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Pupils Who Cycle To School

Lancashire Fire and Rescue Service, who delivered the session, brought with them a








crashed car from a speeding young driver who tragically died at the wheel. He was going too fast, his car hit a tree and he died instantly.

The message was very powerful and brought home to our pupils the fragility of life and the dangers of the roads. We hope the message will be sobering and long-lasting for them.



Election Fever At Priory

Election fever has taken over Learning for Life lessons over the past few weeks, resulting in a mock ballot on Thursday.

To ensure our pupils were informed about what a General Election is and who the political parties are, four of our Learning for Life lessons leading up to 4 July have been dedicated to explaining the event.

Pupils learnt about what our constituency is called (South Ribble), watched videos, and key terms were highlighted.

Yesterday, just like the adults in this country, Priory pupils went to the polls. Ballot papers were given out in Learning for Life for every pupil to vote. Teachers counted the votes and the results were announced to the whole school today to coincide with what was happening across the nation.

Over the four sessions, pupils learned about >>

- What is a General Election? What is our constituency called? Who can vote? Who can people vote for?
- What do political parties believe in? Who can people vote for in South Ribble? Party election broadcasts and bias.
- The South Ribble parties Conservatives, Labour, Liberal Democrats, Reform UK, Green and others.
- Pupils were given an overview of what each party promised to do about three key issues in the election: Education, NHS/social care, Immigration

Teachers also explained the practical side of voting (how we vote), who might win across the UK, 2019 vs.

2024, and what will happen on 4th July. Some also got to watch the main four candidates introduce themselves at a recording of the South Ribble Hustings which took place at Penwortham Golf Club on Thursday, 27 June, where they also spoke about BTECs and young people's mental health, ending with quick-fire questions from members of the public in attendance.

A Gift From Bulgaria For Priory's Gardens

The Priory Rose Garden has got some new additions – blossoming Bulgarian roses.

The Bulgarian Language School started using Priory's facilities around three years ago after hearing about the school's facilities from a member of its community who plays in an evening adult football league on the 3G pitch at the school.

Initially, the Bulgarian community wanted somewhere to host their voting for the Bulgarian general election and Priory was suggested and used. The group liked the facilities so much the Bulgarian Language School now use Hex 3 and Hex 4 every Sunday so their children born in the UK could learn the language and would be familiar with the culture when they return to Bulgaria for visits.

Priory also hosts a Bulgarian dance group on Tuesdays in our Auditorio.

Ralitsa Boykova, who runs the Bulgarian Language School, said: "We are very grateful to have this opportunity to use the



classrooms and we hope to use these premises in the future so we wanted to make a small gift to the school.

"They are three small Bulgarian oil-bearing roses. They were transported over from Bulgaria as a way of saying thank you to everyone at Priory who has been so kind and helpful in bringing our community together."

Strategic Estates Manager, Mr Bolton, said "We are appreciative of the Bulgarian Language School's use of our facilities. Their commitment to fostering language and culture is commendable. The gift of Bulgarian roses is a touching gesture, and we're pleased to be able to support their community.



"Additionally, our facilities are also hired by various sports, fitness, drama and dance schools, as well as church groups, during outof-school hours. This allows us to generate a small income that we can reinvest in the facilities for the benefit of everyone".





Year 9 Spend A Day in the CELLS



On Monday, we welcomed the CELLS team to work with our Year 9 pupils all day. CELLS stands for - Choices, Education, Learning and Lifelong Skills project.

This crime prevention charity turns negative pasts into positive futures through teaching children and young people across the North West about the consequences of crime through sharing lived experiences. Workshops included learning about age and the law, Joint Enterprise, County Lines, the dangers of being involved in drug distribution, gangs and weapons, the reality of prison life, online grooming as an entry point and the impact on families. The workshops also included a visit to a mobile prison cell which came on site.



Lead Practitioner for Personal Development, Miss Smith said "Although we do not have crime figures in our area which match those of Liverpool and Manchester, rural young people can be more susceptible to being drawn in to crime gangs unexpectedly. The workshops aim to make young people more aware of gang strategies to do this, the kinds of crimes they could get involved in and the consequences of being involved.

