





CyberFirst Trip Looks To The Future



On Thursday, 14 November a group of Year 8 and Year 9 pupils attended the CyberFirst Day at HOST, MediaCity, Salford.

This event was designed to transform the way students think about careers in computing and included immersive and inspiring activities led by some of the leading tech organisations from around the world.

Head of ICT & Computing, Mrs Qadri, said, "The goal of these events is to reach students at a pivotal moment in their education to change their perspectives on computing and to inspire the next generation of cyber-professionals".



Students heard from inspirational leaders in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Maths) with the intention to spark their interest in technology careers

whilst also exploring the latest innovations in AI, cyber security, data science and robotics.

Pupils toured HOST encompassing their eSports, Internet of Things Avenue and Immersive Lab. This was followed by a 'The Future of Technology' talk where they discussed AI jobs of the future, took part in a quiz and debated the ethics of AI.



The first interactive workshop involved a Digital Detective Challenge with Data Analytics, Open Source Intelligence and a GeoGuessr activity before moving on to the second

workshop where pupils were challenged to 'Crack the Code', competing in teams to unlock devices against the clock with cryptography challenges that explored the foundations of cyber security. To top the visit off, pupils took part in a virtual reality gaming experience.

The pupils had a fantastic day and even managed to have a look around Media City to see the BBC and ITV studios. Here's what they said about it:

Year 9 Excellence I said, "The trip was fun, exciting,

w e I c o m i n g, enjoyable and lots more. I think we should do more tech based trips like this one so we can get a better feel of how tech will be like for us in the near future. I enjoyed the




various quizzes but I loved the gaming areas the most. Overall it was an amazing trip."

Year 10 & Community Use Toilet Facilities Project

Since Priory took over the running of its out of school hours hire in 2021 there has been a need to provide better toilet facilities for Year 10 pupils and community users of the school's football and cricket facilities.

As the school's commitment to the South Ribble local leisure plan, we applied to South Ribble Borough Council for financial assistance towards creating improved toilet, changing and accessible toilet facilities close to the school's 3G and grass pitches which are used in the evenings and weekends by local teams and clubs.

Priory was successful in being awarded a grant by the council which PPA Facilities, the school's lettings management arm, boosted. Together these funds have enabled the building of the fresh facilities seen today.

This toilet area had not had any major work done to it for at least 25 years and it is now fit for modern purposes. They were originally two toilet blocks which were old-fashioned and badly in need of renovation, there was also a lot of wasted space. Over

the summer holidays, it was transformed into toilets for Year 10s to use during school hours and they will also be used by the community, via facility hire, in the evenings and weekends. In addition, two brand new changing rooms have been added to the plan, alongside a refurbished accessible toilet that can also be accessed outside of school hours.

Priory's Strategic Estates Development Manager Mr Bolton said: "There was a male and female toilet block originally and such a lot of wasted space."

"They needed updating and we needed to use the space better both for our pupils and for the community using our facilities outside of school hours."

"They have been completely transformed. The toilets

are more inviting and I am really pleased with how they have turned out. They now look modern and fresh."





"As well as the toilets, we added two new changing rooms which are a superb use of the space and they will make our facilities more attractive to clubs wanting to use them. We didn't have anywhere for teams to change previously so this is something else which the community can use when they have booked our facilities such as the 3G pitches or the cricket wicket."

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Austin Watson Ltd were the building main contractors and Director Luke Watson said: "We were the main contractor so we were working on the job all over the

summer, liaising with the architects Eric Wright and Mr Bolton.

"It took about ten weeks to complete and there was pressure as we needed to finish before school restarted but I think we thrive under pressure and I am really pleased with how it's all turned out."

Senior Building Surveyor from Eric Wright Partnership Ltd Ian Duffy said: "We did the initial designs and there was such a lot of wasted space originally. It's been brilliant working with Mr Bolton and Austin Watson Ltd which made the job easy for us."

Principal Mr Eastham said: "They are absolutely fantastic. We let parents and pupils look around the new Year 10 toilets and the changing rooms on Open Evening and they were calling it 'posh' and were blown away by the facilities. They make such a difference."

The project's main contractor, local company Austin Watson Ltd used local sub-contractors for all elements of the build. These sub-contractors are also companies that Priory commissions regularly for work on the estate.

Year 11 Geography River Field Visit - Wycoller

Once again, the GCSE Geography students donned their outdoor gear and prepared themselves for the great outdoors. This time, a visit to Wycoller to complete their fieldwork study to complement Papers 1 & 3 of their GCSE exams this summer.

A couple of great days were had, with the weather holding out on both occasions for two dry and fine days.

Students were able to test the Bradshaw Model of river change and test their own hypotheses to prove what had been learnt in class. Students tested river width, depth, velocity, pebble size and pebble roundness and

compared this against the Bradshaw Model.



