Year 8 Go Back In Time For History Trip

Over the past week, two groups of Year 8 students had the opportunity to visit Quarry Bank Mill, a working cotton mill in Styal, to see what life would have been like in Industrial Britain. The mill is a rare surviving eighteenth-century cotton mill, built by the industrialist Samuel Greg, and showcases working heritage machinery.

History teacher, Miss Ackers, who led the trips, said, "Our pupils were able to tour the Apprentice House to see how the children lived. Up to 90 children were housed there back then, working 10-hour days in the mill. Pupils then walked into the village to see where the adults would have lived. They watched the cotton machines working up close and personal - it was extremely loud, those poor workers' ears!"

As part of the visit, pupils enjoyed being given their own cotton fibres to mould and play with to test its strength. They were also challenged to do the jobs that the apprentice children would have done such as carrying cannisters full of cotton back and forth (they made it into a relay game!) and removing empty bobbins before replacing them with new ones. Finally, the students were able to have a go at scavenging (picking up the stray bits of cotton) - it was tiring work!

Miss Ackers summed up the trip: "The students seemed to really enjoy themselves and we were glad that we could provide such an interesting experience to enrich their learning and inspire a love of History."


challenges to complete on the sheet, each one with an increasing difficulty. When you've had a go at them, pop

Year 8 Trip To Quarry Bank Mill

Quarry Bank Mill is one of the best preserved textile factories of the Industrial Revolution. Built in 1784, the cotton mill is recorded in the National Heritage List for England as a designated Grade II listed building.



The mill was established by Samuel Greg, and was notable for innovations both in machinery and also in its approach to labour relations, the latter largely as a result of the work of Greg's wife, Hannah Lightbody. The family took a somewhat paternalistic attitude toward the workers, providing medical care for all and limited education to the children, but all laboured roughly 72 hours per week until 1847

when a new law shortened the hours. Greg also built housing for his workers, in a large community now known as Styal Estate.

What is Pi?

The ratio of a circle's circumference to its diameter is always the same: 3.14159... and on and on forever.


Pi is an irrational number, which means that it is a real number that cannot be expressed by a simple fraction. That's because Pi is what mathematicians call an 'infinite decimal' — after the decimal point, the digits go on forever and ever so we'll never figure out its exact value no matter how close we seem to get.


The record for memorising digits of π , certified by Guinness World Records, is 70,000 digits, recited in India by Rajveer Meena in 9 hours and 27 minutes on 21 March 2015. In 2006. Akira Haraguchi, a retired Japanese engineer, claimed to have recited 100,000 decimal places, but the claim was not verified.



Top Maths Pupils Take on National Challenge



Lucas was best at Priory in the UKMT Intermediate Maths Challenge, a national test for high achieving Year 9, 10 and 11 maths pupils.

Lucas achieved a staggering 92 out of the 135 points on offer to be awarded a gold certificate and the honour of being the best at Priory.



Year 11 Lucas said: "I enjoyed the challenge. Computer Science is my favourite subject but I enjoy maths and want to go to LUSoM (Lancaster University School of Mathematics). I enjoyed testing myself and was happy to do well."

Year 10 Sam was second with 81/135 and was presented with a gold award while Year 9 Daniel finished third and was awarded the silver certificate with 70/135 points.

Year 9 Daniel said: "I was third best in the school and best in my year."

Year 10 Emmie earned a silver certificate and had a ploy:



"There are questions where you lose marks so I concentrated on all the questions where you can't lose marks!"

Year 11 Taylor added: "It is about problem solving and it is quite difficult. There are 25 questions and you can lose marks as well as gain them. I like maths so I enjoyed this."

Maths teacher, Mr Hunter, oversaw the challenge and said: "We picked the top 30 from Years 9-11 and they loved the extra challenge of it. All pupils that take part get a certificate – whether it's gold, silver, bronze or for participating. It's a massive achievement just to take part."

Well done to all our pupils who participated in the challenge, including Madoc D (Year 11) who was in fourth place, Preston McM (Year 10) who came fifth, both not pictured.

Happy Holi Wishes



Many of our Hindu pupils have been celebrating Holi this week, also known as the Festival of Colours.

With the throwing of coloured powder and water balloons, Holi has become known as India's most vivid, joyous festival. Although this Hindu festival finds its origins in South Asia, it has now gained popularity across the world, with Holi events organised across the UK, the USA and elsewhere.





So what's one of the most popular

and significant festivals in the Hindu calendar all about?

The Festival of Colour

Holi has been celebrated across India for centuries, with poems documenting celebrations dating back to the 4th century. It marks the beginning of spring after a long winter, symbolic of the triumph of good over evil. It is celebrated in March, corresponding to the Hindu calendar month of Phalguna. In 2023, Holi began on Wednesday, 8 March.

Holi is a two-day Hindu festival. On the first day, people will gather around a bonfire and celebrate good triumphing over evil. But it's the second day that most people will recognise - that's when perfumed powder called gulal is pelted at everyone and made to stick with water pistols and balloons.

There are lots of Hindu legends that are believed to contribute to the meaning of the festival, but there are two in particular that are thought to be the most popular - each one celebrated over the two day period.



Holika and Hiranyakashipu

According to one popular version of the story, an evil king, Hiranyakashipu, became so powerful that he forced his subjects to worship him as their god. But to the king's ire, his son Prahlada continued to be an ardent devotee of the Hindu deity Lord Vishnu. The angry king plotted with his sister, Holika, to kill his son. Holika, who was



immune to fire, tricked Prahlada to sit in a pyre with her. When the pyre was lit, the boy's devotion to Lord Vishnu helped him walk away unscathed while Holika, from whom the festival derives its name, was burned to death despite her immunity.

Gulal Powder

Gulal powder comes in many colours and some are thought to signify specific things:

Red = Love and fertility

Blue = Krishna

Yellow = Turmeric (a spice used in lots of

Indian food)

Green = Spring and new beginnings

Together these colours create a glorious rainbow, usually in parks and public spaces across the globe.



It challenges my brain to learn and it helps me to concentrate and, as well as this, it is really fun having you (Mr Henshaw) as a teacher.


Thomas...
