What is ER (Everybody Reading)?

What are the school's next steps for whole school reading and literacy?

Twice a week, during Learning for Life, we will be 'Everybody Reading'. Whilst the heartbeat of reading is in the classroom, we want to get everybody reading beyond this too and promote the culture that everybody IS reading and EVERYBODY does read.

We'll either be reading a class novel with a theme or reading an extract of a linked non-fiction. Example themes could be 'others' (focussing on cultures and traditions), 'discrimination' or 'self' (personal identity and growth).

What will my child be reading this term? Is there a film I can enjoy with them?

Year 7 - Once by Maurice Gleitzman: There is no film version that we know of but it's quite like The Boy in

the Striped Pyjamas in content. Expect your child to know about the Holocaust and persecution of Jews during the second World War.

Year 8 - Animal Farm by George Orwell:

Often regarded as a 'modern classic' this is an anthropomorphistic (animals acting like humans) representation of the Russian Revolution. There are several film versions for you to enjoy. Expect your child to be able to compare pigs and cattle to Russian politicians!

Year 9 - Noughts and Crosses by Malorie

Blackman: A book about forbidden love between



a Nought (a lower class white boy) and a rich and high-born Cross. There is no film but the BBC did a highly acclaimed series recently, available on iplayer. Expect your child to know about the challenges and bigotry lovers Callum and Sephy face.

Year 10 - The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night by Mark Haddon: It's a book told from the first person by Christopher Boone, a boy with autism who finds his neighbours dog has been deliberately killed and in the investigation that follows, he uncovers a family secret. There's no film version but a critically acclaimed stage version is touring. Expect your child to know more about Asperger's and Autism as the mystery unfolds.

Take Away food will be brought to your year group dining area for you to collect.

Year 7 - The Hex | Year 8 - The Auditorio | Year 9 Humanities | Year 10 & 11 - Key Stage 4 Dining Room

For Break, choices range from sausage or bacon barms to toast, cereal bars, sandwiches and salad pots, as well as fruit and drinks. **Lunch includes** paninis, burgers, jacket potatoes and various wraps, baguettes, sandwiches and salads.

Eat In food will be served fresh from the Key Stage 3 Dining Room for pupils in Years 7, 8 & 9, and from the Key Stage 4 Dining Room for pupils in Year 10 & 11.

As well as selected items from the Take Away menus,

there is an additional choice of plated hot food at lunch such as pasta, curry, roast dinner, fish and chips, pizza and regular 'specials'.

There's a great choice with weekly menu updates so please log in for a full list and order to either Eat In or Take Away. Vegetarian and gluten-free options also available.



Orders must be placed online before the cut-off time, which is 11.59pm the night before. From Friday evening, if you prefer, you can order in advance for the week ahead.

Pupils who haven't pre-ordered will be able to purchase a sandwich from the main dining rooms as well as pick up drinks, cakes and snacks. No cash is required as fingerprint identification will be used to deduct payment from your account*.

Vending machines are also back in service offering a wide selection of drinks and snacks, including fruit. These can be found in the Auditorio and a fingerprint identification is used to charge your account*.

Pupils who wish to bring in their own food may eat in the main dining rooms or their year group areas. We also have numerous picnic benches scattered around the site.

Breaks & Lunch Time Catering

Did you know...

 That if you have brought a packed lunch or have Take Away food, you can still eat in the dining rooms with your friends that have ordered an Eat In meal. Unfortunately, if you have Eat In food, you must eat your plated meals in the dining rooms.



- You should not order menu items on the days that they are
 - not available. If you do this then we will provide you with an alternative. Unfortunately the system does not currently allow us to close off items for specific days.



Finally, it's all new at the Key Stage 4 dining room so we need to tell you:

- If you have ordered Eat In then please queue on the right side of the barrier towards the till. Go to the till first to collect your order slip, drink and any snack ordered then move to the serving counter to collect your plated food.
- Pupils with Take Away orders should queue on the left side of the barrier to collect your grab bag.
- If you want to buy a drink or snack that is not pre-ordered please queue on the right of the barrier with the Eat In queue and go to the till.

Food Tech Practical Lessons Update (Ingredients)

During Year 7, 8 and 9 pupils will complete a unit of learning in 'Food Preparation and Nutrition'. In the past we have asked pupils to bring in their own ingredients for the practical cookery lessons but from September, we would like to change to a system where school organises all the provisions and pupils bring their finished item home.

The reasons we'd like to do this are:

- · It reduces overall expense of the activities for families
- It reduces the amount of waste
- Lesson starts can be quicker and smoother if staff are not dealing with pupils who have not brought ingredients or not weighed them out in advance, etc.
- · It provides a level of quality control over ingredients
- It provides better consistency of outcome
- It avoids any last-minute stress for families who are asked to provide things at short notice by their child



To enable this to happen, we ask parents/carers to make this payment online via the SCOPAY system to pay for ingredients for the practical lessons.

We anticipate making 5-6 items throughout each carousel including taste testing in school, etc. For this we will
charge the following:Year 7 - $\pounds 6$ Year 8 - $\pounds 7.50$ Year 9 - $\pounds 8.50$

We will alert you when it is time to pay as pupils are on a carousel and may not have their food lessons until later in the school year. If your child is on benefits-related free school meals, you can contact Mrs Cowell, Food Technology teacher, via email at <u>l.cowell@priory.lancs.sch.uk</u> if contributing could pose a problem.

If your child has any dietary requirements or food allergies, these will be catered for. Please make sure we have the most up to date information about this in your child's school records.

Checking For Head Lice
