Pupils are energised for Priory's battery recycling campaign

Priory pupils are certainly not running low on batteries! They have been energised to search their homes and also help the environment by Priory's Eco-Committee.

The Eco-Committee launch new projects every half-term with their mission – 'To be a school that cares about the local and wider environment and takes action to improve it.'

They launched Eco Fashion Club, promoted National Recycling Week and encouraged pupils to enter the Poem for the Planet national competition. This term, the Eco-Committee has entered the school into Duracell's national competition 'The Big Battery Hunt,' with the idea to get everyone to recycle their batteries, with the possibility of winning £3,500 of outdoor equipment.

Committee Leader, Mrs Massey, said, "The Eco Committee aim to raise awareness about the world around us and ways we can help to support and protect the environment. One of the Eco Committee member's parents suggested we enter the competition, and we all thought it was a great idea."

Teachers delivered a session during Learning for Life lessons on why it's important for the environment to recycle batteries and encouraged pupils to bring their old and used batteries into school during the campaign.

Mrs Massey continued, "*Recycling is something we can all do. A simple way for us all to start being more aware of what we do with the waste we produce.*

We have been really impressed with the response we have had. We have a lot of batteries to take to be recycled!"



Did you know that more than 20,000 tonnes of batteries end up in landfill sites and it can take 100 years for a battery to decompose? 400 million batteries are recycled each year – but that's just a small fraction of those sold.

Priory held an inter-class competition to see which Learning for Life group brought in the most old batteries - and so far Science teacher Mr Cox has the winning formula.

"The pupils were really enthusiastic and they enjoyed the challenge of it," said Mr Cox.

"We talked about batteries and the importance of recycling and the pupils embraced it, going home, talking to their families and bringing in their old ones. It fired their imagination although we had to make sure they weren't taking good ones from their remote controls!

"They brought batteries in in huge numbers which was fantastic to see."

Pupil Phoebe said: "I found batteries in a cupboard, there was a massive box that may have been there for years!"

Emily said: "I got some from home and my grandparents also contributed some as well. I never realised how heavy they were!"

Oliver said: "We didn't have so many in our house as I think we must have recycled them recently."

Aiden added: "I picked up a box from home that must have sat there for years! It certainly made me think about recycling and its

importance."

A final count of batteries collected will be totted up at the end of today and we will announce the total in next week's issue.

All parents should have received a letter regarding the industrial action taking place on 1 February by the NEU and how this will effect Penwortham Priory Academy.

The main points arising were:

- With over 60% of our staff members in the NEU, and the number who have already indicated that they will be striking, school will be closed to all pupils in Year 7, 8, 9 and 10.
- Pupils in Year 11 however, will be expected to attend school as normal and they will follow an alternative timetable on the day. Preston College interviews will still go ahead.
- The pastoral team will contact families of vulnerable pupils directly to ascertain if they require a place in school on the strike day.
- Further information will be sent out in due course regarding the expectations of pupils in Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 and the work they will be able to access throughout the day.
- School buses will run as normal.
- Catering will run a reduced service and pupils are encouraged to pre-order their food online. Please remember to cancel routine orders if you will not be in school on Wednesday.
- Year 9 Options Evening which was due to take place on 1 February will be postponed.

Today marks Holocaust Memorial Day, a day when we stop and remember not just those who died at the hands of the Nazis during WW2 but the thousands who have died in genocides since.

The theme this year is **Ordinary People**. This is an extract from the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust about this year's theme:


Genocide is facilitated by ordinary people. Ordinary people turn a blind eye, believe propaganda, join murderous regimes. And those who are persecuted, oppressed and murdered in genocide aren't persecuted because of crimes they've committed – they are persecuted simply because they are ordinary people who belong to a particular group (eg, Roma, Jewish community, Tutsi). Ordinary people were involved in all aspects of the Holocaust, Nazi persecution of other groups, and in the genocides that took place in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. Ordinary people were perpetrators, bystanders, rescuers, witnesses and ordinary people were victims.

Year 8 Are Seeing Eye To Eye in Design Tech



Who thought that Textiles could be so much fun!

In Year 8, pupils have the learning opportunity to create a fully functioning product based on their own chosen theme. Pupils learn how to apply a range of hand stitches, use the applique technique and some also having a go at adding embellishment to their final eye mask. During the term, pupils will also learn about the material, 'felt', which they will be using to make their mask as well as natural and man-made fibres and the importance of sustainability.

The theme for their eye mask could be football, cartoons, Pokémon - anything they fancy - which they need to research. They then use this research to create a design, but they also have to use a specification.

What is a Specification?

A specification is a list of specific points which the finished item should include. The pupils had to:

- Design and make 'themed' eye mask
- It will be made out of felt
- Use a range of sewing skills (hand and/or machine)
- Create the features of the theme using the applique technique
- Use embellishment to refine the eye mask

The first Year 8 rotation did an amazing job and I wanted to share with you some fantastic, well executed, fully functioning products.



Inter-house competition!



Examples are: Song - Tiger Feet, Singer/Group - Adam Ant or both - The Octopus's Garden by The Beatles



Vitality Netball International Trip

Last Wednesday, 11 January, over twenty Priory girls from Years 7-9 were invited to the AO Arena in Manchester to watch a Vitality Netball International test match.

England's Vitality Roses welcomed Jamaica's Sunshine Girls for a three-match test series. Jamaica were ranked third in the world, one place above England, after winning an historic silver medal at the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games.

It was the England team's first international match in Manchester since November 2016 when they also played Jamaica. The Roses had to come from behind to beat Jamaica 73-52 in the first game of their match series which was an amazing game to watch.

After this event England played two more games in London losing the second and then going on to beat Jamaica 63-59 in their final match to wrap up a 2-1 series victory against the Sunshine Girls.

England are now ranked third in the world!

Girls PE teacher and Head of Year 9, Mrs Bullock, said, "The girls had a fantastic evening, watching the match, getting involved with the sponsors' activities such as The Vitality Photo Booth and the Army reaction challenge. They really enjoyed the whole atmosphere of the evening and we can't wait for $M_{\rm evening}$
