Teacher, Miss Nicholls, is thriving off the creativity and innovative nature of Priory's English Department.

Miss Nicholls was on teacher training last year and admitted it was a strange way to do it as a lot of it was online due to Covid. She impressed everyone and, when a vacancy came up at Priory, she couldn't wait to join Mrs Gidden's team.

"I went to Fulwood Academy so I am local and went to UCLAN to study English Language and Linguistics," said Miss Nicholls.

"I originally wanted to be a journalist as the thought of standing in front of 30 children scared me – but then I realised it shouldn't stop me and I completed my PGCE at Edge Hill University.

"It was strange doing my teacher training online but then I was lucky enough that a job came up at Priory. I love the English Department here, we all work together, everyone cares about the children and the curriculum and it's innovative. We are always looking to update the curriculum every year.

"I like the fact I can be theatrical when I am reading. I like the drama of it all and the pupils do sometimes wonder what I am doing! I enjoy being creative and making lessons fun but interesting. I have come a long way from being scared of standing in front of 30 children!"

Head of English, Mrs Gidden, said: "Miss Nicholls trained online with us and it was great when we finally got the chance to meet her in the flesh, she is amazing! She shadowed Mrs Elliott last year and the children fell in love with her.

"Mr Faulkner's change of role meant there was a vacancy and we love having her in our department. She is fiercely independent, she fits in with us, is dedicated and good fun. I think the English Department is now the strongest it has been in my four years in the job."

The event involved all top runners from the ten schools across the South Ribble Borough with over 80 runners per race.

Being unable to hold the event last year due to Covid, the atmosphere was an energetic one, with perfect running conditions and the weather on our side!

The Year 10 and 11 Boys kicked off the event with a very successful run from Jack G (Year 10) and Jack T (Year 10) who came in 9th and 10th place respectively, qualifying to the next stage, and fellow team mate, Connor M (Year 10) who narrowly missed out in a very respectable 12th.

Class of 2020 pupil, Libby Taylor, admitted she almost quit synchronised swimming – but now she has received a call up to the GB World and European squad.

Libby left Priory two years ago but said the teachers at Priory, especially Head of PE & Sport, Mr Bullock, and Head of House, Mrs Bullock, helped her to continue her sport.

"I have competed in synchronised swimming since I was eight but practised since I was six," said Libby, 17, who is a member of Salford Synchronised Swimming Club.

"I have been part of the GB youth squad and travelled to Slovakia but I was finding it hard during Year 11 at Priory and almost quit. The teachers here were very good at keeping me focused and then we had lockdown and, to be honest, I got bored and realised I needed a focus. It helped me re-find my love of synchronised swimming.

"I attended tough four-day trials at Bristol, which is the centre of synchronised swimming. It was gruelling with land-based tests such as pressups and pull-ups and then swimming lengths of fly and front crawl. I think about 60 people applied for the trials and had to send a video in. They invited 35 to the trials and then five were selected there for the GB squad. I got an email and I could see I was one of the five and was so pleased.

"I do love synchronised swimming. I watched the

finals at the Tokyo Olympics and it was amazing. It has become more of a theatrical show since I started doing it.

"I would love to take part in the Olympics but I am taking it one step at a time at the moment. I am taking A-Levels in Business, PE and History at Runshaw College and then there are programmes at Bath and Bristol University, which include training for the Olympics. I will see how the next year goes before I make any decisions."

Mrs Bullock said: "It's amazing to have a GB competitor from Priory and we are so proud of Libby. When she was at Priory, we helped her all we could to pursue her sport as a lot of her training was at 4am in the morning. Saying that, she was never late for school and always set a strong example.

"She did find it hard in Year 10 and 11 as she tried to balance her sport with studying and other distractions of teenage life. We noticed she wasn't as bubbly and we could see it was affecting her so we made sure we offered encouragement and praise and any help we could. Thankfully she didn't quit and all her hard work, determination and perseverance has paid off with her first call-up to the GB squad.

