New Catering System At Priory

In partnership with BlueRunner Solutions, we are pleased to announce that we will be moving to a new catering system from Tuesday, 1 November 2022.

Essentially, the new system will allow pupils to continue to purchase freshly prepared food and drink in the dining rooms as well as pre-order cold food online, as they do now. The facility to do this, however, will change from fingerprint recognition to an ID card scanner and the link to the online ordering site will change to the new provider's, BlueRunner. ID cards will be issued to all pupils on return from the half term break.

Business Manager, Mrs Barker said, "What's great about the new system is that parents and pupils can each have an account, and families with multiple children at Priory can have one account with all children linked. So, parents can place an order for their children and monitor transactions, or pupils can order for themselves. The new system will also speed up the queues in the dining rooms."

Parents and pupils should have now received full details and we are asking all parents and pupils to register on the new system in advance of the online ordering going live.

To allow for staff training on the new system, there will be no food available at break or lunchtime on Monday, 31 October, the first day back after half term. Every week, the English department looks for its 'Scholar of the Week'. To get nominated by a staff member is pretty prestigious given we see everyone in school for 5 hours a week!


Pupils who stand out in their effort, attitude to learning or presentation will make the cut. Then, the team choose the very best piece of work and photograph it.

"I like a mixture of books. I like serious ones, fantasy books and funny ones as well."


In school, Finley enjoys PE, Geography and English.


Work Of The Week

This unfortunately means that most of the data published on the official compare school performance is incorrect. This data will be corrected in February.


In the meantime the tables and graphs below show the correct headline data.

This score shows how much progress pupils at this school made across eight qualifications between the end of Key Stage 2 and the end of Key Stage 4, compared to other similar pupils nationally.


The local authority (Lancashire) average score for state-funded schools is -0.13

The average score for all state-funded schools in England is -0.03




Entering EBacc ppen


Staying in education or entering employment

Diwali

Over the coming days, many of our families will be celebrating Diwali. Diwali is the five-day Festival of Lights, celebrated



by millions of Hindus, Sikhs and Jains across the world. Diwali symbolises new beginnings, and the triumph of good over evil and light over darkness.

When is Diwali?

Diwali is a five-day event beginning on Saturday, 22 October, with Dhanteras, but the main day is on Monday, 24 October.



Where does the word Diwali come from?

Diwali comes from the Sanskrit word deepavali, meaning 'rows of lighted lamps'. Houses, shops and public places are decorated with small oil lamps called diyas. People also enjoy fireworks and sweets too, so it's really popular with children.

Traditions

- Many lights and oil lamps are lit on the streets and in houses
- People visit their relatives and have feasts
- Fireworks and festivities are an essential part of the occasion
- Lakshmi, the Hindu goddess of wealth, is worshipped as the bringer of blessings for the new year

Head of ICT, Mrs Qadri, asked some of our pupils how they celebrate Diwali.

Dev G, Year 8, said, "We light candles around our house and make some food like Sev which is like Bombay mix and we have some sweet foods. We also go to the temple to pray and light fireworks and even family members can come. You can't eat meat or chicken or pork or beef but you can have fish and veg so we make lots of vegetarian food."

"We also make rangoli designs like a lotus. Rangoli is basically coloured powder and sometimes there can be a competition." Shivam Y, Year 7, said, "On Diwali, we celebrate how the Hindu god Ram comes home with Sita. I celebrate the first 3 days of Diwali. On Diwali we eat lots of sweets called mitai and celebrate by lighting our house top to bottom with lights."

Saachi R, Year 7, said, "Diwali honours the Hindu goddess of wealth, Lakshmi. The lights and lamps are said to help Lakshmi find her way into peoples' homes, bringing prosperity in the year to come!

"Rangoli is a popular Diwali tradition — beautiful patterns made using colourful powders and flowers. People draw rangoli on the floor by the entrance of their homes to welcome the gods and bring good luck!

"On Diwali we dress up in colourful traditional clothing, we light the inside and outside of homes with rows of lamps or other lights, and fireworks. We also go to worship at the temple and have a large traditional feast, and a gift exchange."

Apprenticeship Myths

"Apprenticeships are for those who do not perform academically."

FALSE - They are a fantastic opportunity for all kinds of people looking to expand their knowledge and upgrade their skill sets, by getting stuck right into a job.

"Apprenticeships are only for manual trade jobs."

FALSE - This is not entirely true, although there may be a wide range of apprenticeships in construction, engineering, IT services, which are very hands-on, there are also a vast choice of vocational trades such as law, fashion, media.

"Apprentices have no scope for progression."

FALSE - Approximately 65% of apprentices are hired on a permanent basis by their current employer after their programme has finished and a third who remain in the same company receive a promotion in their first year.

"Apprenticeships are only for entry level or low level workers."

FALSE - Whilst there are apprenticeships at lower levels, there are also a wide range of higher level and degree level apprenticeships. There is something for everyone.

"University graduates earn more than apprentices."

FALSE - There is a common misconception among young people (and parents) that university will set them up to earn more in the future. By the time a graduate has just qualified, an apprentice will have completed their End Point Assessment and will already have a year or two experience in the industry putting them ahead of fellow university graduates.
