Long-Serving Former Food Tech Teacher Returns to Open Priory's New Food Service Outlet

Priory's Pod has officially opened for pupils and the community.

The food service Pod is located between the Science Department and the Technology Block and is used by pupils as well as now being open to the public who use the Priory facilities out of school hours.

The Pod was officially opened by former Food Technology teacher Miss Lewis-Lavender who was at Priory from 1980 before she retired in 2019.

Former Head Girl Emma Rooke, who left Priory in 2014, was also invited to cut the ribbon who, under Miss Lewis-Lavender's tutelage, won a number of chef competitions and has gone on to have a successful career in the world of catering.

Also in attendance were trustees, representatives from builders Austin Watson Ltd, staff and pupils.

Vice Principal Mrs Cowell said: "The food service Pod is more than just an outdoor cafeteria - it is a practical solution to enhance our facilities and offers a welcoming space for everyone to enjoy.

"The Pod will provide students and staff with access to delicious hot snacks and drinks throughout the week. But its purpose extends beyond the school day; on evenings and weekends it will also serve members of the public, creating a space where the community can connect and share a little warmth and hospitality.

Message from the Principal

Dear All

May I take this opportunity to welcome you back following our Christmas and New Year break and to wish you all the very best for a great 2025.

"As well convenience, this food service Pod symbolises our commitment to improving the school experience everyone. It will be a place to pause, refuel, and connect, whether during a busy school day, attending an event or using our sports facilities outside school hours."

Miss Lewis-Lavender said: "I haven't been back to Priory since I retired so it's lovely to be invited back and appreciated. It's nice seeing all the changes

since I was here."

Miss Rooke said: "I am always glad to come back to Priory. There have been such massive changes at the school since I left and it's exciting to see it as it is.

"To have a facility like this would have been amazing in my school days.

"Lunch and breaks are a massive part of school life. It's a time to spend with friends, and areas like this will certainly aid that."

Steve Peters from Austin Watson said: "It took around four-five weeks to build the Pod over summer and these facilities are getting more popular in schools, having nice seating and eating areas which are more like a café than a canteen."



Strategic Estates D e v e I o p m e n t Manager Mr Bolton added: "We had the idea of a Pod and then researched to see which companies offered these types of facilities that could



give us the flexibility that we required. We decided upon purchasing the pod unit and equipment from Bournville Catering, who are experts in this field.

"It's been very popular with pupils and has been set up as a 'grab and go,' so pupils can get something to eat on their way to play sports at break or lunch.



"Street food is popular with the younger generation and then at weekends and evenings the community can get a warm drink and food while they are watching or taking part in sport.

"It will bring revenue back into the school that we can reinvest with more facilities like this."

Year 11 Emily said: "I like the Pod, it's accessible and just easier to get something to eat. The Bistro can get over-crowded so this makes it a lot easier, especially if you are heading off to the 3G."

Year 11 AJ added: "The Pod is great, it eases congestion at the Bistro and it's really convenient if you are coming from Tech or Art."

Miss Lewis-Lavender and Miss Rooke then judged a cake decorating competition with Year 11 Jolie crowned the winner.

Jolie said: "I was surprised. I take GCSE Food Tech and we decorated the cakes in our lesson so it took about an hour. Food Tech is my favourite subject."

The cakes that were entered into the competition were later sold at lunchtime and £73 was raised for Derian House Children's Hospice.

Transition From School Synergy to Arbor

Arbor Replaced by Synergy and SIMS

As part of our ongoing efforts to enhance communication and streamline information for parents, Penwortham Priory Academy has moved its school Management Information System (MIS) from SIMS and Synergy to a new application called Arbor.





What is Arbor?

Arbor is an application that enables parents and carers to have an immediate overview of many aspects of school life, including behaviour, attendance and communication.

Arbor can be viewed on any device in either a web browser (Parent Portal) or by downloading the Arbor Parent App (you can use both).

Once registered, parents and carers can view information tailored for their child(ren). The behaviour module provides a real time view displaying positive comments and points awarded as well as informing you where aspects of behaviour may be limiting progress.

When does is come into effect?

This change has been in the planning stages for almost six months culminating with the changeover on Monday, 6 January. Whilst parents can still access Synergy until 31 January data, including attendance data, will no longer be updated on that platform.

Can pupils have access to Arbor?

Arbor has worked seamlessly in school so far and as a result we are now in a position to release the Pupil App at an earlier opportunity than we had originally planned.

The pupils have been supported during Learning for Life sessions to install the app on their phone and log in. We will continue to assist any pupil who is experiencing difficulty with activating their account. We have also distributed instructions via their year group Microsoft Teams and to parents via email so pupils can log in at home with the support of parents if necessary.

How can parents access Arbor?

