

It was chocolate heaven in the Food Technology room on Thursday night when Year 8 was invited to celebrate International Chocolate Day (which is today, 13 September).






Pupils that went along to the after-school cookery class got to have a go at making a batch of chocolate brownies.


This is a one-off payment and covers all the dishes pupils will make, and take home, over the academic year.


GCSE Results Day: Their Stories

Preston celebrated eight Grade 9s - a clean sweep!

Preston will now go onto LUSoM (Lancaster University School of Maths)

and has maths as his priority after celebrating a Grade 9 in Maths and Further Maths. He also got a Level 2 Distinction* in Engineering.




"I want to do something with Maths in the future. Maths is fun and the Further Maths was an extra qualification. It gives me a head start with my A-Levels."

Maths teacher Mr Hunter said: "It's a great achievement for Preston to get a Grade 9. Further Maths is an extra GCSE and it's really tough. We got quite a few with a Even Grade 5-9 which is brilliant."

Twin sister, **Lily**, has exceeded expectations.

"I was shocked I got a Grade 9 in chemistry. I got a seven in my mock so I was pleased with that. I got a Grade 9 in Art which was amazing as I took it on my own, I had my own classroom and worked with Miss Smith.

"I want to go to Newman College and study Biology, Art, Maths and German. It will be weird being separated from Preston for the first time but the colleges are next door to each other!"





Miss Smith said about Lily's Art: "Despite the Art & Design GCSE course being discontinued, Lily wanted to take it as an extra subject as she wanted to do Art at A-Level.



"I gave up my time and she came to me every Friday and camped in my office. The moderator praised her work, her imagination and how she used materials. It was really personal because she had taken it on her own so it was special. To achieve a 9 is superb."

We feel proud, as adults in the school, to have been a part of these young peoples' lives, their achievements and, based on their individual abilities and resilience, proud of the unique accomplishments each of them has made.

Sam got what he expected – 7 Grade 9s and one Grade 8 as well as a Level 2 Distinction* in Engineering.

"I kind of expected what I got although I expected an 8 in English and I got a 9 so I was surprised at that.

"I want to go to Newman College and study Maths, Further Maths, Chemistry and Biology. I want to do something with medicine."



Issac was delighted with a Grade 8 in Maths – as that's what he wants to do in the future. "I needed a high score so am happy with an 8 as I want to do Maths at university."

Issac achieved seven GCSEs and a Level 2 Distinction in Engineering. "I aim to do Maths, Further Maths, Economics and Physics either at LUSoM or Newman College.

"In the future, I want to do Maths or finance. I like maths as there is an answer – in English there are a number of interpretations! I like STEM."

Madison has her sights set on business. She got six GCSEs, Grades 8 and 7, and a Level 2 Distinction in Business & Enterprise and Digital Information Technology.



"I aim to go to Newman College and study A-Levels in Business and Economics and a BTEC in Law."

Emmie is also keeping her options open.

"I am going to go to Newman College to study Graphic Design, Sociology and French. I like Graphic Design and want a career in that but I am also good at French so we shall see.

Emmie achieved seven GCSEs – with four 9s and three 8s – as well as a Level 2 Distinction in Graphic Design.

It's a performing arts college and Lewis is one of 18 who have secured a place in its first year.

Lewis was a Head Prefect at Priory and has also been in almost all the school productions during his time at Priory. He is pictured below with his former Form Tutor, Mr Watters.



continue through to Year 10, when they may opt to take a GCSE.


Introductory letters are available from the Science department or can be downloaded from the school website at www.priory.lancs. sch.uk/parents/letters.

a GCSE a year early is good practise for Year 11."

Year 11 Thomas said: "I took Astronomy as it's an extra GCSE and I found space interesting, how insignificant but unique we are! It is difficult but I have managed to stay with it. I would say to a Year 9 if you are smart enough, go for it."



CLASS OF 2018 Josh Traynor

Josh, who left Priory six years ago with high ambitions, has won the pool U23 World Championships.

The World Eightball Pool Federation (WEPF) Championships were held at Blackpool in June. Josh came away with two titles – the Under 23s World Champion and the Under 23s England Team World Champion.

Josh competed as a team of four to take away the



E n g l a n d team world champions title. He then went on to play in the singles events which tested him at the 'very highest level', winning his last 32 matches. Josh played against 'one of the best players in the world' who played 'almost perfect' pool – Karl Sutton.



Josh said: "I was absolutely made up to get that far and play a player like Karl deep into the tournament."

He added: "It has been an ambition and dream of mine ever since I picked up a cue. I sacrificed a lot to achieve this and it really does show that if you put your mind to something and have the right support and people around you then you can be successful."

Back in 2018 Josh said he put a lot of his success down to his time at Priory as Principal Mr Eastham gave him time off to practice and attend tournaments.

"They were really good with me, they let me have days off and supported my dream. I really appreciated it all," said Josh.





Mobile Phone Policy

We of course understand that parents may wish their child to carry a mobile phone for their personal safety, so as a school, we take a sensible and practical approach with this in mind.

Whilst mobile phones can be brought into school, to minimise any detrimental impact they may have on our core purpose of 'Learning to Succeed', every day, the following applies once pupils enter the school grounds:

- Mobile phones must be 'off and out of sight', always.
- They should not be seen on the school site at any time.
- All pupils have a locker, so we advise them to store phones securely in their locker at the start of the day.
- If not in their locker, then they should be kept in their bags, but they must be 'off and out of sight', always.
- The only exception is that they may be used in the school reception area after 3:20pm to contact parents regarding travel arrangements, with the permission of a member of staff.
- If your daughter or son needs to contact home for any reason during the school day, they should go to either the school reception or the Pastoral office, at either break or lunchtime, and we will allow them to use a school phone.
- To support us in implementing our procedures, we would ask that if you need to contact your daughter or son during the school day, that you ring the school and a message will be passed on to your daughter or son by a member of staff.
- If you require a response to the message from your daughter or son, a member of staff will allow them to use a school phone to call you.
- Pupils who bring mobile phones into school do so entirely at their own risk.
- The school cannot accept any responsibility for theft, loss, damage or health effects (potential or actual) resulting from their use.



Consequences:

 Any pupil seen by a member of staff with a mobile phone will have the device confiscated by that member of staff for it not being 'off and out of sight'.



- by a member of staff at breaks or lunch time, will be taken to the Pastoral office, where they will be named and locked away securely until the end of the day.
- If a mobile phone is confiscated by a member of staff during a lesson, a member of the Pastoral Team or Senior Leadership Team (SLT) will come to the lesson to collect the mobile phone and take it to the Pastoral office for secure storage.
- Confiscated mobile phones may be collected by the pupil, from the Pastoral Office, at the end of the day, and they will be issued with an SLT After School Detention.
- If any pupil refuses to give any member of staff their mobile phone for it not being 'off and out of sight', the pupils' parent/guardian will be contacted, and the pupil will be sent home.
- The following morning, the parent/guardian will need to come into school with their daughter or son to meet with a member of SLT.
- Persistent flouting of the mobile phone rules will result in inclusion in our isolation and reflection room.
- As such, a pupil who persistently has their mobile phone confiscated will result in the device being placed in the school safe until a parent or guardian is able to come to school to collect the device and speak to a member of the Senior Leadership Team.
