### When The Universe Came To Priory



It is thanks to one of our Year 10 astronomy pupils that we discovered the universe could come to Priory.

After sending Astronomy Club teacher and Science Technician, Mr Evans, details about the touring planetarium, Lancaster University's inflatable dome was booked to come to Priory. In addition, the Science department leaders also decided to extend the visit and open it up to keen Year 7 and 8 pupils who put their name forward to experience the concept.

The LUniverse mobile planetarium, is an exciting educational resource that uses state-of-the-art equipment to present an immersive journey through astrophysics and space. Pupils are taken on a tour of the night sky, view other planets and galaxies up close, visit astronomical telescopes around the globe, land on the surface of other worlds, or view a solar eclipse.

Mr Evans said, "I originally booked them for just my after school Year 10 astronomy group but Mr Bedford and Miss Nouraghaeii thought it would be a good opportunity to inspire more students."

Explaining what it is all about, Mr Evans went on to say, "It's an inflatable planetarium that you can stand inside and images are projected onto its ceiling.

Staff and students from the university also do a 30-minute talk about the celestial objects that are shown in the planetarium."

"I really enjoyed learning about different planets, and that they also included Pluto and the dwarf planets" said Sam D, Year 8.

"It was a good experience and I liked the feeling of travelling around space" said Cameron B, Year 8.

Jessica, who won a £15 Amazon voucher, said: "It's good to see it in print. It took me around a day to design it."


Year 9 Jane came second, winning a £10 Amazon voucher, with her snow globe design and this is on the back of the card.


Jane said: "I wanted to enter and had some ideas and eventually went for the snow globe. It's exciting to see it on the back of the card."

### Christmas in Other Cultures

We have approximately 15 – 20 different ethnicities at Priory. Mrs Qadri asked some of them how they celebrate Christmas.

"This year for Christmas I am going to Bulgaria to celebrate with my extended family. We have a family tradition where all the cousins, aunties, uncles, grandparents and everyone we are related to all get together in my grandparent's big mansion.

"To get to Bulgaria we are going to drive there as I want to be able to take my dog too. We are going to drive through nine different countries and seeing the sites along the way.

"We will be eating Salata de Boeuf. It is a traditional salad made for Easter, Christmas and New Year's Eve. It can be served as a side dish, or a meal on its own. You can make it with beef, turkey or chicken, potatoes, peas and lots of mayo. It's like a potato salad gone wild!"

"Instead of having a big turkey we have Surmale which is like lettuce leaves rolled up with meat inside. We usually eat it with lots of yoghurt."

"Every Christmas my whole family give presents to everyone, even if the present is small we appreciate it."

"My family has a tradition on Christmas to visit my grandma's house on Boxing Day and meet up with everyone on my mum's side of the family. We all bring a present and then pick a card to decide who gets what present. We then have a chance to steal/

take each other's present if we like it better than the one we got.


We all bring some food from each of our houses to share with each other." "On Christmas I see my nan for about two hours and then we go and see my other nan. I then go to the stables and make sure the horses are fed and then we go home and have our Christmas dinner which is turkey. In the afternoon we have a big Christmas dinner with all the family. We then have a buffet in the evening whilst we are watching Christmas movies.

"We also video call my family who live in another country so that we can still celebrate Christmas with them."

"I don't really celebrate Christmas as it isn't part of my religion but as everyone is on holiday we all get together on or around Christmas Day and have a big family meal.

"We don't really eat turkey but we make a big roast leg of lamb with lots of vegetables and other side dishes. We all like to have a get together and play lots of party games."

During Break on Thursday, Mrs Qadri organised a food stall where food from other cultures was available for pupils to buy and try including Samosas, Onion Bhajis, Cupcakes, Swedish Coffee Cake, Biscuits.









### **Winter Update**

Priory's gardens are our pride and joy and award-winning gardener Mr Farron wants to let parents and pupils know what to expect each month as the landscape changes.



### "Adeste fidelis laeti triumphantes" Season's Greetings Fellow Composters

The grounds around Priory continue to look treemendous thanks to our gardener Mr Farron and his helpful assistant Nathaniel.

Mr Farron was given a few hundred trees from the Woodland Trust. the

second time the school has had a donation.

He has been extremely busy designing and

planting tree saplings of various types kindly donated by the Trust – just over 100 trees including Silver Birch, Crab Apple, Rowen, Wild Cherry, Elder and Hazel, all mixed into two new small, wooded areas, east and west within the school grounds

"We want to create small woodlands," said Mr Farron. "We have started on the east side and planted 100 trees and then will plant the same on the west side. They are saplings and it will probably be around two years before we see a difference.

"The interesting thing is that in the areas we have been digging there is natural clay but there is also clay which was dumped from Preston Docks which is around 200 years old!"

Year 8 Nathaniel said: "We have been planting trees in the morning, around 8am, just before school. I enjoy helping Mr Farron and I have learnt a lot."

Mr Farron continued, "This most definitely will encourage wildlife, not forgetting staff and students as well. Here's looking forward to Spring!"

#### **Advice for the Season**

From a creative point of view, when winter-walking through established woodland, there will always be fallen branches that can be recovered and used as winter decorations once brushed down, dried and sprayed with silver or gold, then decorated. Try it, it's good fun!

Now is the time to tidy and prune, especially roses, making sure all leaves are collected and burned as blackspot has spoiled the appearance. Also spray with fungicide, based on Benomy-Buprimate / triforine, and then again in Spring.

There is still time to plant bulbs, preferably in pots, so go for a mixed selection and remember spring is the next one up.

Father Christmas knows well what to place within my stocking. I look forward each year to a fresh supply of exotic seeds and gardening books. These keep me busy in mid-winter with the colourful results to come.

So I would like to wish you all a happy nativitus. Keep blooming and smiling.




