# Year 7 Meet Author Ruth Eastham

'Inspirational' is how the Year 7s described the visit of author Ruth Eastham to Priory.

Ruth is sister of Principal Mr Eastham and is a multi-award winning author of five books - The Memory Cage, The Messenger Bird, Arrowhead, The Warrior in the Mist and the Jaguar Trials.

She has visited Priory a number of times to speak to the pupils and inspire them to be the next generation of writers.

"It's always good to come here," said Ruth. "We have been talking about what the ingredients are to make an exciting story – imagination, an amazing protagonist, an amazing antagonist and an amazing setting.

"They were all really keen to listen and ask questions. I trained as a teacher so it's nice to come back into school and deliver sessions, including drama and discussions and ten minutes of powerful writing and there were some really imaginative stories."

Ruth trained as a teacher at Cambridge University and studied Science but always enjoyed writing.

"My breakthrough came when I entered a BBC competition to write children's fiction, to find the next JK Rowling. I was a finalist and that was probably the pivotal moment in my career, that was my inspiration."

"I did actually go into industry for a year but


thought I would get bored with doing the same thing. That's the main difference in teaching – no day is ever the same!"

# Lancashire FA Supports Grassroots Improvements at Priory

Lancashire Football Association visited Priory on Monday to see how the recent funding awarded to us had impacted on the school and the local community.

The investment towards the floodlights and ground maintenance by the Football Foundation has provided improved facilities, not only for our own pupils, but for clubs that use them beyond the school day.

Priory's Strategic Estates Development Manager, Mr Bolton, spoke to Lucy Roberts from Lancashire FA about the work we have carried out and the impact the funding has had for everyone, including the support we are now able to provide to our local primary schools.

Mr Bolton said, "We applied for two grants from the Football Foundation run by the FA. The first was for grass pitch machinery to help with running our own grass pitches' cutting programme on our fields.

"We worked with the Grounds Maintenance Association, of which we are members, to assess the quality of the grass pitches for grassroots teams playing on them. The report identified a need for equipment to enable Priory to cut the grass more regularly plus also allow for equipment to help with the basic decompaction of the grass allowing for better grass growth and improved drainage. Three of Priory's staff also undertook training courses associated with grounds maintenance works."

Mr Bolton went on to explain what the second grant meant for Priory, "The further funding enabled us to upgrade the old floodlights on the 3G pitch from 24 no. 2000watt fittings to new 12 no. 1600watt LED fittings and included the addition of smarter controls to hold off lights when not needed. This has enabled us to not only improve the lighting levels on the pitch but we're also saving energy now that there are fewer floodlights."

The school has four football clubs that are regularly using the grass pitches at weekends and in the evenings for training.

#### And it doesn't stop there...

We are intending to apply for further grants for the grass pitches which will enable more complicated works to be carried out by specialist contractors to add to the work we have already started. All this will mean greater use of the pitches for grassroot football.



positively impact various aspects of our lives, from relationships to career success and overall well-being.

At Penwortham Priory Academy we believe that strong personal development provision contributes to making a positive difference to pupil's lives and can create a positive effect in school, at home and in the community in which they live. The opportunities provided not only allow pupils to engage in activities they are interested in, but enables them to explore and build a strong pathway to, and foundation for, a successful future.

In schools Personal Development can be described as:

Provision that extends beyond the academic, technical and vocational. A collection of elements with different but interconnected and overlapping aims with all subject areas. Wider opportunities beyond the academic curriculum, as well as helps to build their behaviour and attitudes. Crucial knowledge for pupils to take well informed decisions in many aspects of their lives.

Personal Development includes many aspects of school life:

- Enrichment such as school trips and visits in the UK and abroad.
- Wider opportunities such as co-curricular clubs, of which there is something for everyone and external competitions.
- Careers experiences including careers themed days and one-to-one advice with an advisor.
- Faith Days to explore SMSC (Spiritual, Moral, Social, Cultural)
- Participation in groups such as our LGBTQ+ and Allies Group, BAME Culture Club, ECO Committee.
- Citizenship through participating in external democracy opportunities, assisting the local community, donating to charity in various forms.
- Education provided by guest speakers and assembly themes such as 'Fundamental British Values' (Rule of law, Democracy, Individual Liberty, Respect for others, Acceptance of those with different faiths and beliefs)