"At Priory, we make sure we support excellence and encourage the individual talents of our pupils and it's lovely to see them get their rewards."

As yet, the venue for the World and European Championships haven't been decided but Libby will now attend training camps.







A tree has been planted in the Priory garden in memory of former teacher, Jean Wragg.





Mrs Wragg was an English teacher and Head of Year from the 1970s to early 1990s. When she passed away, aged 82 earlier this year, the family asked friends and family to donate to a memorial fund in her name with the intention of making a bequest to the school she enjoyed a long association with.

Since receiving the bequest, an all-weather Magnolia tree has now been planted and there is a bench in her name as well as an annual award. The Jean Wragg 'Strive for the Highest' Award will be given to a Year 11 leaver each year who has demonstrated a sustained aspiration to achieve the highest goals in learning and life skills.

Jean's husband Michael said: "Jean had a particular fondness for the Magnolia tree - especially the one with

cream flowers." With family links to Australia, Jean also loved the Jacaranda tree but they won't grow in the UK so a miniature 10ft Sorbus (Joseph Rock) has been planted which will provide plenty of colour in the autumn and attract wildlife. Jean's plaque will be placed by the tree.

Priory's gardener, Mr Farron said: "The Magnolia tree is an evergreen, it won't shed its leaves and it will give off a beautiful aroma with fantastic cream and white flowers. It will flower from March until June and it's a beautiful memorial to Mrs Wragg."

This is all part of the on-going refurbishment and fundraising programme at Priory, with the aim to develop and enhance its facilities, both indoor and out, to enrich learning and teaching.

It's part of Priory's vision: 'Creating inspiring learning spaces and experiences for our current and future generations of pupils.'

The Priory Garden is the project for 2021-22, to create an outdoor environment which can be used all year round.

The gardens have already won Penwortham, South Ribble and North West in Bloom awards. Now the aim is to create an all-weather space of serenity and calm for pupils to unwind, reflect, read and chat with friends. Plans include all-weather seating, a water feature and paved walkways.



"We want the gardens to be pupil-friendly," said Mr Farron. "It will be an area of serenity where pupils can sit and read or even have classes there. We are already putting some benches in place for this.

"I have drawn up plans which we will do in phases, depending on our fundraising. Gardening is a hobby I am very passionate about, and the idea is to create a garden each season so it's an ever-changing panorama and atmosphere.

"Whatever funds we can raise will be well-used and much appreciated."

Bringing music to your ears at break and lunch

MABAL is music played through the school's tannoy system during break and lunch. Chosen by Mr Taylor, Lead Teacher for Music, this is designed to offer exposure to the curriculum in different ways, and support pupils' appreciation of music.

The focus is on one theme each week across a genre, a country or from history. The theme could also link to the season or an event in school, such as the upcoming production, Matilda.

Next week it's all about: Legends - four legendary performers...

The quartet runs in order of 1950's, 1960's, 1970's, 1980's - Elvis, The Beatles, The Bee Gees, Michael Jackson.

Much of these four artists' music centres around a 'feel good' vibe. With two solo acts and two groups, the main genres here are rock 'n' roll, disco and funk. The Beatles are famous for being more eclectic in their style and make use of classical instruments in their pop music. Examples here are 'Eleanor Rigby', the 'cello and 'When I'm 64', which uses the clarinet.

Significant achievements for this quartet include:

- Elvis' songs spent a world record 1155 weeks in the UK charts.
- The Beatles' song 'Yesterday' is the most covered in pop music history, having been arranged 1600 times by artists ranging from Frank Sinatra to the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra.
- As well as being performers, the Bee Gees, from the Isle of Man, were talented composers and wrote famous songs for other artists as 'Islands in the Stream' for Dolly Parton and Kenny Rogers and 'Chain Reaction' for Diana Ross.
- Two Michael Jackson albums, 'Thriller' and 'Bad', are the two highest selling for a male artist in UK chart history.
