## Year 7 Head To University For Maths Lesson

Assistant Head of Maths Mr Henshaw delivered a lesson at the prestigious Lancaster University School of Mathematics (LUSoM) to Priory's Year 7s which earned glowing reviews.

Mr Henshaw was appointed as the Assistant Maths Hub Lead for Abacus North West, one of 40 maths hubs around the UK, in September which works alongside his role at Priory.

The Hub seeks to harness all maths leadership and expertise within an area, to develop and spread excellent practice, for the benefit of all. One way to do this was for Abacus North West, which includes primary, secondary and college local leaders of maths education (LLME), to work together to produce a lesson, the first exploring algebraic expressions, which would be delivered at LUSoM.

"The hub is all about the schools in the area working together, in collaboration, to raise the standards of maths across the board," said Mr Henshaw.

"The idea was for us all to plan a lesson on algebra tiles and a lot of work went into it beforehand to make sure it was the best it could be.

"We planned it, then improved it and I taught it in one of my classes watched by 10 teachers from local schools then we got together again and improved it even more.

"Then we took my Year 7 class to LUSoM, it was a military operation doing that!





## International Carrot Day



The International Carrot Day was founded in 2003 to spread knowledge about the carrot and its good attributes around the world.

It is celebrated every year on 4th April and is the one day of the year when carrot lovers all over the world show their appreciation for this unique conical orange vegetable. In previous years, some people have celebrated with carrot parties.

### Do they really help you to see in the dark?

Yes! Carrots are rich in the compound beta carotene, which your body uses to make a form of Vitamin A that helps your eyes adjust in the dark. Carrots can improve your vision at night, although won't help you to see in complete darkness.




The myth about 'seeing in the dark' was propaganda used by the Royal Air Force during the Second World War to explain why British pilots had improved night vision which enabled their success during night-time air battles.

Nevertheless, the consumption of carrots was advocated in Britain at the time as part of a Dig for Victory campaign.


A radio programme called The Kitchen Front encouraged people to grow, store and use carrots in various novel ways, including making carrot jam and Woolton pie, named after the Lord Woolton, the Minister for Food. The British public during WWII generally believed that eating carrots would help them see better at night and in 1942 there was a 100,000-ton surplus of carrots from the extra production.

Year 7s have been learning the science behind race cars and applied this by designing and building balloon car racers.






# Celebrating Ramadan



Ramadan, the ninth month of the Islamic calendar, is one of the most sacred times for Muslims. During this month, Muslims observe a strict daily fast from dawn until sunset. They are not allowed to eat or drink, not even water, during these daylight hours.

In 2023, the first day of fasting started at sundown on Wednesday, 22 March and will end at sundown on Friday, 21 April.

Fasting times in 2023 are between 4:15am and 6:30pm at the beginning of Ramadan and 4:00am and 8:30pm by the end of Ramadan.



During Ramadan many Muslims go to the mosque and spend several hours praying. In addition to the five daily prayers that are part of the core of Islam, Muslims recite a special prayer called the Tarawih prayer (night prayer). The last ten nights of Ramadan are especially important and many Muslims will increase in their nightly prayers and devotion.

At the end of Ramadan, Eid al-Fitr, a feast that celebrates the breaking of the fast takes place. Gifts are exchanged and friends and families gather for festive meals. Special gifts are also given to the poor.



## What we do in Ramadan - Zishan and Yusuf's story...

In the morning we wake up at between 3am and 4am and have a big breakfast. After this we pray one of our five daily prayers before we go back to sleep and have a short nap again before school.

During the school day we do not eat or drink. It can be hard (especially when it's hot outside or when we have been doing PE) as we get really thirsty and tired.

After school we pray our daily prayers that we have missed during school time and pray some Quran.

Our parents usually prepare the food we will have in the evening meal.

At about 6.30pm we will break our fast with some dates and water (either at home or at the mosque). We then

have our evening meal such as samosas, kebabs, pastries, rice, curry, etc.

During Ramadan, we try to read the whole Quran in the whole month. This takes a lot of effort on our part as we also have to go to school during the day.




*Maths is commonly frowned upon for being boring but in my opinion, there is something to enjoy in Maths, and how much Maths will carry you on it's shoulders for your future.*


