Mr Taylor said: "I am really pleased to have this new space which was dead space previously.

"It's a real bonus and welcome addition to what we have got in terms of all the creative art spaces in school now. Having an extra practice room such as this so close to the main music room means, first of all, it offers a

breakout space for pupils who are working in their music lessons to work in a group in a multi-dimensional way. We have guitars in there, we have keyboards and a drum kit and space for singers as well so there is a full band set up for those wanting to work in their own group.

"Additionally at break times, lunch times and after school it acts as a dedicated band rehearsal room and that's over to the pupils to form their own bands, whether it's duets or bigger rock bands, to rehearse in preparation for performances such as the Summer Arts Evening or any assemblies or just as a hobby to refine their skills."

Learn to succeed

British Science Week Poster Competition

The scientists from the University College London (UCL) need your help!

Can you help them by coming up with a new idea or invention to improve the health of the air in our buildings?

Choose an indoor public space where you often spend time – this could be an area where you learn, or a place you visit regularly like a library, café or cinema. Do you think the air in this space is healthy and clean? Why? Come up with an idea or invention to change the air in your chosen space, making it healthier to breathe. How will it work? Could it be used in other public places too?

You might have a brand-new idea, or you might come up with something that already exists but re-imagined in a unique or creative way. The researchers at UCL have considered lots of different ideas for improving air quality and preventing the spread of viruses in hospitals. For example, you could think about face masks, curtains and screens, ventilation, fans or air filters.

Then think carefully about how you will lay out and present your idea. You should consider how best to communicate your research so that it is clear and logical. You could create a set of instructions, a detailed diagram or you might like to develop an eye-catching poster!


Entries must be A4 or A3 in size and you'll need to be able to take a photograph of your work so it can be sent to British Science Week (BSW) online for judging (via school). Entries can be accepted from individuals or teams.

How will the posters be judged?

Here's the lowdown on what the judges will be looking for:

- Creativity in approach You might have a brand new idea, or you might come up with something that already exists but re-imagined in a unique or creative way.
- Scientific content Your ideas should be clear, accurate and in line with your level of learning.
- Research content You might carry out some research first, to inform your thinking, and this should be reflected in your entry.
- Viability Could your idea work? Can you explain how?
 Show or explain how it would it change the air in your chosen space and make it healthier!






 Presentation and effective communication – Aim to present your idea in a way that is clear, logical and easy to understand. Think about the way you set out your ideas and the use of text and images. You could create a poster, a set of instructions or a diagram – think about the best way to showcase your thinking!

Researchers from the team at UCL, alongside members of the British Science Association, will shortlist entries, and a panel of judges will select a winner in each age category. Two runners up in each age category will be uploaded to the BSW Facebook page and the public will decide on a 'popular vote' winner.

What are the prizes?

Science Teacher and Eco Club Leader, Mrs Massey said, "We were planting trees to improve the coverage


around one of the public spaces that contains a small park. We only had 50 trees this time, which the pupils involved made light work of!"

Environment Carbon footprint, renewable energy, recycling.

Cost of living School uniform, living wage, energy bills.

Organiser Ms Smith said "When an opportunity comes along to participate in active citizenship, through democracy, we actively participate as part of pupil Personal Development. Where possible,

will always try to mimic real-world activities in readiness for life after Priory. All opportunities to vote are enacted in school and tie-in with our Citizenship curriculum, our coverage of Fundamental British Values (FBV) - Democracy, and Spiritual, Moral, Social, Cultural (SMSC) learning".

On this occasion, the ballot papers will be counted by Lancashire Youth Council, and we look forward to hearing the outcome.


to pursue a career in the creative arts without the high costs typically associated with moving to London.


The pancakes were a huge hit and a wonderful way to bring a bit of this tradition into our school.








What's the History of this event?

One pupil, Nathan, made a castle and moat as part of the Year 7 History competition using the 3D printer.






