GCSE Results

GCSE results will be available for Class of 2024 to collect from school on Thursday, 22 August between 11am and 1pm.

Results can only be given to the Year 11 pupil themselves however a nominated person may collect on their behalf if that person has a note, signed by the pupil, authorising their consent. This includes parents as pupils have legal responsibility for their own results.

As in recent years, results will be given out at the front of school outside reception between 11am - 12 noon. If the weather is inclement, pupils should head to the Assembly Hall. Between 12 noon and 1pm pupils can collect from reception. Please note, school will close at 1pm.

Runshaw College has confirmed that Penwortham Priory Academy pupils can enrol at any point on 22 August (they do not have to enrol by 12pm). Pupils can therefore collect their results from 11am and then make their way to the college in due course.

If you are on holiday, we can arrange for the results to be sent by email. Emails can only be sent direct to the pupil. If you would like us to do this, then the request must come from the pupil themselves. They should contact the Exams Officer, Miss Conway, by email and include their full name and personal email address (not school email). Results will be issued by email from 10am and no later than 1pm on the day. Any results not collected by 1pm will be posted second class that day.



Duke Of Edinburgh Award Open to Year 8

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE) is a nationally and internationally recognised award, favoured by employers and universities alike. The programme builds confidence, dedication and commitment, attributes we all want to see in our young people, and demand for the DofE is greater today than ever before.

You will be pleased to know, therefore, that Penwortham Priory Academy is a DofE licenced organisation and is offering this opportunity to pupils currently in Year 8, going into Year 9 from September.

Humanities teacher, Mrs Cauchi, will lead the scheme at Priory for her second year following the retirement of Geography teacher, Mr Watters.

Expectations of DofE

There are three progressive levels of DofE which, when successfully completed, lead to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Award. To achieve the Bronze Award at Priory, those taking part will complete a programme of activities in four sections that involve volunteering, physical/becoming fitter, developing a new skill and completing an expedition. Pupils must complete the first three sections before they will be invited on the expedition. They will need to complete a minimum of three months in each and choose one to focus on for six months.

Research has shown that young people completing the DofE gain key employability skills such as leadership, decision making, confidence, team working and understanding of others. The programme provides a sense of adventure and the DofE experience has a lasting impact on young people's behaviour, skills and life chances.

Before being enrolled onto the Bronze Award pupils wanting to participate are asked to complete a preliminary activity sheet and have this signed by Mrs Cauchi before Monday,



9 September, to ensure what they are planning to do is accepted.

Weekly sessions will start w/c 16 September and pupils will be split onto a Tuesday or Thursday group. These sessions will run from 3:10pm-4:00pm up until the expedition date in June, and they must attend these to achieve the award.

Year 8 Can Look To The Stars With GCSE Astronomy

Year 8 pupils can reach for the stars by taking an optional GCSE in Astronomy from September, when they move up to Year 9.

Science Technician Mr Evans leads the course which will be after-school every Tuesday during term time. Learning starts in Year 9 and the course is completed in Year 10, when pupils can take their Astronomy GCSE a year early if they want to.

GCSE Astronomy covers a range of topics from Cosmology, Exploring starlight, Sellar evolution and Planetary motion and gravity.

Mr Evans said: "It's an added extra after school and pupils take their GCSE a year early.

"There is coursework and an exam and, I will be honest, it is quite tough – a few people start it and drop out. It is an enjoyable course to teach though and a lot of pupils thoroughly enjoy it."

Year 9 Freya said: "I wanted to do an extra GCSE and I find Astronomy interesting. I knew it would be hard, there is a lot of maths and there is quite a lot of information you learn which you don't learn in science. Doing a GCSE a year early is good practise for Year 11."



Year 9 Evie said: "I am interested in space which is why I chose Astronomy. If you get a GCSE in Astronomy people think you are really smart! It's maths and physics, with a little bit of history of physicists. I enjoy it and Mr Evans is a good teacher. To any Year 8s, I would say if you like Astronomy and if you want another qualification give it a go."



Year 10 Thomas said: "I took Astronomy as it's an extra GCSE and I found space interesting, how insignificant but unique we are! It is difficult but I have managed to stay with it. I would say to a Year 8 if you are smart enough, go for it."

Niamh said: "I have always liked space but it was a lot harder than I thought. The coursework was quite nice – sitting, staring at the stars! You do have to be dedicated to take it though."


Daniel added: "A Year 11 recommended me to take it and, while it's difficult, space has always been an interest of mine.

"I think 15 people started on the course and there are just six of us in the Year 10 class now so you do have to persist with it."

Year 10 & Year 7 Artists Experience



Lead Teacher of Art, Mrs Shaw, had organised the two hour online workshop, which took place on Monday for Year 10. A session was also adapted for a class of keen Year 7 artists.

The Courtauld works to advance how we see and understand the visual arts, and is known for its teaching, research of art history and a major public gallery.

During the workshops, Courtauld Lead Educator Fran Herrick, delivered an introduction to art history with a focus on the Impressionists and art historical techniques. Pupils also explored a virtual tour of the gallery where they viewed the permanent collections as well as temporary exhibitions.



Mrs Shaw said, "The class also did a session on curating

where they had to identify images from The Courtauld's collection, give it a title and write an introduction to their 'art exhibition'.

"The Courtauld cares for one of the greatest art collections in the UK, sharing these works with the public at The Courtauld Gallery in London. Its collections include Van Gogh's Self-Portrait with Bandaged Ear and Manet's A Bar at the Folies-Bergère so I was thrilled to be able to bring a taste of this to our young artists. Hopefully, we will be able to arrange a trip to the gallery in the coming year."

