Seneca is an highly engaging online homework and revision platform based on exam board specifications, it uses smart algorithms that help students to remember topics better.

Assistant Head of Science, Mrs Potter said, "Badges awarded for our basic homework expectation but we are keen to offer acknowledgement to the vast majority of



students who complete their homework every week without issue."

Meeting each completed assignments target will allow the badge to be exchanged for the next tier, up to the prestigious gold badge.

Head of Science, Mr Bedford added, "These pupils' Science badges are a worthy addition to what in some cases is already a wide collection!"

Pupils are reminded that Seneca club is runs every Wednesday lunch time in the Nucleus where pupils can use the science laptops to complete their homework, ask for help or resolve any password issues.



Bringing music to your ears at break and lunch

MaBaL (Music at Break and Lunch) is music played through the school's loud speaker system during break and lunch. Chosen by Mr Taylor, Lead Teacher for Music, this is designed to offer exposure to the curriculum in different ways, and support pupils' appreciation of music.

The focus is on one theme each week across a genre, a country or from history. The theme could also link to the season, a festival or an event in school, such as last term's production, Legally Blonde.

Next week, it's all about: Soul & Motown

One a genre, one a record label from Detroit. Soul music is a genre of African American pop music that led to many later genres, from funk and dance music to hip hop and contemporary R&B. It developed in the USA in the late 1950s from African American church music called 'gospel music'. After slavery ended in 1865, African Americans weren't welcome in the churches of white Americans, so they built their own churches and sang

Christian songs with African-American vocal styles and rhythms. They sang joyful, up-tempo gospel songs while clapping and moving to the beat, and they sang slower gospel songs that expressed deep feelings like yearning for God's love.

The most popular style of soul music in the early-60s was Motown's pop soul. In 1959, Motown Records launched in the northern city of Detroit, Michigan. The word comes from a portmanteau of 'Motor' and 'Town' as Detroit was the home of the Ford motor company. The rhythms of Motown songs were familiar for white listeners to hear and dance to by playing tambourine and rhythm guitar on the second and fourth beats of each bar. They also had female singers like Diana Ross and The Supremes use female pop-music voices instead of their natural bluesy voices of such as Etta James.



This theme will be running for two weeks whilst the mock exams continue due to air time being a little more intermittent.




- 1. Children who own a book are three times more likely to read above age expected level.

- 5. Reading improves a child's empathy skills



YEAR 10 & 11: Update From Preston College

PRESTONCOLLEGE

Next Open Event - Thursday, 7th March 4-7pm.

Important changes regarding courses / curriculum for students starting in September 2024:

Aeronautical Engineering — Unfortunately this pathway of Engineering will no longer be offered. The college has been unable to recruit staff for 18 months to deliver this course and do not want to be in a position in September where new learners enrol on programmes without a subject specific practitioner. Learners who have had offers and applied for this course have been notified via a letter to their home address. The college will liaise with them directly regarding new course choices. There are alternatives of <u>T Level Engineering</u> or BTEC <u>Level 3 Engineering</u> for these applicants.

Electrical and Plumbing Apprenticeships - The college has ended its partnership with JTL for both Electrical and Plumbing apprenticeships, and has announced that it is offering both these apprenticeship pathways from September 2024. Being impartial, they recommend all applicants to apply for both JTL and Preston College to give the best opportunity of gaining employment. The college website and application form are currently being updated.

BTEC Level 2 in eSports – The college has been successful in gaining a £1.5 million investment that will transform the ground floor of its VPA building into a new digital suite. Work has started and will be finished for this September. The college is therefore delighted to be able to offer Level 2 eSports. This will also be an option for current Year 10s at their taster days throughout June/July. Course information will be added to the website in due course.

Bursary and enrolment accounts – See next page for information about the scheme which will open at the beginning

of April. This will also be sent out via email to all applicants. Enrolment this year will again be online where students upload their GCSE results to the college portal. Some students get invited into college after GCSE results day, especially lower level learners and also students that require a DBS to be undertaken. Over the Easter period enrolment accounts will be issued to all applicants and they will be on hand to support them with accepting their place.

Success at Noda awards (national body that represents amateur theatre). Preston College has been successful in picking up two awards at NODA. It won Best Youth Drama (39 steps) and Best Youth Musical (Mary Poppins). It is extremely proud of its staff and students in being recognised for their outstanding work.

Interviews – In total they have interviewed pupils in 27 schools across Lancashire and have offered places to a record number. Applications for September 2024 are nearly 400 up on this time last year. While they do their best to accommodate all learners, it's important to reiterate to students that if they have missed their college interview and still want a place they must rebook by emailing applications@preston.ac.uk


Mobile Phone Policy

Following the guidance released last week by the Department for Education which states: 'Mobile phones will be banned in schools across England under new guidance issued to teachers', we would like to remind everyone about our procedures in relation to mobile phones.

We of course understand that parents may wish their child to carry a mobile phone for their personal safety, so as a school, we take a sensible and practical approach with this in mind.

Whilst mobile phones can be brought into school, to minimise any detrimental impact they may have on our core purpose of 'Learning to Succeed', every day, the following applies once pupils enter the school grounds:

- Mobile phones must be 'off and out of sight', always.
- They should not be seen on the school site at any time.
- All pupils have a locker, so we advise them to store phones securely in their locker at the start of the day.
- If not in their locker, then they should be kept in their bags, but they must be 'off and out of sight', always.
- The only exception is that they may be used in the school reception area after 3:20pm to contact parents regarding travel arrangements, with the permission of a member of staff.
- If your daughter or son needs to contact home for any reason during the school day, they should go to either the school reception or the Pastoral office, at either break or lunchtime, and we will allow them to use a school phone.
- To support us in implementing our procedures, we would ask that if you need to contact your daughter or son during the school day, that you ring the school and a message will be passed on to your daughter or son by a member of staff.
- If you require a response to the message from your daughter or son, a member of staff will allow them to use a school phone to call you.





 The school cannot accept any responsibility for theft, loss, damage or health effects (potential or actual) resulting from their use.

Consequences:

 Any pupil seen by a member of staff with a mobile phone will have the device confiscated by that member of staff for it not being 'off and out of sight'.



Mobile phones confiscated by a member of staff at breaks or lunch time, will be taken to the Pastoral office, where they will be named

taken to the Pastoral οπice, where they will be named and locked away securely until the end of the day.

- If a mobile phone is confiscated by a member of staff during a lesson, a member of the Pastoral Team or SLT will come to the lesson to collect the mobile phone and take it to the Pastoral office for secure storage.
- Confiscated mobile phones may be collected by the pupil, from the Pastoral Office, at the end of the day, and they will be issued with an SLT After School Detention.
- If any pupil refuses to give any member of staff their mobile phone for it not being 'off and out of sight', the pupils' parent/guardian will be contacted, and the pupil will be sent home.
- The following morning, the parent/guardian will need to come into school with their daughter or son to meet with a member of the Senior Leadership Team.
- Persistent flouting of the mobile phone rules will result in inclusion in our isolation and reflection room.
- As such, a pupil who persistently has their mobile phone confiscated will result in the device being placed in the school safe until a parent or guardian is able to come to school to collect the device and speak to a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

Remember,

'Off and out of sight' always!'
