Languages Department is Buzzing about Spelling

Year 7 pupils are extending their French vocabulary thanks to a Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) Spelling Bee national competition.

The organisers of the MFL Spelling Bee competition have selected 200 words which are the most frequently used and important words in the French language. According to research, a vocabulary of 2000 words is vital for MFL proficiency and accuracy in spelling is equally important as there is emphasis on this in the new GCSE exams.

The first stage of the competition was completed before Christmas with the top three from each class going through to the second stage to be held in school before February half-term.

Finley is one of the pupils who is through to the second stage and said the competition had helped him: "It has helped me learn new French words that I could use if I was in France, it's increased my vocabulary."

Josh said: "If I go abroad, it will help me talk to people and help them understand me if I need help. I have enjoyed learning new words."

Sehr said: "This has exposed me to a new culture and different words and people and how they speak. I have learnt a lot of new vocabulary. I am competitive so I enjoy competitions. I want to go to France and work so this is important to me."

Many of our children spend time online via gaming or social media and it is important as role models that we educate them of the dangers and recognising the signs of grooming."




Here's why Yaseen and Eden love Maths:

Eden...


I love Maths because I think that I am very good and I enjoy it when I get a very difficult question correct. Maths is by far my favourite lesson because although I am very good at it, when I


The diversity of French music can be attributed to the fact that it has incorporated sounds and beats from many




other countries and people. It is not unusual to hear American, Asian, Latin American, or African influences when you listen to French music.

Every week, Miss Thornton, ventures out of the classroom to chat with our pupils and find out what they've really enjoyed the most about their learning this week.

Here's what they said:

Year 10 pupil, speaking about his Drama lesson with Miss Beesley...

"I'm really enjoying the musical we are studying at the moment. It's called 'Everybody's Talking About Jamie' and its about a gay 16 year old boy who wants to become a drag queen. I like it because its about wanting to be who you want to be without the judgement of others".

Year 10 pupil, speaking about his Geography lesson with Mr Metcalfe...
