be showcased in the department.


Despite all the flour, butter and icing sugar, the group was praised for leaving the room absolutely spotless but, we wonder, how much of their culinary delights actually made it home!



Covid Testing On Return To School In January

All pupils in England must take an LFD test (Lateral Flow Device) in school before returning to classrooms after the Christmas break*.

In order to facilitate this, we will undertake the testing on Wednesday, 5 January, with pupils who test negative returning to school on Thursday, 6 January.

On Wednesday, 5 January the school will not be open for lessons; it will simply be open for pupils to come into school, get tested and go straight home. There will be no live lessons this day as pupils will be coming in and out of school over the course of the day however work will be set on Teams for them to complete.

Any pupil who cannot attend on Wednesday, 5 January will have to complete the test on their first day back in school.



We can only allow those pupils whose parents have previously given consent to be tested. If you haven't previously given permission but would now like your child to be tested, please email Mr Gee at n.gee@priory.lancs.sch.uk with your child's name, year group and date of birth.

*Pupils who have had a positive COVID PCR result in the last 90 days do not need to test and those pupils whose parents have refused permission also do not need to test.



Weds, 5 January Remote Learning Plan

Below sets out the home learning expectations for the first day of the Spring term, following the Christmas break.



On Wednesday, 5 January, pupils will be working on Teams from home apart from a short period of time where they'll come to school to do their lateral flow test.

Pupils are expected to access their year group Team page on Microsoft Teams, open the 'General' tab and then open the folder called '@Work for Wednesday 5th January'.

Once there, complete the English and the Maths tasks first. When these are completed, choose at least two more tasks from the other subjects you would normally have on a Wednesday. You can, by all means, do more however, leave time to come to school and do your lateral flow test too.

Before we break up for the Christmas holidays, you must make sure that your Teams account is working on a device you can use at home. Staff will not be available to reset these on the 5th January for you.

Haniya admits, while she likes non-fiction, she does read 'lighter' novels.



Haniya's favourite subjects at school are English and science.



Checking For Head Lice

Please could parents be reminded to check your children's hair thoroughly and regularly and treat if you find lice. If you're into architecture: Imagine having a bridge built to your design!

It has been nearly three years since the Old Tram Bridge was shut to the public.

The bridge, which spans the River Ribble and links Avenham Park with Penwortham, was closed by Lancashire County Council due to safety concerns.

Now, residents of all ages from Preston and Penwortham are asked to get involved in a competition to design a bridge to replace the one which dates back to 1802.

Former city councillor Daniel Dewhurst, who is leading the campaign, wants Preston City Council to launch a bid for funding from the government's Levelling Up Fund and is now inviting local residents to produce designs for how a new bridge could look.

The competition will be judged by an independent panel and the first prize winner will receive a cash price of £1,000.Other prizes on offer include two-week internships with David Cox Architects and John Bridge Design Studio as well book vouchers for entrants aged under 16.

The competition is closes 31 January, with the winners announced in early February 2022.

Bringing music to your ears at break and lunch

MABAL is music played through the school's tannoy system during break and lunch. Chosen by Mr Taylor, Lead Teacher for Music, this is designed to offer exposure to the curriculum in different ways, and support pupils' appreciation of music.

The focus is on one theme each week across a genre, a country or from history. The theme could also link to the season or an event in school, such as this week's production, Matilda.

Next week it's all about: Christmas

Next week sees the most requested genre, with some suggestions that it should have started just before the clocks went back!

Christmas carols were collected and printed widely by the 19th century and in 1880, it's believed the Christmas carol service was invented in Truro, Cornwall by an Edward White Benson, who later became the Archbishop of Canterbury. Many of today's most popular carols date from the 19th century.

Christmas pop songs have aimed to reach the top spot on the UK Singles Chart on the edition preceding Christmas. These songs develop an association with Christmas or with the Advent season from their chart performance, but the association tends to be shorter-lived than for the more traditional Christmas carols.



Longer-lasting examples include Band Aid's 'Do They Know It's Christmas?', Slade's 'Merry Christmas'. Everybody' and Wham!'s 'Last Christmas'.

Equally, the music producer Phil Spector, has produced some classics by American groups like the Ronettes and the Crystals in the 1960s and 1970s; 'Frosty the Snowman', 'Sleigh Ride' and 'Santa Claus is coming to Town' to name but three.


