When the past came back to Priory

It was back to school for Priory's first ever Head Girl and her conclusion on the new-look Priory was 'it's amazing'.

Mrs Sonia Ward (nee Taylor) is now 82 and was invited back to Priory by Principal, Mr Eastham, to have a look around the school, which opened in 1953 with Sonia among the first group of pupils to join.

It's obviously changed structurally since she was Head Girl of Penwortham Secondary Modern in 1955 but Sonia insists the atmosphere and feel of the school is still the same.

"They say your school days are the best of your life and I was happy at Priory," said Sonia. "I cannot see any pupil not being happy here as it's an amazing school."

Sonia laughed as she was shown photographs from her year group and form from her time at Priory. She said: "I was Head Girl and Roy Rich was Head Boy. I have spotted him on some photos Mr Eastham has shown me and I can remember a lot of my classmates when I see their pictures. It's so beautiful to see.

"I don't know how I got the role of Head Girl. I think the headteacher and staff nominated me, but I was honoured to get it. I remember our jobs as prefects was to search the school as pupils then had to leave the buildings at break and dinner and some were always trying to hide indoors from the cold. Our job was to find them! Continued page 3

Be safe in or near water

Water Safety – The situation

With temperatures soaring in the UK over next few days and the summer months ahead, it's important to recognise that UK waters are still cold ... so **the weather might be hot, but the water is not** and this is when we sadly see lives lost through cold water shock. Here the body is unable to adjust quickly enough to the temperature of the water and becomes weak very quickly, which can lead to tragedy.

Water Safety – Know the dangers

 As well as cold water shock there could be hazards underwater - shallow/hidden rocks or debris which could lead to life changing injuries. The water quality
 in many areas, particularly unsupervised places which haven't been risk assessed, is unlikely to be very good quality and could cause life threatening illnesses. Many areas of open water are in remote locations. If help is needed phone signals may be poor and help is likely to take longer to arrive than normal don't take this risk.



Water Safety – Use the water safely

- Stick together and tell someone where you are going. This includes dog walkers, cyclists, joggers and anglers who often do these activities alone and don't intend to go in the water in the first place – Do you know where your loved ones are?
- It is best to only swim in open water as part of an organised group where help will be on hand.
- If someone is in trouble in open water, don't panic as this will quickly reduce strength. Instead try to float on your back like a starfish - float to live.
- If help is needed call 999 and ask for the Fire Service if inland and for the Coastguard if by the sea.

Top Year 7 & 8 Pupils Take **On National Challenge**

Year 8 Daniel M was 'Best in School' at the recent Junior Mathematical Challenge (UKMT) as he collected a Gold Award. **United Kingdom** Mathematics Trust

Around 60 Priory pupils in Years 7 and 8 took part in the hour-long, multiplechoice national challenge.

The problems are designed to make pupils think, encouraging mathematical reasoning, precision of thought and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems.

Maths teacher Mr Hunter said:

"To recognise the highest performers in the Challenge, the top-scoring 50 per cent of participants across the country are awarded with Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates.

"Daniel was our 'Best in School' with a staggering 101 points from the 25 questions while Oliver S was our 'Best in Year 7' and these also received a badge on their certificates to denote this.

"We have six pupils who collected a Silver Certificate -Evie C, Lucy J, Niamh P, Jayden H, Oliver L along with Oliver S.

Many received the Bronze Award and pupils not among the high scorers received a Certificate of Participation.

"There was some outstanding problem solving by our Priory pupils. It's great to have these maths competitions back in school, especially in Key Stage 3."

Daniel said: "I wasn't expecting a Gold Award. I can do maths guite well and I enjoyed the challenge." Evie said: "It was a fairly difficult Challenge with a lot more logic than expected." Lucy said: "As it was multiple choice, a lot of it was a process of elimination." Best in Year 7 Oliver S said: "I am proud to be 'Best in Year 7' and I enjoyed having a go."

Daniel went through to the next round, the 'Junior Kangaroo,' which he sat on Tuesday afternoon. We will receive his results over the coming weeks - good luck Daniel!

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June Update

Priory's gardens are our pride and joy and award-winning gardener Mr Farron wants to let parents and pupils know what to expect each month as the landscape changes.



Now we are into June and the Priory Garden is in full bloom while Phase 2 of the development is underway,

Mr Farron said: "The pupils are starting to appreciate our colourful gardens and I am getting asked lots of questions. I also notice that they are a lot calmer when passing through.

"It's beautiful. We have the poppies appearing, their seeds were brought back from our last visit to Flanders, Belgium, pre-Covid and it's lovely to see them in full bloom. We have the delphiniums and our arches are taking shape now with the Dublin Bay and Schoolgirl (Climbing Roses) all with the added scent of Jasmine.

"The Second Phase of the garden development, the one against the wall, is currently underway with more details below.

"We have planted some shrubs, trees and flowers but it's the scientific bit at the moment – looking at the soil content and so on. My idea is symmetry so that, when the sun comes around, it will hit the roses and create shadows on the wall. It should also create different aromas when you walk past it."

- 1. Leave hedge cutting till the end of the month so wildlife can feel safe.
- 2. When placing support for plants, ALWAYS cover tops of the canes with protective caps.
- 3. Keep dead heading as this produces more energy for the plants and they will continue to bloom much longer.

The memorial garden is also competing with a sense of character, vibrant in colour and with the sweet scent of Jasmine.







22 June marks Windrush Day. Since it was established in 2018, this day is aimed at celebrating our Caribbean community and their contributions to British society.

On 22 June 1949 – 1,027 people arrived from the Caribbean to live in Britain.

After World War 2, Caribbean people who had served in the British armed forces were encouraged to come to Britain and help to rebuild the UK. Many boarded a ship called the HMT Empire Windrush. It is estimated that around 500,000 people living in the UK are part of the Windrush Generation, who arrived between 1948 and 1971.



Almost all the adults who arrived over the number of years had vocations, trades and skills that made them highly employable.

They were nurses, electricians, seamstresses, woodworkers, dressmakers and so much more.

After the Race Relations Act 1968, they were able to find more employment, particularly in London, which had become increasingly diverse, and the economy began to grow once more.







Extra Curricular: Debate Club

Debate Club, led my Miss Ackers, meets every Wednesday lunchtime in HU6 where pupils get to put forward their arguments. The group consider it important that the rest of the school gets to know what they're discussing and hear about their achievements.

Here's what was discussed this week, written by Aisha B, Year 9:

Should we have a universal language?
