## First Bite, Best Start: Pupils Enjoy Priory's Morning Boost

Pupils are 'toasting' Priory's latest initiative – 'First Bite of the Day.'

The free breakfast idea was the brainchild of Assistant Principal Miss Thornton and now around 100 pupils are at school at 8.15am-8.35am to have a snack, drink or just a general chat before school officially starts.

Miss Thornton said: "My role is about teaching and learning in school and to do that pupils need to be well-fuelled and not hungry or thirsty.

"They need the best start to the day and the idea of the 'First Bite of the Day' is to ensure pupils are fully prepared to focus and concentrate on their lessons.

"The 'First Bite of the Day' is open to everyone in Years 7-11 and it may be for those who don't have time to eat before they leave their house or can't eat as soon as they get up but are ready by the time they get to school.

"We wanted it to be free so we partnered with Recycling Lives, a Preston organisation working with charity Fareshare.

"Fareshares give food which is close to its sell-by date or damaged to schools, charities and other community groups.

“Our staff pick it up once a week. It’s certainly varied. There is toast, fruit, jam, muffins, juices – we never quite know what we will get but it’s always welcome!”

“The pupils are really good. It’s a chance for them to socialise together, it’s calm and peaceful, and also they clear up after themselves, putting any waste in the correct bins.”

Science Teacher Mrs Butcher co-ordinates ‘The First Bite of the Day’ and said, “One of my roles is to make sure this is all supervised. I arrange for the staff to cover the earlier start and liaise with the catering staff.

“It’s been such a good initiative, it’s so popular and it’s also having a positive impact on behaviour and learning.



“It’s inclusive and social and it really is a calm and nice atmosphere to start the day.”

One of the catering staff, Miss Snape, a former Priory pupil, covers the early hours.

“I really enjoy seeing all the pupils in the morning. It’s such a buzz. The children are enjoying it and they sit and talk while able to get whatever they may fancy for free.


“We do never know what we will get – we had some really fancy yoghurts the other week!”


## British Science Week House Competition - Years 7 & 8



# Year 7 Pupils Amaze Geography Teachers With Creative Rainfall Presentations



Year 7 pupils impressed their teachers before half term by delivering a series of imaginative and highly creative presentations on the different types of rainfall.

As part of their geography unit on Weather and Climate, students were challenged to explain convectional, frontal and relief rainfall in any format they wished, encouraging them to think beyond traditional slideshows and to use their creativity, imagination and personal interests to bring the topic to life.

The results, according to the Humanities department, were “beyond anything we expected.”


Pupils showcased their understanding in a huge variety of formats from raps, poems, songs, dramatic performances, props, models and even mini-sketches designed to show how rainfall forms and moves. One group performed a weather-themed rap, another created a handmade mountain range to demonstrate relief rainfall, while others acted out warm and cold fronts meeting.

Geography Teacher, Mrs Kursitis described the presentations as “engaging, original, and incredibly impressive,” praising students not only for their knowledge but also for their confidence and teamwork.

“The creativity was outstanding,” Mr Momoniati commented. “Every group brought something different, and we were blown away by the imagination they showed.”




The department says the project will definitely return next year - though they admit the bar has now been set very high!



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# Year 11 GCSE Pupils Venture Over To Wycoller for Field Work Studies

Once again, the GCSE Geography students donned their outdoor gear and prepared themselves for the great outdoors. This time, a visit to Wycoller to complete their fieldwork study to complement Papers 1 & 3 of their GCSE this summer.

Mr Watters stepped in to support the department this year, imparting his knowledge onto students and being integral to the trips by driving the minibus too. It was fantastic to have him back out in the field with us – in his natural habitat!

Students were able to test the Bradshaw Model of river change and test their own hypotheses to prove what had been learnt in class. Students tested river width, depth, velocity, pebble size and pebble roundness and compared this against the Bradshaw Model.



Students were also given the opportunity to discuss the fieldwork methods and test the accuracy and reliability of their techniques. This involved group discussions and practical method adaptation live in the field to improve the techniques being used. It was fantastic to see so many of our students engaging in the fieldwork skills element of the trip.

We are always really proud of our students when representing Priory and this was no exception. All students showed respect to each other, the environment and the general public on the visit - complimented by several people over the course of the five separate trips that took place this year.

No fieldwork is complete without a treat for our students and in classic Mr Watters style, students were rewarded at the end of a trip for their impeccable behaviour and outstanding work ethic – a round of doughnuts for all!

Well done to all the Geographers! I would personally like to thank Mrs Simpson, Mrs Crix-Jopson, Mrs Kursitis and Mr Momoniat for their support over several different days. Without such kind volunteering of their time, trips like this couldn't happen. A special thanks to Mr Watters, who took his own time to lead the visits this year to support the GCSE pupils.

Noah, who wants to be a football pundit, recently spent his work experience at the Lancashire Football Association in Leyland.

“I am part of the Lancashire FA’s ‘Change Our Game’ where six of us give insights into what changes we would like to see in grassroots football and have been for a few years.

“I got the chance to do my work experience there and I did a lot of different things, such as putting the soil on the pitch and helping with a presentation. It was a well-rounded week of work experience.”


