Pupils Break The Code in ICT Competition

Pupils at Priory were cracking codes and solving puzzles in their own innovative way as part of a Code Breaking Competition in Computer Science.

Head of Computer Science, Mrs Qadri, set pupils from all years various challenges using Caesar Code (shifting the alphabet forward or back), Pig Pen Cipher (replacing letters of the alphabet with shapes or symbols) and Morse Code (dots and dashes).

They then had to create their own codebreaker and provide its solution which the Year 11s particularly embraced to demonstrate their skills - with Jack K designing his own website!

"The competition was really popular," said Mrs Qadri. "A lot of different year groups took part and it was a bit of fun but also to get the pupils thinking about Computing.

"I was impressed with the Year 11 boys especially as they put a lot of effort into their challenge and took it to another level."

The winner was Year 11 GCSE Computer Science pupil James M who used the Python Code for his challenge.

"I made a script using Python programming language. I enjoyed doing it and I would like to take my Computer Science further, at least to A-Level. I enjoy learning how things work and having the ultimate control."

Year 11 Jack K came second and he built his own website: jackisamazing.uk/ cipher.

"You type in the text you want to encrypt and it applies it with a series of functions and then outputs the encrypted text. To decrypt it you do the same functions in the opposite order.

"I have been working on the website for over a year and it was amazing when it worked.

"I want to go on and do Computer Science at A-Level and maybe at university. I want to be a web designer."



Year 8 Abbie was third after making her own code using all things festive.

"I came up with my own idea for a Christmas code breaker using Christmas symbols. A few of my friends cracked it but I didn't make it too easy."

Year 7 Alan K was joint third: "I broke the code Mrs Qadri set, which was based on school, and that inspired me to do one of my own, which was also about school. I used Morse Code and symbols. I was happy to come third."

Other pupils who took part in the competition said they enjoyed the challenges and love Computing.

Year 10 Megan takes GCSE Computer Science and said: "It's something I enjoy, it's fun. I enjoy coding and the hexadecimal and binary systems. I would like to go to university and study it."

Hannah has been learning about eSafety in Year 7 and said: "It's really important to stay safe on-line so it's been useful."

Year 7 Harriet said: "I want to take Computer Science further as it will help me in the future, as I want to be an engineer."

Year 8 Emily added: "In Year 8 we are learning about programming so I am always learning new things in every lesson. I want to be an Astronaut so it will hopefully come in useful!"

Cricketer, Umar, hits the BBC with Flintoff

Year 11 pupil, Umar, will be featured on your television screens as he shows off his cricketing prowess.

Umar is taking part in a TV programme where he is being coached by former England and Lancashire allrounder Andrew Flintoff, now a presenter.

The programme is a BBC Three series where 'Freddie' Flintoff will put together his own side in a bid to change people's perspective of the sport.

From Preston, the former England international visited under privileged parts of Lancashire to find 11 teenagers for his side who will be called 'Freddie's First Eleven.'

It was for teenagers who had not considered the sport before and challenging the idea that cricket is a game for the posh and privileged.

"I liked watching and playing cricket and I was involved with the BYDS Youth Club in Broadgate and got selected from there," said Umar.

"They said they wanted to do a documentary about cricket and give people like me an opportunity which

I might not otherwise have. It was filmed every Tuesday at Preston College.

"We were trained by Andrew Flintoff, who is really down-to-earth, and Kyle Hogg as well.

"They taught us different types of cricketing skills and it has been really good. I would say now I am a bit of an all-rounder.

"We played a game in the Lake District recently, that was against adults, but the idea is for our team of teenagers to play against league teams made up of people around our own age.

"I have been interviewed a lot for the programme and they have been to my house and interviewed my family as well. I am not sure when it is being released but I am excited."

If Umar doesn't make it in cricket or in the TV world, he has his sights set on helping to change the landscape of places.

"I love Geography and I want to be a Geography teacher and take a PHD and become a professor in Geography. I just enjoy the business side of urbanisation and development."






Sonia Taylor (now

Bringing music to your ears at break and lunch

MABAL is music played through the school's tannoy system during break and lunch. Chosen by Mr Taylor, Lead Teacher for Music, this is designed to offer exposure to the curriculum in different ways, and support pupils' appreciation of music.

The focus is on one theme each week across a genre, a country or from history. The theme could also link to the season or an event in school, such as last month's production, Matilda.

Next week it's all about: Film Music

The composers John Williams and John Barry, and James Bond themes dominate proceedings here. Coverage ranges from 1939 Gone with the Wind, through to films from the present day.

A film score is original music written specifically to accompany a film. The music is usually performed by an ensemble of musicians - an orchestra or band, instrumental soloists, and choir or vocalists. Film scores encompass a wide variety of styles of music, depending on the nature of the films they accompany. The majority of scores are orchestral works and based upon Western classical music, but many scores are also influenced by jazz, rock, pop, blues, new-age and ambient music, and a wide range of world music styles.



More recent films, since the invention of digital technology and audio sampling, have their music created and performed wholly by the composers themselves, by using music composition software, synthesisers, samplers, and MIDI controllers.





Priory's prize winners from our Science Advent Calendar competition!

Each school day in December, pupils had to answer a tricky question.

For Year 7s, 8s and 9s it included providing a key term to questions such as: "A potential source of harm is known as a" "An object that orbits a larger object is known as a..."

Year 11s also took part and had different questions which were set as part of their homework to help with their revision. These encouraged pupils to revise in regular small chunks, rather than last minute cramming, in preparation for their GCSE examinations.





Head of Science Mr Bedford, who had the idea for the concept, said:

"The idea behind the advent calendar is to get Year 11 students into the habit of regular small chunks of revision. Evidence suggests this is far better for long term retention and understanding than a last minute cram over the few days before the exam. It's great to see so many of our Year 11s buying into that, the calibre of entries this year was better than ever before which made it really difficult to pick a winner. Ultimately, I had to short list the best entries in terms of effort and correct answers, then asked our science technician Mr Evans to select four winners at random. Congratulations to the winners, but well done to all of those who submitted their work. Continuing with the approach of a little often will lead to good results in the summer.

Every pupil who completed the calendar received coveted achievement points while there were also extra prizes for the winners.

The Key Stage 3 winners were: Oliver E, Hannah N, Emily J and Charlie M.

They admitted it was a tricky science quiz but they learnt a lot from it.

Oliver said: "Some were quite hard but I got the majority of the answers."

Emily said: "I learnt a number of definitions from it."

Charlie added: "I enjoyed the quiz as



I did it as part of my homework. I knew a lot of them but did need a bit of help on some."

They received a £10 Amazon voucher as well.
