Black History Month

As a theme for all of October, as it is Black History Month in the UK, Mr Taylor has been working with Year 11 pupil, DaMari, on playlists for the three weeks leading up to half term and the one week afterwards, all in October and all by black musicians from around the world.

Black History Month began in the US in the 1920s, and was first celebrated in the UK in 1987, providing an opportunity for everyone to share, celebrate and understand the impact of black heritage and culture.


100 years ago, the event was the brainchild of Carter G Woodson, known as the father of black history. Born in Virginia in 1875 to parents who were former slaves, he had limited access to education and job opportunities. But he was able to study at one of the few high schools for black students after saving money earned by working as a coal miner. Woodson went on to gain various qualifications, including a PhD in history from Harvard University, and became a professor at Howard University. Throughout his life, he worked tirelessly to promote black history in schools.

The music is organised into decades rather than specific genres so it will run as,

The Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award requires students to complete three sections: volunteering, physical fitness, and learning a new skill. Our pupils


excelled in all areas, demonstrating their commitment and resilience. Their efforts have not only earned them this prestigious award but have also contributed to their personal growth and development.

Faith Day Year 10 & Year 11 Thursday, 10 October

Over the year Key Stage 4 pupils are taught their entitlement to the Religious Education curriculum on what we call Faith Days. These are separate days in the calendar where pupils focus on a particular faithbased topic, lead by Mrs Ham, Lead Techer of RE.

On these days, Year 10 & Year 11 pupils attend their timetabled lesson and the class teacher will deliver the Faith Day material from Period 1-4. Period 5 and 6 will be their normal lesson.

Year 10's topic for the day will be 'Prejudice and Discrimination' with a focus on Hate Crime and Cohesion. They will look at

why hate crime happens, identify evidence of prejudiced attitudes through case studies and discussion, learn what community cohesion is and why it is important.



Year 11s topic is 'In the Beginning'. They will gain

an overview of theories about the creation of the universe, look at Christian and Muslim creation stories and learn about the scientific theory of evolution.

Year 11 will go on to examine Christian and Muslim responses to the theory of evolution and the conflict between science and religion. Pupils will also learn about the concept of stewardship and how humans should care for the planet. Pupils will end with a discussion and debate around the sanctity of life.
