Year 9 Discover Languages At Work

Year 9 pupils learnt about careers where a foreign language is vital, in the third successful 'Make Languages Work' event held at Priory.

Head of Languages, Mrs Scully, split the day into two parts with the aim to show how languages can be used in a range of careers.

"I started with an assembly where I talked about languages and links to different careers," said Mrs Scully.

"I spoke about how Manchester GCHQ outreach programme is looking for linguists which will provide opportunities in the future and is always good to know.

"It's the third year we have run this event and every time it gets better.

"The pupils are so engaged, they really buy into it, asking a lot of questions and the relevance of languages to different jobs."

One half of the day included presentations in Chinese from the Confucius Institute at UCLan as well as a presentation from Médecins Sans Frontières where they talked about the value of different languages and the need for translators in the developing world.



Business & Enterprise Pupils Face Ethical Dilemmas at Runshaw College



On Wednesday, the Year 10 Business & Enterprise pupils visited Runshaw College for a Business Ethics Challenge.

Every day in the highly dynamic and complex world of Business, entrepreneurs and large corporations are challenged by ethical business dilemmas while balancing the need to make a profit. For many companies, Corporate Social Responsibility is at the heart of their decision-making process on many daily business issues. Yet it is not always easy to 'do the right thing' or to act ethically when stakeholders may have very different views about how a business should act. For example, a customer may require something very



different to an employee or an investor. Eventually, business owners must balance the needs of its stakeholders with the benefits to the business of acting responsibly.

To demonstrate this, pupils were invited to participate in a boardroom simulation which generated discussion and pushed them to make strategic decisions focused on some typical everyday dilemmas a business might face.



Business & Enterprise Teacher, Miss Gregson, said, "The issues raised provoked debate amongst the pupils who each acted as different stakeholders. The event was very interesting and gave them a wonderful insight into some of the challenges business owners need to negotiate. They will use the skills they learned today throughout their two years study and in life so it was a very worthwhile visit."

Ellis T said, "This was my first experience of being in a boardroom setting. I was able to use my knowledge of Business whilst gaining confidence for public speaking."

Ciello D-L agreed that it wasn't easy by saying, "Today was fast-paced and difficult but we overcame it as a team."




Where's The Harm?

Earth-Shattering Moments in Geography for Year 8

In Geography, Year 8 students have recently embarked on an exciting project to construct earthquake-proof buildings using everyday materials like cardboard, straws, and plastic bottles.





This hands-on activity not only fosters creativity but also teaches important principles of engineering and architecture. The students have ingeniously incorporated features such as window shutters, steel lattice frameworks, and triangular-shaped structures to enhance the stability and resilience of their models. These elements are crucial in real-world earthquake-resistant designs, providing both flexibility and strength to withstand seismic forces.





One of the standout features of their constructions is the use of a hanging ball, which acts as a tuned mass damper. This innovative addition helps to reduce the building's sway during an earthquake, demonstrating a sophisticated understanding of dynamic load management.















Alcohol Awareness Production 'Smashed' its way To Year 7 & 8



On Tuesday we welcomed the Smashed international educational theatre production.

The production is an early intervention strategy, prior to the festive period, to educate on the risks of underage drinking. The aim is to dissuade them from future risky activity and to be aware now, what risky behaviour looks like, so they can stay away from it or dissuade others.

The session was part performance, part interactive question and answer session, drawing out positive behaviours and identifying risk consequences and outcomes.

Lead Practitioner for Personal Development, Ms Smith, said, "Pupils and staff found the sessions engaging and informative for our Year 7 and 8s.

"This education is revisited in Year 9 with a Learning for Life Day on Addiction - Knowledge, Year 10 look at the Addiction Impact, and Year 11 look at alcohol laws in this country and abroad in relation to future holidays."

The Smashed initiative aligns with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals by fostering a culture of health and wellbeing among young people, a critical demographic for instilling lifelong healthy habits.

Smashed aims to transform attitudes and behaviours towards alcohol consumption among young people. In the 2023-2024 school year, 73 per cent of students in the UK said they were less likely to drink alcohol underage following the Smashed performance.

Smashed works in close collaboration with Community Alcohol Partnerships (CAPs), an organisation that brings together councils, police, retailers, schools, health providers, and community groups across the UK to reduce alcohol related harm among young people.









Mrs Cowell's After School Creative Cookery Club Christmas in Food Technology

In a cozy kitchen after school on Wednesday, children eagerly gathered around to create puff pastry Christmas tree shapes filled with Nutella.

With aprons tied and rolling pins in hand, they carefully cut out tree shapes from the dough - some more tree-like than others!

Laughter filled the room as they spread generous dollops of Nutella onto their creations, many sneaking a taste in the process! Once the pastries were ready, the children sprinkled them with snow (icing sugar), each one uniquely shaped but full of charm.

Vice Principal and Food Technology teacher, Mrs Cowell, said, "The Year 7s were proud of their delicious creations, they left with happy hearts and sweet treats to share (or not!) at home."

















Bringing music to your ears at break and lunch

MaBaL (Music at Break and Lunch) is music played through the school's loud speaker system during break and lunch. Chosen by Mr Taylor, Lead Teacher for Music, this is designed to offer exposure to the curriculum in different ways, and support pupils' appreciation of music.

The focus is on one theme each week across a genre, a country or from history. The theme could also link to the season, a festival or an event in school, such as the upcoming performing arts production.

Next week, it's all about: Musicals

This and next week's MaBaL is songs from shows and musicals - as it is the week leading up to the School Production held on the evenings of Tuesday, 10th December and Wednesday, 11th December.

As early as the 5th Century B.C., ancient Greeks included music and dance in their stage comedies and tragedies. Staged in open air amphitheatres, these plays featured humour, political and social satire, jugglers, and anything else that might entertain their audience. The songs were often a means for the chorus to comment on the action, but they also took part in the plot, and musical solos were sometimes used. To make their dance steps more audible, Roman actors attached metal chips called "sabilla" to their stage footwear – the first tap shoes.

Today, in Western theatre, there are three main kinds of dramatic performance involving music.

- 1. Ballets communicate their story almost entirely through dance.
- 2. Operas are dramatic productions in which the dialogue is nearly entirely sung.
- 3. Musicals are where the actors will often sing, but most of the mundane dialogue and much of the plot is spoken and acted. That is one of the defining differences between musicals and operas, and the category into which our staging of High School Musical belongs.

Priory's Year 9 Boys football team advanced to the next round of the Lancashire Cup after a 5-2 win away at Brownedge St Mary's on Wednesday.


On a cold, wet afternoon the lads struggled to find the net despite creating many chances in the opening 25 minutes, before Igho opened the scoring on the stroke of half-time.
