## Tears and Triumph: Miss Beesley Bids Farewell to Her Year 11 Football Stars

Miss Beesley admitted there were tears as her Year 11 football team played their final match.

PE teacher Miss Beesley has guided the girls from Year 7 and watched them grow and develop through the years. They reached the final of the South Ribble Cup against Balshaw's High School last Friday, 4 June but lost 9-4 at UCLan Sports Arena.

Miss Beesley said: "It was the first ever South Ribble Cup for girls teams this year and the fact we are one of the first two teams to get into the final is a fantastic achievement.

"It's testament to the drive nationally that we have had to promote girls' football overall.

"We were 4-1 down but then came back to 6-4 before a few mistakes cost us but I am immensely proud that we got to the first girls' South Ribble Final and came runners-up. There was a lot of emotion! Goals were from Mia C, Molly and Caitlyn.

"I am sad they are going. I have been with them since Year 7 and I am so proud of them all. I have watched them grow into strong, confident, independent women who have been flying the flag for girls' football."



Ronnie said: "I want to become a joiner and am currently looking for an apprenticeship. I made a bench with my dad last year and it's something I enjoyed.

"I came to Priory in Year 8. I like all the teachers and have taken part in extra-curricular activities such as football."

"My uncle does it and so it's something I want to do but I know you have to start with some money to build your business and I am still working on that!

"I am going to Newman College to study Maths, Economics and another A-Level which I haven't decided on yet as it depends on my GCSE results.

What's NEXT?

"I have thought about becoming a doctor but it's very

competitive and chemistry is my favourite subject so I think I will be better suited to a laboratory job.

"I am going to LUSoM (Lancaster University School of Mathematics) to study Maths, Further Maths, Biology and Chemistry A-Levels. I wanted to do Geography as well but they said five was too much!

"I have enjoyed Priory. The facilities are brand new and that's why I chose to come here. I have also had a lot of opportunities

to develop my music, I have played the piano in assemblies, and also entered art competitions."

**Chittara** is keen on engineering but is also thinking about a career in quantum mechanics.

"I have also thought about quant training which is using maths algorithms to find out how trading works. There are a few options – it's the same journey to a point and then I can choose which way I want to go.

"I will either go to LUSoM or Newman College and study four A-Levels – Maths, Physics and then either Economics, Chemistry or Further Maths, depending where I go to."

He said: "I may go to Preston College and do automotive engineering or Runshaw College and do electrical engineering.

"I like to know how things work, I have always had a curious mind.

"My grandad and step-dad were engineers so I think that's why I want to go that way.


Science Technician Mr Evans and Head of Science Mr Bedford, made the short journey to Middleforth to deliver the lesson.

# Year 8 Pupils Discover Careers of the <sup>C</sup> Future with 3D Printing Workshop

Sixty Year 8 pupils were selected by Head of ICT & Computer Science, Mrs Qadri, to take part in an exciting #InspiringLancashire project last Tuesday, funded by BAE Systems.

Priory was given a 3D printer as part of the linkup and we have worked with CREATE Education to deliver the school-based 3D Printing Workshop Day. Mrs Qadri had taken part in a training day at CREATE Education in Chorley and part of the project was that BAE Systems, through CREATE, will offer 60 Year 8 students a 3D Printing Workshop Day as well as a day of careers advice

"BAE Systems want to create more jobs in the future in the Lancashire area and they hope, by training pupils on such items as 3D printers and show how they are used in their business, this will give them an understanding of the careers available to them and the chance to stay in Lancashire for the jobs," said Mrs Qadri.

At the workshop, the pupils designed a mini rocket ship and printed it as well as learnt simple CAD/CAM skills.

Students were working at a much faster pace than when we ran the event last year and they even managed to personalise their rocket ships with their names.

"I will have a big job to get all their designs 3D printed in different colours over the next few weeks!" said Mrs Qadri.

Year 8 Leon W said, "I didn't know about 3D printing but now my knowledge has been expanded - now I can make 3D models and designs on 'Onshape' and use them on 'Cura'. I've also learnt how 3D printing can be used in different industries, and in future careers.'

Emma N added, "Today was quite complicated and hard to understand but I'm very glad I did it because I never actually realised what 3D printing was and now I see that it is very interesting and is used lots in construction and other careers."







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Freya C said, "Today I found out actual jobs I did not know used 3D printing such as Formula One racing, when making props and in nursing. I would like to be a fashion designer and it was helpful to know how some materials can come from the 3D printer. I did not know about doctors using 3D printers for hands."