The Parent App for Arbor has now been released. An email and text with step by step instructions has been sent to parents earlier this week. Please check your junk/spam folder if you haven't received it. Instructions can also be downloaded from the school website at>>

www.priory.lancs.sch.uk/parents/arbor

The set-up process for parents is identical to that of the pupils so they may like to guide parents with its installation where required.

What's on the apps?

Both apps, Pupil and Parent, offer the opportunity to view behaviour points, timetables, attendance data and homework (called Assignments on Arbor). All homework will be listed on Arbor from now on. The Parent App also provides additional features, such as the facility to update contact information, and others will be enabled in the coming months.

We appreciate your understanding and co-operation as we work towards creating a more efficient and effective communication and information system for our school community.






An outline of the week's schedule is:

On Monday, 13 January a team of six Year 8 students had the opportunity to become engineers for the day as they took on the IET's Faraday Challenge at Hutton Grammar School, the hosts.

The IET Faraday Challenge is a national challenge running across the UK for Year 8 students. The challenge days focus on fun, teamwork and transferrable skills, whilst putting projects into a real-world context.

As the day began, students were given a brief to develop and create a prototype for a product which provided them with

the opportunity to research, design and discuss solutions for a real-life engineering problem.

ICT & Computing teacher, Miss Gregson, said, "Unfortunately, we're not able to share any content about the brief as the competition is still live and other schools will be participating around the country. However, it was a pleasure to observe our students work together and share ideas for their design."

Students were given a ration of 'Faradays', a currency they could use to spend in the shop, filled with everything a budding engineer could need to construct their prototype. At the end of the day, students presented their idea and prototype as a team. They discussed the target audience and the materials they would use.

Miss Gregson continued, "Despite another team taking home the trophy, our team still performed exceptionally well and I am very proud of them."

All students will receive an Industrial Cadets Challenger Award for completing a hands-on problem solving and critical thinking activity. Industrial Cadets is run by the EDT - Engineering Development Trust - and they work with UK employers



to create a talent pipeline and future skilled workforce, whilst helping young people to develop the skills they need to enter industry with confidence.

Year 8 Imogen enjoyed the day, saying "It was a helpful experience for engineering and a fun way to learn about it and what you can do with such skills."

Zach added, "During the day we have learned how to work as a team and learn how to save money. Working as a team is great for lots of jobs such as working as an engineer, and you learn to work well with the other people alongside you."





Learn to succeed

Year 7 Pupils Line Up Their Models To Impress Geography Teachers



Pupils have once again got creative for the annual Geography Contours Competition.

Year 7 was given a project to create a 3D contour model of a landscape, combining creativity and hands-on learning. Guided by their geography teachers, each class explored the intricacies of topographic maps and translated them into physical form.

Using layers of cardboard, foam and other craft materials, pupils had carefully cut and stacked pieces to replicate the natural contours of hills, valleys, and plateaus.

The finished models will be displayed in the Humanities department, serving as a testament to the pupils' hard work and a resource for future lessons.

Geography teacher, Mr Momoniat said, "This project was set as a creative step in making geography lessons interactive and memorable for the pupils".

He added, "First place Sophie L used wood and polystyrene to create a model featuring a stunning waterfall, inspired by the book Kensuke's Kingdom. She told me she enjoyed the hands-on process of building it herself."



Information on the School nursing service in Lancashire*

About Us

School Nurses are Registered Nurses who have a graduate level qualification in public health and the health needs of school-aged children & young people. Their fundamental role is to improve children and young people's health and

School Nurses are responsible for delivering the Department of Health recommended Healthy Child Programme (HCP) 5-19. This includes promoting the health, wellbeing and protection of all children and young people of school age (up to 19 years old), working with education colleagues and the wider multiagency team and helping to improve public health outcomes for children, young people and families. School Nurses are also responsible for delivering the National Child Measurement Programme (NCMP) in reception and Year 6 and the Health Needs Assessments (HNA) in reception, year 6 and Year 9.

The School Health Team also includes: Community Staff Nurses and Healthy Family Support Workers (HFSW) who play an integral role in the delivery of the

The School Health Team usually sees children at school or college but may occasionally see them in the home or other community settings.

The school nursing service has two teams for service delivery

Universal Reach Team:

This team will deliver a universal service to all children and young people with a focus on public health interventions and assessment of health needs. This includes a named link school nurse to each school/ college, delivery of the School Health Needs Assessment process and the National Child Measurement Programme in line with the Healthy Child Programme.

Specialist Services Team:

This team will be responsible for providing support to the most vulnerable children and young people. Although not directly linked to individual schools, the practitioners will work closely with staff in the relevant schools/colleges for which these children and young people attend. The team will attend identified Child Protection, Child in Need meetings, undertaking individual health assessments and providing identified packages of care.

The School Health Team works together with other agencies and as part of a wider interdisciplinary team to support the health and wellbeing of school-aged
