Pupils To Judge Lancashire Book of the Year

Priory's Year 9 pupils will be bookworms over the next few months as they aim to read around ten books each to help to choose the Lancashire Book of the Year.

Priory has been selected as one of the schools in the county to receive a collection of around 26 new books which a number of Year 9 pupils have volunteered to read.

The pupils' first external meeting about the books was at Lancashire Archives early Friday morning to discuss the novels with pupils from other schools.

English teacher and Chief Librarian, Mrs Elliott said: "There are around 90 books on the list and we have been sent around 26 to read. Many of our keen readers volunteered to take part and they are enjoying the challenge.

"Tom said he read a book he would never have selected on his own but he enjoyed it so this is good as it takes pupils out of their comfort zone with their reading.

"Once we have read them, we have to whittle them down to either a top ten or five and then we go and discuss them with other schools.

"That is a big step, it's about building their confidence and feeling confident to share their views and challenge others about books.

Lancashire Book of the Year (LBOY) is the longest running young people's regional book award in the country.


The award remains one of the few book awards in which young people themselves are solely responsible for choosing both the shortlist and the overall winning book.



Priory Pupils Achieve a First for South Ribble in Scouting Challenge

Two Priory pupils used their navigation skills and evaded a team of 'hunters' to finish second out of 145 teams in the popular Operation Moonlight, for scout and explorer groups.

The event is similar to a game of manhunt and teams have to navigate from a mystery start and finish point, over around 15 miles.

Year 11 Ben and Year 10 Abigail are part of the Enterprise Explorer Unit and they finished second overall and won the Explorer Section, so they were first in their age group. The team of six were also the first ever team in the South Ribble District to have won this competition.



Ben explained: "We were dropped off at a random location, which was Southport, and we had to navigate to the end which was Skelmersdale.

"We took our phones for emergencies but we weren't allowed to use them for navigating – it was about using OS maps and compasses. I have been a scout for around 10 years so I am ok at navigating.

"We set off at mid-day and we had to finish before 9pm and we got there just in time – it was really tight at the end.

"You are also pursued

by leaders of units and you have to make sure they don't catch you.

"It was very wet and cold and to come second out of 145 teams is an achievement,

and first in our age group, so we were happy."

Abi admitted: "I found it really hard, my legs are still hurting! I struggled carrying the weight and walking so far because it was the first time I'd done a challenge like this but I am glad I did it. We could have perhaps won two trophies but it was amazing to win one and be the first in the District to get it too!"

Year 7 will soon be starting their new book, 'Wild Boy' by Rob Lloyd Jones, so pupils should look out for new competitions to enter


as their reading progresses.

One of the most powerful children's novels about the Holocaust, the first part of Gleitzman's quartet introduces Felix, a young Jewish boy fleeing across Nazioccupied Poland in a desperate, heartwrenching attempt to find his parents.



My name is Felix. This is my story.

Felix has been living in an orphanage for three years and eight months when the men in armbands arrive to burn the books.

Going on the run in search of his parents, Felix soon learns that Poland in 1942 is not a safe place for Jewish boys. But can his gift for storytelling keep him one step ahead of the Nazis and help him find his parents?

After all, everybody deserves to have something good in their life at least once.

Context – The Holocaust What do you already know?


Holocaust - the mass murder of Jewish people under the German Nazi regime during the period 1941–5.

More than 6 million European Jews, as well as members of other punished groups such as Romani, gay people, and disabled people, were murdered at concentration camps such as Auschwitz.



Burning Books

Book burning began shortly after the Nazi Party took control over the government: "Beginning on May 10, 1933, Nazi-dominated student groups carried out public burnings of books they claimed were "un-German." The book burnings took place in 34 university towns and cities. Works of prominent Jewish, liberal, and leftist writers ended up in the bonfires."

"No tell them a story about the city wear shoes have rags already in them!" Zelda complained.


"Zelda can you not tell them the story, I'm tired"

"Barney!" shouted Chira with excitement.




Learning Newsletters

"I can read anything really, I read for pleasure and I usually always finish the book."


Connie has taken part in Priory's productions including Matilda, Game Over and Mary Poppins.

Lost and found property is located in the Pastoral office with the exception of PE kit which is kept


by the PE Department. Valuables will be stored securely by the Pastoral office (see Mr Shipton) until their owner can be identified.
