

Pupils Learn A Language With Three Pillars And A Pizza Box!



Priory's Languages department encouraged pupils to use their imaginations to help them understand the new way of teaching French.



Instead of being taught in different topics, French is now based around the 'Three Pillars' – Grammar, Phonics and Vocabulary.

"I am a massive fan of this new French curriculum," said Head of Languages, Mrs Scully, who is in her second school year of teaching it.

"The new way of learning can be trickier to understand so we gave our pupils a challenge to try and help them.

"They were asked to build a model of the

'Three Pillars' which showed their understanding of each of the pillars, that they were of equal importance and what they offer in terms of language.

"They had two hours to build them in their House teams and then they went in front of a panel of three senior figures in school to answer questions such as: '*Why do you learn vocabulary?*' '*What is grammar*?' and '*What does 'HABITS' stand for?*'

HABITS is an acronym standing for: High frequency language; Automaticity; Building Blocks of Language; Independence; Talk it! Read it! Write it! Listen to it!; and Sequencing.

This helps pupils understand why they are learning French in this way.

Mrs Scully continued: "They were also questioned about careers in French and they showed a good understanding about how you can use languages in a host of different jobs.

"Pupils are also taught ten words a week. This is on purpose so we aren't overloading them and the new vocabulary sinks in.

"We have noticed an impact on our pupils since we introduced this a

year ago. Their pronunciation is better, they have better vocabulary retention and their grammar is improving.

"This will prepare them for a new GCSE and we believe this way of teaching French will be more beneficial to our pupils."

Year 8 Phoebe said: "Building the model was fun and enjoyable while the presentation was nerve-racking. I had missed one of the lessons so this helped me catch-up and helped me understand it better."

Year 8 Emily said: "My job was to concentrate on the careers aspect and they are all now engraved in my brain!"

Leon, of Year 7 Group 1 winner Hodder, who won overall, added: "Our model had three pillars on a box and we included the 'HABITS' so it was a good way to learn."



Culture Day - Friday, 3 May

Next Friday, we will once again be celebrating Culture Day.



At Penwortham Priory Academy we pride ourselves on our diversity and vast cultural community. In our school this academic year, we have on average 15 different ethnicities and over 20 different languages spoken!

Having a day to celebrate our culture is something that has been requested by many of our pupils and we agree that it is extremely important for children to be proud of their identities, faiths and cultures, but also to share their background with their peers.


On Friday then, students are invited to come to school dressed in clothing that reflects either their own particular culture, represents their special country's flag or embodies a national team kit, such as rugby, hockey or football.

If they do wish to wear their own clothes for the day, then we ask that you make a donation of £1 via SCOPay. Money raised will go to the Red Cross and Friends of Mulanje Orphans (Malawi).

There will be a food sale at break/lunchtime in the Auditorio on the same day where students can buy many different foods from other cultures. In addition, students may bring in their own cultural food (this can be homemade or store bought) that can be shared amongst their classmates. In this case, we also ask that you provide the school with a list of ingredients in the food so that they can ensure that children with any allergies or dietary requirements are safe to eat it.

On this day, students will be also be talking about their culture with their classmates, doing lots of activities to celebrate their identity, learning basic sayings in each other's languages and listening to music from around the world. There will be a guiz in Learning for Life and each department will have

a short presentation highlighting famous people from various cultures that relate to their subjects.



Throughout the week, Henna painting will also be taking place at break and lunchtime in the Auditorio. Permission letters for this activity can be obtained from the school office and the cost for this is £2 (cash only).

Mrs Cowell will also be running one of her cookery workshops on Tuesday evening where pupils will be making Greek cheese pies (booking essential).

We are very excited to celebrate our cultures at Penwortham Priory Academy and are sure that the students will have a fantastic day.

Culture Day Consent to use Henna


As part of our Culture Day event on Friday, 3 May pupils will have the opportunity to use henna to draw mehndi patterns on their hands.

Henna is a natural dye made from a plant and applied to the skin. It will remain on the skin for a few days, but it is not permanent. It will however, permanently stain clothing if it comes into contact with it before drying. Please note that an allergic reaction is possible, but uncommon.

The activity will take place at break/lunchtime in the Auditorio from Monday, 29 April to Thursday, 2 May. To cover resources, this will cost £2 per person which can be paid in cash on the day.

If your child has expressed an interest to take part in this activity and you consent to the application of henna, please complete and return the permission slip to Mrs Qadri before Thursday, 2 May.

The club runs every Monday after school 3.10pm-4.10pm in TE4, all are welcome, regardless of skill or ability. Contact Mrs Lockwood for more details.



Bringing music to your ears at break and lunch

MaBaL (Music at Break and Lunch) is music played through the school's loud speaker system during break and lunch. Chosen by Mr Taylor, Lead Teacher for Music, this is designed to offer exposure to the curriculum in different ways, and support pupils' appreciation of music.

