Sparx Fly in the Maths Department

Priory pupils are combining their love of maths and their competitive spirit in a new online maths programme called Sparx, which Mr Kenrick has introduced into the school.

Head of Maths, Mr Kenrick explained: "It's a website which sets bespoke homework for each child and it sets additional homework where they can move up levels. There is a rewards system where pupils get a badge and it encourages them to climb the levels.

"Our pupils use it and then, after about six weeks, it sets an algorithm for each pupil as it gets to know what stage they are at.

"Pupils are working really hard on it and, if they can't solve a problem, they can get additional video help through Teams or through the Sparx Maths Club.

"We have noticed that it motivates pupils to complete levels. It's a national programme so there is a national leaderboard as well. We also have a Sparx Homework Club every Monday and Thursday after school."

Year 8 pupil Skye said: "You have compulsory homework based on the topics you are studying, which for me is line graphs at the moment. Then you can do extra, which is called XP Boost and that's when you get points and can climb levels.


Bring your used batteries to school and pass them to your Learning for Life teacher.











Batteries: A Matter of Fact

- Did you know, each year we throw away approximately 600 million batteries?
- More than 20,000 tonnes of batteries end up in landfill sites – that's as heavy as 4,000 elephants!
- It can take 100 years for a battery to decompose
- The chemicals in the battery can pollute the soil and water, which animals and plants need to survive.
- 400 million batteries are currently recycled each year. But that is just a small fraction of the batteries that are sold in shops.





It was a busy half term for the ICT & Computer Science department with three exciting enrichment events for our pupils. From a CyberFirst Empower event promoting STEM Careers for Year 8 girls to a 3D Design workshop for our Year 10s at Runshaw College. This week we highlight a STEM career talk for Year 9s.



Before the Christmas break, Year 9 girls attended an engaging and interactive workshop which focussed on careers in STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths). Previously the girls had been involved in a 3D printing event at the end of Year 8 and we aimed to build upon that and introduce them to two women who have successful careers in the sector.

Head of ICT, Mrs Qadri, said, "By introducing girls to STEM careers in Year 8 and 9, this will hopefully inspire them to start thinking about which options to choose for GCSE and the different careers opportunities they can lead to."

The session was led by Jenny Allton-Twist who is a Software Engineer at Brandwatch.com (a social listening company) and also Colette Weston who is Head of Scoping at PenTestPartners who test security on different devices and organisations.

The girls had to complete various group activities involving skills such as Organisation, Creative Thinking, Communication, Teamwork, Timekeeping, Problem Solving, Leadership and Negotiation.

Pupils looked into the many and varied careers including 3D Printing Technician, Cyber Security Programmer, Computer Games Tester, Robotics Engineer, Social Media Manager, Data Scientist, Vlogger, Web Designer, Digital Librarian, Computer Programmer and Forensic Computer Analyst. They also learnt that many of them would be doing jobs in the future that currently don't exist as technology advances at a very fast pace.

DID YOU KNOW?

The girls took part in a quiz where they discovered that...

- Only 14% of ICT professionals are female
- 1.5 million more ICT professionals will be needed in the UK by 2026
- 90% of the world's data was created in the last 2 years
- 65% of school aged children will be doing a job that doesn't yet exist



















This term, we are upping the ante with Bedrock!

Each student will now be expected to achieve a minimum of 20 points per week rather than the original two lessons - this will give them much more scope to learn more and take ownership over their learning each week.

We have also added an element of competition as each class has leaderboards which pupils compete to get to the top of as well as a half termly whole year group leaderboard. To land themselves a place they need to be the most engaged, having the most points or spending the most time on the Bedrock platform. Last half term winners included Daniel McC in Year 9 who managed to get onto each leaderboard as well as Ellis T and Sehr A who also smashed it for Year 8. We will be publishing this term's winners after the February half term break. Good luck to everyone!

Parents: We need your support

In addition to this we really want to push our parental engagement. So far only a third of our parents have set up their Bedrock guardian account and logged on and we would love to get every parent there by February half term. You should have received a letter from us before Christmas with instructions on how to do it.

As your child progresses through the curriculum, they will study hundreds of words, whilst reading fiction and non-fiction texts regularly. As their guardian, you can see their knowledge organiser, and you will receive weekly progress reports on your child's progress via email once you've created your account.

Giving you access as guardians will benefit your child because you will see the vocabulary and level of challenge expected of your child, and you can check and encourage them to do the appropriate amount of work on the platform.

To create your Bedrock Guardian Account:

Step 1: Visit app.bedrocklearning.org

Click on the Guardian Sign Up button at Step 2: the top right

Step 3: Click the School Access Code button. Enter your details along with the code (see letter you were given before Christmas) which is different for each account so please enter this carefully. Click Register.

Check your email for your password, and Step 4: then log in. Be sure to check your junk folder if no email arrives.

Your child has their own, separate log in details with which to log in and complete the work, which they must do unaided.



Bedrock is an interactive online vocabularv curriculum. Its objective to introduce pupils

to a wide range of Tier 2 vocabulary at a pace they can cope with.

With Bedrock, pupils have to read quite substantial texts; key vocabulary will be highlighted and its meaning explained. The words are then used in different contexts so it develops an understanding of the new vocabulary. Pupils start with an Alpha test which ascertains the appropriate reading 'block' for that pupil. They then complete a pre- and post-block test to allow both the pupils and the teachers to see how much improvement in their vocabulary they've achieved.

Next week we'll explore how to view your child's progress in the platform.