Students were also given the opportunity to discuss the fieldwork methods and test the accuracy and reliability of their techniques. This involved group discussions and practical method adaptation live in the field to improve the techniques being used. It was fantastic to see.

We are always really proud of our students when representing Priory and this was no exception. All students showed respect to each other, the environment and the general public on the visit - complimented by several people over the course of the two days.



No fieldwork is complete without a treat for our students and the retired Mr Watters would be unhappy to this day if our students weren't rewarded at the end of a trip for their impeccable behaviour and outstanding work ethic. Therefore, in true Mr Watters style - a stop off at Greggs was in order on the way home to warm up and sample the delights of their infamous sausage rolls. I think Priory cleaned out the shop!



Well done to all the Geographers and I would personally like to thank Mrs Kursitis, Mrs Holland and Mr Eccles for their support over the two days. Without such kind volunteering of their time, trips like this couldn't happen.

Doctor, Doctor Tell Me About Careers in Medicine


On Monday, 11 November we welcomed Dr Dunni Adeniyi into school to talk to pupils about careers in medicine.

This week we interviewed a trainee teacher who has been taken under the wings of the English department.

Meet The Teacher - Miss Atkinson (English)

What made you want to become a teacher?

My parents are both nurses so I wanted to work in a profession where I help and look after people. I don't really have the stomach for blood so teaching was better for me.

I completed my English Degree at the University of Derby and then I did an English Masters, specialising in Victorian Studies, at the University of Liverpool.

What's the hardest thing about your job?

I would say it's the timing as it's so hard to fit everything into one hour. You have to teach your subject but you also want to build relationships with the pupils and help them so an hour doesn't seem enough.

What do you like to do in your free time?

It will come as no surprise that the answer is 'read'. I especially like to read the poems from French poet, Charles Baudelaire. His most famous collection is: 'Flowers of Evil.'


"It's a really good sport. Sometimes there are ramps and, indoors, I tend to go at speeds of 40mph and outdoors it's 60mph.

Behind The Scenes: The ICT Team



In the fourth part of this series, we're shining a spotlight on the ICT team as we explore their contributions and learn more about the people who ensure we stay connected and have the most up to date technology to carry out our work efficiently, every day.

Technology and computer usage is an ever evolving and increasing demand in modern society and the work place. Priory has around 750 pupils and 100 staff and, behind the scenes, there is a small ICT Team who make sure everything runs smoothly every day whilst also looking to the future for new technologies that can help school life.

The ICT team is part of the Facilities Management team at Priory which is headed up by Strategic Estates Development Manager, Mr Bolton.

In his ICT Team is Senior ICT Technician Mr Eccles who has been at the school for over 20 years, and

ICT Technicians Mr O'Connor and Mr Oakes.

Each team at the school has a strategic mission with the ICT team's being: "Empowering all staff and pupils to engage in the very best teaching and learning through the use of cutting edge technologies."

"Every day is different," said Mr Bolton, who has been at Priory for 22+ years. "We deal with the ICT issues all around school which, day-to-day, usually means password changes, login issues or printer problems. The team deals with everything that uses technology in the school.

"The role has changed a lot as originally it was about computers physically based in school whereas now everything is in the cloud so it's about making sure the connectivity is everywhere for the pupils and staff. We also have to make sure everything is safe and



secure to reduce any attempts at hacking accounts and systems.

"We are always trying to improve what we do and we have a lot of pride in our work at Priory, which is why we have an in-house team. Our staff also help other schools and we work closely with Lostock Hall Academy so it's about supporting our community and sharing our skills.

"ICT in a school has obviously grown a lot over the years. Technology is a major part of our lives nowadays much more than it was 22 years ago when I started here at Priory.

"We are always looking for more ways to adapt and improve what the ICT can do for the school. We have recently introduced digital signage, and now have two big TV display screens where we advertise, for

example, clubs, house events, diary dates, menus and the school newsletter. It's important to keep everyone informed and these act as a reminder and are an outlet for information, broadcasting in real time

"The team attends strategic meetings each month with Principal Mr Eastham to continue looking ahead at what the team needs to focus on to keep Priory advancing its technical systems. We recently reviewed the school's requirements for firewalls and broadband connectivity as the contract expired in the summer. We are looking to the future to improve the technology we currently use to make sure it is fit for purpose for the incoming years. We have seen an increase in use of systems and technologies that use the internet more. Subsequently, the school has moved its services into the cloud, embracing the Microsoft Office 365 environment. As technology advances, we are making sure we are moving with it by assessing what we are using now and what we may need in the future. We know AI will feature heavily so we are currently reviewing how this can be of use to the education sector for teachers, support staff and students alike."




