Author Visit: Ruth Eastham

Author Ruth Eastham visited Priory on Wednesday to meet Year 7 and inspire the next generation of writers. If the name seems familiar, it's because she is the sister of Principal, Mr Eastham!

Ruth is a multi-award-winning author of five books - The Memory Cage, The Messenger Bird, Arrowhead, The Warrior in the Mist and the Jaguar Trials. She trained as a teacher at Cambridge University and studied Science but always enjoyed writing.

"It's strange as at school I had the choice between carrying on studying history and geography and I chose geography and all my novels are historical! I guess I felt like I missed out," said Ruth.

"I did study science but that is what I talk to the pupils about; you can have multiple dreams. You don't have to follow a particular path.

"I enjoyed science but I always wrote short stories and poetry and my breakthrough came when I entered a BBC competition to write children's fiction. to find the next JK Rowling.

"I was a finalist and that was probably the pivotal moment in my career; that was my inspiration.

"I have travelled a lot and what I always did whenever I went anywhere new is join the nearest writing group."


As a former teacher, Ruth enjoys visiting primary and secondary schools and telling her story as well as inspiring others.

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"I guess it's a bit strange coming into Priory where my brother is headteacher and I have to call him Mr Eastham but it is nice to be back.


"It's great to see how it has developed as I think I was last in school in 2011. The gardens are amazing!

GCSE Geography Liverpool Field Trip




REPORT BY MR WATTERS, LEAD TEACHER OF GEOGRAPHY

On the Wednesday and Friday before the start of the February half term, the Geography department took their Year 10 classes to Liverpool for a compulsory field trip as part of their GCSE studies.

An hour long mini-bus journey got us to our first site to survey. The area of Rimrose Valley Park is a little gem on the banks of the River Mersey, an open park quite similar to our own Hurst Grange Park with extra open spaces.

The pupils took photographs of this and four other sites which they have since downloaded and added annotations to display their information on the 'Quality of the Environments' as well as 'Land Use' surveys.

The trip then took pupils to four other sites approximately equidistant, generally following a transect from outer fringes of Liverpool along the River Mersey's banks. The pupils were a little unsure of two of the dockland sites however fully understood why they visited and surveyed them as they were in perfect contrast to the Water Front development at the Albert Dock and the Liverpool



One retail and residential centre.

Whilst in the China Town district, pupils investigated the positive impact of inward migration.



They walked down from the Anglican Cathedral to Liverpool One and were able to see how Liverpool continues to develop as a City. *"I wish we had one of these in Preston*", was a common remark spoken by the Year 10s.


Their visit to Liverpool was finished off by an hourlong trip on the Mersey ferry. Pupils were able to get

further views of the amazing new Everton football stadium at Bramley Dock.

They had seen it from a quick stop on the minibus however to see it in such splendour revitalising a previously run-down brownfield site was fantastic. Some of the pupils felt it was necessary to note that PNE will be playing there next season!

The Fab Four statue outside the Liver buildings and the National and

Liverpool Museums made perfect photo opportunities before the return journey home. But before then, there was time in Liverpool One to grab a meal.

The early completion of surveys meant we had enough time to drive through North Liverpool and look at regions of the city which were



recently selling houses for just a pound to help local families regenerate their run-down areas, such as Anfield.

This was another pair of great trips which are part of the Geography fieldwork requirement for the GCSE. We are very proud of the work completed by the pupils whilst on the trip and also what they have done in the classroom since their return. Their attention to detail and understanding of sampling techniques, methods and hypothesis testing ensures that they have a great pack of resources in readiness for their final GCSE exams next summer. Once again, our pupils were a credit to the school and were complimented by several pensioner groups and the ferry staff as kind and respectful young people. One said Mr Watters

Priory Nature Reserve Gets a Fresh Look

It's a new sign of the times for Penwortham's Nature Reserve thanks to Penwortham Priory Academy.

The nature reserve and meadow surround the external perimeter of the school and is open to the public. However, the old signage was run down and a new board was needed to help spruce the area up so the school's Technology Technician, Gill Lawe, worked with archived plans to craft a new weatherproof board.



The sign, installed at the Crow Hills Road entrance, was unveiled by the

Principal of Penwortham Priory Academy, Mr Eastham, and Chair of the Penwortham Nature Conservation Group, Peter Smith, along with other members of the Group.

Mr Eastham said, "The school is very much part of the Penwortham community SO it's been rewarding to use our facilities to help to improve the area. The old sign has been there for around 10 years and was showing the need for a facelift. Our gardens at Priory are award-winning and we want to make sure the nature reserve and meadow surrounding the school are kept in the best condition for people who visit our school and the public."



Mr Smith added, "As a nature reserve, the Priory Meadow is full of rare plants and animals. We have protected Great Crested Newts breeding in the ponds, delicate Snake's Head Fritillary are in full flower in March and April and we have many orchids in the meadow areas in the summer.

"It is a vibrant area and, while there is no public footpath through Priory Meadow, the public can use it provided they respect the fact it is a nature reserve so dogs must be kept on a lead."

Mr Lawe ended by saying, "The new sign probably took me around

six/seven hours to complete using the laser cutter in school as well as handcutting parts of it myself. I am really proud of it. Hopefully it will last a long time."





We're always looking to top up our library. Do you have any books that you are wondering what to do with next? Are they suitable for our young adults? Could we have them?


Our library plays a very important role in promoting the habit of reading for pleasure as well as enriching students' intellectual growth.