Class of 2022 have now completed their Further Education and two former pupils have got in touch to thank their teachers for going that extra mile to help them reach their next goal to fulfil their career ambition.



Class of 2022: Rhianne Leach

Class of 2022 pupil Rhianne Leach has successfully secured a place on the prestigious BAE Systems Aerospace Engineering Degree Apprenticeship Programme.

Rhianne wanted to thank Priory Teacher of Design Technology and Engineering Mrs Shaw for starting her on the path to her dream of becoming a Chief Engineer by helping her with the NCFE Level 1/2 Technical Award in Engineering at school.

"I wanted to take the Engineering course at Priory, however I was limited by the number of subjects I could take. I had to prioritise the subjects I needed for college.

"Mrs Shaw made sure I could take the engineering qualification in my own time, two nights a week after school and in my lunch break. I sat my exam at the same time as everyone else and received a Level 2 Distinction *.

"The support I was given by Mrs Shaw provided me with the foundation that I am now building upon and helped to spark my ambition within the subject.



"I always wanted to do something STEM related, having always had an interest in physics and maths. It was only when I went to look around universities that I saw these subjects being applied and how worthwhile and useful it was. I saw how engineering looks in the real world and decided that it was the path that I wanted to follow.

"I will be completing industry placements alongside university study in order to obtain my Bachelors Degree in Aerospace Engineering. It's the next step towards my dream of becoming a Chief Engineer.

"But ultimately, the first step was the work that Mrs Shaw helped me to complete throughout my earlier studies."

Rhianne went to Lancaster University School of Mathematics (LUSoM), and applied for the extremely competitive BAE Systems' position.

"It was an extremely long process. There was the initial application, then an AI screened interview followed by an extensive personality test and gamification. The final step was a two hour in person interview with two Engineers.

"Overall, BAE Systems nationally receives 20,000 applications for all their apprenticeship positions, for which there are 600 available across all the sectors.

"I received a phone call just before starting my A-Levels to say that I had been selected for one of the 30 places on the Aerospace Scheme. I start in September and will be initially based at the Samlesbury site.

"The chance to travel around the world really excites me. I am aware of many people who have travelled to Japan, Germany and many more countries that the company works with. There are some truly amazing opportunities that this degree apprenticeship will open up for me."



Class of 2022: Hannah Yates

Class of 2022 pupil Hannah has thanked Priory for helping her pursue her dream career in Japanese.

Hannah became fascinated with learning Japanese while watching animated cartoons and wanted to watch without subtitles.

When she came to Priory she wanted to study Japanese language but obviously it's not on the curriculum.

However, Priory found a way to help Hannah with the support of Head of Languages, Mrs Scully – and she will now study Japanese at university.

Mrs Yates said: "Hannah had been learning the language by herself at home. Mrs Scully was able to guide her through the curriculum but we also needed someone to help her with the spoken language so we put an appeal out on social media to see if there was anyone local who could help.



"Mrs Small, who is a Japanese national living in the area,

came forward and she came into school every Wednesday lunch-time and helped Hannah with her GCSE."

Hannah spent Monday and Wednesday studying Japanese in school, out of lesson time, as well as studying it independently.

While in Year 11 Hannah took the Japanese foundation level and got a Grade 5 – the highest she could achieve on that paper. She kept up her learning with Mrs Small independently, alongside studying A Levels, and last year came back to Priory to sit a higher level GCSE, this time achieving a Grade 8.

Hannah now has an unconditional offer from UCLan, as well as York St John, to study TESOL with Japanese - teaching English as a second language in Japan. She will go out there on placement in the third year to teach.

Hannah said: "I love Japan as it's such a different culture and it's so interesting learning about the history of Japan. It is a tough language to learn but it is worth the effort.


"Without Priory, and the support I received from Mrs Scully and Mrs Small, I wouldn't be where I am now. I didn't

take French and I would have probably opted to study something more mainstream at higher level. Having the opportunity to do this has definitely changed my life choices for the better."

Mrs Small still comes into Priory, offering an extracurricular lunch time club in Japanese language and culture for all pupils every Wednesday.

Year 8 Take A Trip To The Church with The UK's Tallest Spire



On Friday, 5 July, a group of Year 8 students accompanied Mr Eccles, Mrs Cauchi and Mr Momoniat visited St Walburge's Church in Preston. This is the first of what the Humanities Department hopes will become a series

of trips to sites of cultural and historical significance in the Preston and Penwortham areas.

Thanks to the kindness of Canon Cristofoli and parishioner Maria, our pupils were given a tour of the Grade 1 listed building, with references made to its history (going back to the 12th century as a leper colony) and the establishment of the current church in the 1850s after a relaxation in anti-Catholic laws in England.

Lead Teacher of History Mr Eccles said, "We are so lucky to have such a cultural landmark on our doorstep, and many of pupils do not get a chance to step inside any church, let alone one of such significance. We are extremely grateful to Canon Cristofoli and Maria for giving up their time to speak to us.

"The pupils were also keen to explore the church's spire (the tallest of any parish church in Great Britain) but due to birds nesting there, a follow up trip has already been pencilled in for the Autumn term.

expertise and spoke about how STEM subjects can support them.


Emily enjoyed the day, saying she particularly liked the talk by Nerys Shah, 'Can we trust Maths?'.