She continued, "The workshop team gave first hand accounts on the impact of actions from their 'previous lives' on their lives and those of others, including their nearest and dearest. They spoke about the realities of being imprisoned versus experiences witnessed through social media.

"The pupils spoke positively regarding what they had learnt and the impact the sessions had had. Our staff came away from sessions full of praise for the session content and the way sessions were delivered."

The CELLS team enjoyed their day with us and commented how polite, respectful and intelligent our young people are and would like to visit us again in the future to impact on the potential futures of more of our youngsters.







Alumni Return For Coffee, Pastries and Reminiscence

We held our Alumni Coffee Morning and it was lovely to watch as some former pupils were reunited their 'old' school friends.

Gary Jackson (Class of 1966) caught up with Ian Heyes (Class of 1968) as the pair last saw each other at school.

Ian said: "I haven't seen Gary since I was at school and I recognised him immediately! I love coming back, I came back to the 50th and 60th anniversary events.

"From school, I remember I used to water the plants of Mrs Caine, who was my form tutor in C13. The prefects used to let me in to do it in the winter! I continued my love of plants as I have a nursery. I was also cross country captain."

Gary said: "It's my first time back in 58 years. I was a bit nervous walking down the corridor to the meeting room as it used to be the staff room! I wasn't very academic or sporty and so there were good times and bad times I guess.

"I was a fitter machinist and then I joined the prison service and I have lived in Penwortham all my life. I saw lan and remembered him straight away."

Brian Drury (Class of 1963) enjoyed Science and French when he was at school.

"Science was my best subject and I did not enjoy French, learning it academically, but I do pick up languages quickly! When I left school, I was a Data Systems Engineer and now I am the Ecumenical Leader for the Baptist Churches in Lancashire, so I travel around meeting other denominational leaders. It's a bishop's role really.

"I remember at school a group of us wanted to do weightlifting so we started a weightlifting club under Mr Bray, the PE teacher. I kept at it and it helped me as my first job was digging the roads!"

Susan Watson (nee Ramsay), Gillian Gillbert (nee Baker) and Vanessa Hodson (nee Hill) are all Class of 1980 and have stayed friends.

Gillian said: "The school is completely different now, it's a lot more modern.

I was a legal secretary in London for 20-odd years and worked at UCLan as well before I retired."

Susan said: "I worked at the water board, lived in Spain and worked in travel for a lot of years. A number of us have kept in touch and recently Gillian, myself, Helen Hobson and Valerie

























Bamber (their maiden names) went on a cruise for our 60th birthdays. We also meet every Thursday for a quiz!"

Geoff Rowbotham was Head Boy in 1974 - and admitted he was shocked that it was 50 years since he last walked into school.



"I haven't been back just because, after Priory, I went

to Hutton Grammar School and then we moved to Lincolnshire. I was in management at Marks & Spencer's for 24 years and set up my own business consultancy, working with the NHS.

"I remember the buildings, some of them haven't changed, and the corridors seem a lot shorter! I remember they seemed a long way when I was a pupil. There was also two Mr McCann's – one a woodwork teacher and the other a metal work teacher. I loved sports – I played in the football and cricket teams. It is a bit surreal coming back."

Vera Shacklady (Class of 1959) said: "I came here and so did my children and grandchildren so they kept up the Priory tradition. I have been back for presentations and to pick them up.

"School has changed a lot. I remember being happy when I had to do a week's housekeeping in the flat at school – washing, ironing, cleaning and making food for the teachers. They were basics which are still needed but not taught today.

"My dream career was a nurse in the RAF but I had to leave school as my dad was ill and I had to work on the family farm. I met my husband there so things have a way of working out."

Pam and Michael Woods (Class of 1974) met at school and will celebrate their 45th wedding anniversary this year.

"Our two girls came here," said Pam, who became a midwife.

Michael said: "I enjoyed sport and practical lessons here, I ended up being an engineer before I became a Church of England vicar and have just retired."

Margaret Johnson and Pat Lee (Class of 1967) are good friends and meet up with other former classmates.

Pat said: "We met at primary school and stayed friends through high school. Then a number of us went different ways but we came back together through Facebook around five years ago and it's like we were never separated!"


The U15s also played against All Hallows A and B team and Bishops Rawstorne, with harsher rules, being in the older category.
