Year 7 Are Ready For The Roads With Level 3 Bikeability



On Tuesday, 31 October and Tuesday, 7 November a selection of Year 7 and 8 pupils undertook their Level 3 Bikeability course.

Delivered by South Ribble Borough Council's Cycling Development Officers, the advance course equips pupils with the skills needed to stay safe in more challenging urban situations.

During the two hour session, pupils learned how to:

- Use the best riding position for any situation
- Ride alongside other cyclists
- Ride on more complex roads including busier roads, more complicated junctions and faster roads with speed limits above 30mph.
- Negotiate more complex roads such as junctions controlled by traffic lights, multi-lane roads or cycle lanes.
- Respond confidently when a situation changes.
 For example, when a vehicle pulls out in front of you.



Cycling Development Officer, David Boyle said, "We focus on skills pupils might want to practice more, or a tricky road where they travel often."

He went on to say, "All the pupils were an absolute credit to the school and represented it to an impeccable standard. Behaviour and application were second to none. The Level 3 will set them up for a life of freedom on wheels and I genuinely felt the pupils had grown in skill and confidence."

PE Teacher, Mrs Bullock, who organised the sessions at Priory, said, "All the pupils commented on how much fun it was and would all like to do it again!"

A particular well done to Callum M, Year 8, for his maturity and enthusiasm. Callum has been invited to support the Development Officers next week. Sessions will continue over the next two weeks.



"I have a number of pieces from them and the


necklace is beautiful."



What's STEM Club All About?





The Eco Committee has had a productive start to the new school year.



Diwali

Over the coming weekend, many of our families will be celebrating Diwali. Diwali is the five-day Festival of Lights, celebrated



by millions of Hindus, Sikhs and Jains across the world. Diwali symbolises new beginnings and the Hindu New Year plus the triumph of good over evil and light over darkness.

When is Diwali?

Diwali is usually celebrated in October or November - the exact date is determined by the Hindu lunar calendar. This year it will fall on **Sunday**, **12 November** and will last for five days around that date, starting on Friday, 10 November and ending on Tuesday, 14 November.

Where does the word Diwali come from?

Diwali comes from the Sanskrit word deepavali, meaning 'rows of lighted lamps'. Houses, shops and public places are decorated with small oil lamps called diyas. People also enjoy fireworks and sweets too, so it's really popular with children.

Traditions

- Many lights and oil lamps are lit on the streets and in houses
- People visit their relatives and have feasts
- Fireworks and festivities are an essential part of the occasion
- Lakshmi, the Hindu goddess of wealth, is worshipped as the bringer of blessings for the new year