Lillia S continued on the same theme with, "Prosthetic limbs can also be made in the medical field. Also, food can be made from a 3D printer!"

Thinking ahead, Oliver C concluded, "I've learnt about what I want to take into my Options with Computing

definitely one of them, thanks to this workshop."

Pharaoh agreed, "This has also made me see Tech and Engineering GCSEs in a new light."

Now that students have developed their design skills, they will also be taking part in an Inspiring Lancashire Challenge Project where they will have to design a prototype product (or a part for a product) that will either:

help in one small way to improve the environment in or around a local waterway (river, canal, lake or sea) or

for one or more species of local wildlife.

# **Building Futures: Tyson Construction Visits Priory For Careers Talk**



Last week pupils who are interested in a career in construction were invited to a careers talk by Philip Helm from Tyson Construction.



Philip talked to pupils about the importance of personal qualities and attributes

developed in school and their relevance in the future. He discussed different roles in the organisation and qualification pathways to them. He also talked about Tyson as a company and showed pupils images of developments in the locality.

Lead Practitioner for Careers Development and Priory's Careers Adviser, Ms Smith said "I am so pleased to have been offered the opportunity to work with Philip and Tyson as we have a large cohort of interested pupils."

"Over 40 pupils attended this session and Philip has offered to allow pupils to come and see the Quinn Street site in Leyland develop. At the time of writing, I plan to take a group of pupils to the site to look at the site footprint



with footings and service lines. In the next few months we plan to revisit to watch the site develop to completion".

Philip has said to Ms Smith that he was impressed with the school site and facilities, the vast range of activities offered to pupils as demonstrated in our termly newsletters and the enthusiasm of pupils for construction. This enthusiasm was demonstrated when a number of pupils remained behind to discuss Tyson's current construction experience through discussion and photographs.



#### It All Adds Up: Priory Pupils Smash National Maths Challenge

Year 7 Zach was the star of the UKMT Junior Maths Challenge at Priory.

United Kingdom Mathematics Trust

Run by the UK Maths Trust, it's a national competition for Years 7 and 8 where there are multiple choice answers and it's completed in school. Pupils use their best problem-solving, fluency and reasoning skills to tackle some really difficult questions

Maths teacher Mr Hunter has run this challenge for a number of years and this year got more pupils involved – with 99 sitting the first round.

Year 7 Zach achieved 102 points and received a Gold Certificate and he was Best in School.

Zach said: "I was surprised as I struggled to concentrate and didn't think I had done as well as I had. I do like Maths but my favourite subjects are Art and Music."



Adam, also in Year 7, was just a point behind and also achieved a Gold certificate. He said: "It's the first time I have done anything like this and it was fine. It got harder as we went along but I was happy with my score."

Both pupils went through to the next stage which took place on Tuesday – the Junior Kangaroo.

Year 8 Kaif received a Silver certificate, he was Best in Year 8, and said: "I am pretty happy with that."

Year 7 Oliver H also received a Silver Certificate. "It was really hard so it was a big achievement to get a Silver Certificate."

Mr Hunter said: "They have all done brilliantly, especially the Year 7s who got the highest scores. We trialled a bigger intake this year and 99 pupils were involved which was a success.

"They smashed it and all have done really well. To get a Gold, Silver or Bronze certificate is a huge achievement as it is a hard challenge."



#### Wired for the Future: Students **Tour National Grid Site**

Last week Ms Smith and other staff took groups of young people down to the Hutton Substation to tour the site and learn about what the National Grid does as a company and its different careers.

Pupils had a lengthy health and safety briefing, donned PPE and entered the secure site. This visit is part of a number of activities the National Grid offers us to introduce pupils to careers in engineering and electricity.

Ms Smith said "It has been great to see so many pupils appear on the 'Interested' in electricity careers' list. This is the first day of trips and have two more to follow. The attendance list for these is well subscribed, without pupils knowing a trip was planned. The pupils, as expected, were sensible and followed health and safety instructions well. I hope pupils now have a greater understanding of what the "Giant metal structure in a field" does, its significance and the roles required to maintain it.

National Grid staff were astounded by the array of interesting questions pupils asked about their work and the site. Questions included - Where are the

highest pylons? To where is the longest stretch of cable between pylons? What happens if part or all of the Hutton site fails to work?

Pupils learned that the pylons across the River Ribble are some of the tallest in the country. Pupils also saw the equipment which was floated up the River Ribble and discussed the activities around that process, including problems and solutions. Pupils enjoyed the visit and came away with further knowledge of electricity transfer.