The focus is on one theme each week across a genre, a country or from history. The theme could also link to the season, a festival or an event in school, such as the production.

Next week, it's all about: Culture

A potpourri, a melting pot, a smorgasbord; Next week's theme is music from different cultures around the world and is entirely put together by pupils, leading to Culture Day on Friday, 3 May.

Most music genres from around the world focus on the beat and rhythm, because they are mainly ceremonial and encourage people to dance or move. However, Chinese music's principal design focuses more on producing a calming effect on the listener and enhancing their productivity rather than being ceremonial.



Hispanic countries' music themes are more related to the Latin music styles

as well as their indigenous people's music. There is also the traditional mariachi music that dates back to the 1700s. On the other hand, traditional Caribbean music is known for being a melodic mix between European and African music styles.

Punjabi music became a huge trend in the UK In the late '70s because of the growing Punjabi population in these countries. Similarly, the popular Indian Bhangra music also had a strong representation around the world thanks to the Indian population in New York and Chicago. However, many of these Indian world music genres were popularised in western cultures through collaboration in songs, especially rap, which gained them more mainstream integration by non-Indian listeners.

Africa is the oldest inhabited continent in the world, encompasses a huge variety of unique musical styles, may of which also influenced some of the most popular music genres around the world today.

North African traditional music is typically unique and different from the music in central and South Africa. North African countries are mostly Arab and Mediterranean countries, so their music is more influenced by their ethnic background and common language than their geographical position. In the majority of cases, African music is known for its highly energetic and fast-paced style and is mainly used at ceremonies.

South America is popular for many things. However, South American traditional music is easily one of the most distinguishable in the world. The music in this region is known for carrying energetic vibes and rhythmic upbeat melodies that are extremely catchy and appeal to all ages, making them among the most popular types of world music. Additionally, it incorporates some elements from the African music that came with the enslaved African ancestors who were taken from West and Central Africa to the Americas.

Troy got into curling 'for something to do' in summer 2020 and found he excelled at it. He is part of Team Waring who entered the English Curling Association (ECA) England Junior Curling Championship 2024 over Easter at the Flower Ball in Garstang.

"My position is first where I throw the first stone and sweep the rest of them," said Troy.

Team Waring played six matches over four days, winning them all to be crowned the undefeated UK British Junior Champions.

The team will now go on to the World Junior B Championships as the England Junior Curling Representatives in December in Finland. If they win they will qualify for the World Junior A Championships in 2025.

"It's a very technical game," said Troy. "I like it as it keeps me active.

"It is a great achievement for our team to go

to the World Championships, it's a chance to visit Finland too as I have never been before.

"It is a hobby and just something I enjoy so I am not sure how far I want to go with my curling. I also enjoy drama at school but when I leave Priory I want to go into engineering."



Absences and Lateness to School

You may be aware that the Department for Education has recently announced national changes to penalty notices issued for unauthorised absence and lateness in term time.

These changes came into effect on 19 August 2024 and we wrote to parents on 15 April to give you advance warning and to make you aware of what this will mean for us here at Priory:

- Penalty notices issued for unauthorised absences will be charged at a new rate of £160 per parent per child.
- Any second penalty notice issued to the same parent for the same child within a rolling 3-year period will be issued at the rate of £160 to be paid within 28 days with no option for a discounted rate.
- The threshold at which a penalty notice will be issued is set at 10 'sessions'.
- Importantly and of real significance, this includes 'sessions' as a result of arriving late after the register closes in the morning or the afternoon.
- Please note, each school day is made up of two 'sessions'; one in the morning and one in the afternoon, so ten 'sessions' is classed as five days of absence and/or lateness within a rolling 10-school week period.
- Please also note that a school 'week' is determined as any week in which a school meets at least once in that week.
- The 10-school week period will also span different terms and school years.
- Finally, a maximum of two penalty notices will be issued to a parent for the same child within a rolling 3-year period, so at the third (or subsequent) absence and/or lateness, another course of action will be used (such as prosecution).

Therefore, we can't stress enough the continued importance of not only attendance, but also arriving to school on time.

Any absences for your son or daughter, whilst school is open as normal and all other pupils are in attendance, learning, means gaps in their knowledge can form in relation to their peers and could mean they will find it more difficult to catch up and meet their full potential.

Absences can and do have a lasting effect on learning. Missing a week of school for example means your child will miss around 25 hours of learning.

Whilst requests for absence can still be made using our appropriate form, it is only in the most exceptional of circumstances that any requested absence will be authorised. Holidays will continue not to be considered an exceptional circumstance.

Finally, then, can I take this opportunity to thank you for your continued support in working alongside us here at Priory to stress to your daughter or son the importance of not only their attendance at school, but their punctuality too; ensuring they are in school on time, in their lessons, learning alongside their peers.

It continues to be very much appreciated I can assure you.
