Digital Enterprise Award Makes a Great 'iDEA' as inspiring awards programme is launched at Priory

The race is already on to achieve Silver in the Inspiring Digital Enterprise Awards (iDEA).

These awards aspire to be the digital and enterprise equivalent of the Duke of Edinburgh but, while those are more physically demanding, the iDEAs are about computer skills.



iDEA's different learning categories – Citizen, Worker, Maker, Entrepreneur and Games – cover topics such as cyber security, cloud computing, e-safety, AI, web development and more as pupils develop digital, enterprise and employability skills.

Pupils do the modules as independent learning and they get points for each module with 250 points qualifying them for a Bronze Award.

Year 11 Umar, who is studying GCSE Computer Science, was the first Priory pupil to secure the Bronze Award but Year 9 Naeem was hot on his heels and now both are chasing the Silver Award.

Umar said: "It's meant to take around a month but I did it in a week! It's little courses to do in your own time and it's interesting.

"They cover all kinds of things from e-safety, to social media in business, to e-commerce and more so it's varied.

"It goes alongside my GCSE as what I learn in lessons I can take into this and vice versa."

Naeem said: "It's interesting and you use a lot of different skills and you

learn about the jobs you can go into.

"There are so many elements but they are all linked to each other. I am trying to get the Silver Award before Umar!"



Year 9 Reese said: "I like iDEA as it uses fun games to teach you about being safe online, how to have a secure password and more. It's life lessons really."

Once an award has been achieved, students are presented with an official certificate and iDEA record of achievement

to showcase each completed badge for demonstrating their digital and enterprise skills to potential employers in the future. We also provide students with a pin badge that can be worn on their lapel.

ICT and Computer Science teacher, Miss Gregson, is leading the programme and the department has started to roll it out to Key Stage 3 pupils in their Computing lessons.

Miss Gregson said, "iDEA is such a fantastic opportunity for students to explore the digital skills needed when they leave school. The fact that most of the badges have been created by industry experts gives students a real insight into jobs they may progress on to in the future.

We are supporting our Key Stage 3 students to log into iDEA at school so we can demonstrate how to select one of the badges. I can provide logins for our Key Stage 4 students if they would also like to work towards this award. They just need to either come and see me or message me on MS Teams."

Pupils can also work on their award at Computing Club in HEX 2 every Monday, Wednesday, Thursday lunchtimes and after school Thursday, and outside of school time should they wish. Key Stage 4 students in Year 10 and Year 11 who would like to complete the programme outside of lesson time are also welcome at Computing Club and should see Miss Gregson to register.

Lead Teacher of History, Mr Eccles, said, "The pupils were praised by the organiser who commented that their presence and contributions helped to "make the event very special.""

The girls are so talented and sang beautifully. This year's HMD marked the 80th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi concentration camp complex, and the 30th anniversary of the genocide in Bosnia.

Holocaust Memorial Day is a time when we seek to learn the lessons of the past and recognise that genocide does not just take place on its own – it's a steady process which can begin if discrimination, racism and hatred are not checked and prevented. There is still much to do to create a safer future and HMD is an opportunity to start this process.

Alumni Returns to Give Oxbridge Talk to Priory's 'Able and Ambitious' Pupils



Abi Lakeland - Class of 2017

A selection of Year 10 and 11 pupils were told to dream big by Class of 2017 pupil Abi Lakeland who went onto study English at Cambridge University.

Abi, now a teacher herself, admitted she didn't even know about Cambridge University until it was mentioned in an assembly while she was at Priory.

Abi was the first person in her family to go to university, where she studied English, especially inspired by her English teacher Miss Thornton.

"I left Priory in 2017 and attended Cambridge University to study English and achieved a First Class Honours," said Abi.

"I'm an English teacher myself, based down South. I remember, it was an assembly I attended at Priory in Year 10/11 that first made me aware Oxbridge even existed – neither of my parents attended university.

"It was magical, magnificent and marvellous to return to Priory to talk to the pupils.

"I just told them you have to dream big and you can achieve your dreams. You go to a great school and can go onto a great university.

"Cambridge was a magical experience, it is a difficult, challenging environment but you do get your rewards.

"I loved my time at Priory. Art teacher Miss Smith was awesome; Miss Thornton inspired me; Mr Kenrick was my maths teacher and I would never have passed maths without his help and Miss Summers in history was awesome. It's great to come back as the school hasn't changed much."





Mr Taylor, who manages our 'Able and Ambitious' programme, said: "The Oxbridge visit came about when former pupil Abi got in touch with me saying she wanted to give something back to school because of what school had given her.

"She was the first member of her family to attend university and it just so happens it was Cambridge University which was superb for Abi.

"Abi talked about potential courses Oxbridge offers, life at an Oxbridge university, life in the cities and what's on offer for students there.