#### One of our most significant Personal Development vehicles is our Learning for Life Curriculum which



is delivered on Learning for Life Days and during the final period of the day. During this time pupils learn about other aspects of Personal Development through a well-planned, age appropriate curriculum:

- Self-Concept
- Development of Character Respect, Kindness, Resilience, Pride
- Physical Health
- · Health related decisions
- Medical Care
- · Mental Well-being
- Media Literacy and Digital Resilience
- E Safety
- Citizenship
- Equality, Diversity and Protected Characteristics
- · Preparation for next steps
- Addictions
- Social Influences
- · Relationships Healthy and Unhealthy
- Intimate Relationships and Sex Education
- · Careers and Pathways
- Financial Management

This provision provides opportunities, knowledge and skills which pupils may need now and in the future. All the learning materials and external information sources they have gathered are saved in their five year Personal Development Journey file. This file is kept in school, but can be taken home for reference during the five years and ultimately leaves with them as a reference for life.

# Autumn Update

Priory's gardens are our pride and joy and award-winning gardener Mr Farron wants to let parents and pupils know what to expect each month as the landscape changes.

It has been a very special year for Priory gardens with many visits from local councillors, trustees, parents and horticultural experts, and not forgetting the press. It was through these interested



individuals that we have been shortlisted for an award for the Royal Horticultural Society's North West in Bloom. I will be able to inform you of the result after 19th October, so fingers crossed.

However, it is the time of year (Autumn) to consider replanting trees and shrubs, cutting down annuals and preserving perennials, and giving the soil a winter feed, cleaning and maintaining tools for the coming Spring.

In this edition, I have decided to concentrate my advice for the successful planting of trees for late Autumn and Winter.

#### Winter Interest

A shrub with a tree shape such as standard rose or fuchsias is ideal if your front garden gets plenty of sun. When the flowers are over, you can move the tree, if potted, for an evergreen to give some interest. During the winter months many conifers, especially varieties of Juniper and Cyprus, make useful potted trees to fill a space. Celebrate an important event in your family by planting a specimen tree, i.e. in school we planted a standard rose, named the Anniversary Rose, to celebrate Priory's 70th anniversary – this can be found in the Rose Garden



#### A Tree for Every Season

Here I suggest a tree for every season which will give interest all year round.

Winter – Holly (Llex) - red, yellow or orange berries, Pussy Willow (Salix Caprea)

**Spring** – Flowering Cherry (Prunus varieties) - pink or white blossom

**Summer** – Cornus Controversa white flowers, Weeping Buddleia, Alternifolia - purple flower, Indian Bean Tree (Catalpa bignoniodes) – white flower

**Autumn** – Mountain Ash - red orange or white berries, Maple Acer - red orange or yellow leaves

We will focus on one theme each week across a genre, a country or from history. The theme could also link to the season or an event in school. Next week it's...

#### **European Classical Tradition**


Classical Music is often termed as everything that isn't pop music. In reality it is quite a short period of music history lead by the composers Mozart, Haydn and early work of Beethoven.

This week's music will actually cover some quite old material;

Baroque Music - approx. 1580 - 1750, some Classical Music - 1750 - 1810 and some Romantic Music - 1810 - 1900.

Additionally there are two American pieces in the form of Samuel Barber's Adagio for Strings - recently arranged into a dance track by William Orbit - and George Gershwin's Rhapsody in Blue from the early 20th century.

Many of these pieces are very famous and several have had a strong influence on more modern music. For example, J S Bach's Air on a G string of 1731 was adapted by the 1960's group Procul Harum in 'A Whiter Shade of Pale' and



the chord sequence in Pachelbel's Canon of 1694 was used by Oasis in 'Don't Look back in Anger'.

The term 'Classical Music' originates from the Latin word 'classicus', meaning first class, or for the Romans, 'artistry of the highest order'.

# The Geography department will be running the first of the two compulsory GCSE fieldwork trips on 1st, 2nd and 3rd November.

Year 10 students have started the GCSE course, and now need to apply their River Landscapes unit to the practical element of the course and carry out a river study to test set hypotheses. This will take place along the Wycoller Beck, Wycoller.

Mr Metcalfe and Mrs Kursitis will inform the students which one of the three dates their classes will be going out on.