"We initially went with a cohort of 15 'Able and Ambitious' pupils to attend it but we opened it up to everyone in Year 10 & 11 and had a great response.

"Around 50 pupils got the chance to take in this key information from someone who has lived the life at Cambridge.

"It's also offering the ambition, giving our pupils something they haven't thought about. It's hoped this will inspire them to stretch themselves beyond what they thought they could initially do.

"These talks are all about opening doors and offering opportunities our pupils maybe wouldn't have thought of before."

Meet The Teacher - *Miss Gregson* (ICT & Computing)

Miss Gregson was part of Class of 1998 and acknowledges that Priory's transformation from then to now is unrecognisable. She said she was definitely a student who had a lot going on outside of school but Mr Watters, her Head of Year and long-serving Geography teacher who retired in summer 2023, had a big say in changing her life.

Miss Gregson said: "Mr Watters told me that I wasn't leaving school without any GCSEs! I have never forgotten him saying 'no one knocks on your door and gives you a good life, you have to go out and get it'. I didn't particularly enjoy the time spent catching up on coursework, but had no idea at the time the impact of having GCSEs would have on my life."

After leaving Priory, Miss Gregson has had a varied career. "Initially I trained as a secretary at Runshaw College and did office work for over a decade, working in Children's Services, amongst other places.

"I did a degree in Computer Science while working full-time and actually completed my

dissertation in Australia where I was travelling at the time".



She said, "Taking myself out of my comfort zone has definitely been a common theme in my life and one that I hope to share with students at Priory.

"I came back to the UK and, while working in Children's Services, took the opportunity of volunteering at two youth groups. I loved it and went on to complete my PGCE at Edge Hill University.

"I met my partner whilst I was working on a cruise ship in the Caribbean and have never looked back. We now have two beautiful boys who definitely keep us busy. Being a mum helps me provide a healthy work-life balance.

"I knew we needed to be closer to my support network in Preston towards the end of my second maternity leave, as I had been teaching down in Somerset. My best friend sent me the job advert for Priory, that they were looking for a Computing, Business and IT teacher - and I applied. To be back at Priory as a teacher just blows my mind!

"As a young person, it is really easy to say the things you are going to do in life. As an adult, you realise that opportunities come your way and it is your choice whether you take them. As it turns out, Mr Watters' advice all those years ago, has actually been very relevant in my life.

"There are some fantastic opportunities on offer for young people today, especially women. Mrs Qadri and I are

both so excited about the new ventures we are working on for our pupils. We both want to inspire them to get involved with STEM-related careers and we thrive on providing an environment where they can explore this."



Year 7 Students Complete Their First Fieldwork Study

We are pleased to announce that our Year 7 students have successfully completed their first fieldwork study! This exciting milestone involved a microclimate study conducted in and around the school grounds. Under the guidance of their teachers, the students embarked on this hands-on learning experience to measure various weather conditions.

The study began with students setting hypotheses about which areas of the school would be the warmest, coldest, windiest, and calmest. Armed with thermometers and anemometers, they ventured out in teams to test their hypotheses. The students demonstrated excellent teamwork and safety awareness as they navigated the school site, ensuring they followed all safety protocols.

Throughout the investigation, students diligently recorded data, making sound recordings of their observations. They measured temperatures and wind speeds at different locations, carefully noting down their findings. This practical approach allowed them to engage with the subject matter in a meaningful way, enhancing their understanding of microclimates.

Upon returning to the classroom, the students completed comprehensive write-ups of their findings. They analysed the data collected, compared it to their initial hypotheses, and drew conclusions based on their observations. Pupils have had a busy few weeks preparing for a visit to Liverpool Road to conduct market research with a selection of micro, small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs). In small teams they produced a survey to explore how enterprises use market research to find out about their customer needs and competitor behaviour, and how internal and external factors may have both positive and negative impact on their day-to-day life.

As part of their research, students were assigned timeslots offered by the business owners and this was a really valuable lesson for students in realising the businesses would be fully operational during their time with them and they would be in the same space as paying customers.

All of the groups were polite and respectful, and whilst the objective was to obtain scripted quantitative data from the local area, it was a pleasure to see students develop confidence in exploring

more qualitative methods to fully understand each business and the points the owners were making.

ICT & Business & Enterprise teacher, Miss Gregson, said, "I want to recognise the initiative and ambition of three of our students who were also able to secure work experience placements with two of the businesses. Congratulations Ellis T, Taejuan S and Archie I!"




Year 10 Business & Enterprise Pupils Gain Valuable Support From Penwortham Entrepreneurs

Year 9 Junior is hoping his computer skills can pay off financially!


Junior, who hopes to take GCSE Computer Science, has made his own website, all self-taught.

"My website is my own company about chatbots and AI. I would like to be a millionaire!"




