

As part of our commitment to keeping parents informed about educational developments, we would like to share a useful video produced by Ofsted. This short video explains the new report cards and grading system, helping




parents to better understand how these changes affect school reporting.

Consultation on Updated Geographical Priority Area (GPA)

Penwortham Priory Academy is launching a consultation period to update the description of our Geographical Priority Area (GPA). This affects the admissions policy for the 2027-28 intake onwards, and a six week consultation period from 27 November 2025 to 8 January 2026 has commenced.

CONSULTATION

As our local area continues to grow and change, particularly with the development of new housing and roads on land that was previously open fields, we are reviewing our GPA to ensure it remains clear and reflective of the current community landscape.

The proposed changes are modest and aim to:

- Align the GPA with more natural and recognisable boundaries, such as roads, rivers, canals.
- Include newly built residential areas that now form part of our local community.
- Improve clarity for families seeking to understand how their home address relates to our GPA.

This consultation is in line with the requirements of the codes and relevant admissions legislation, which at the date of this Agreement is section 89 of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998 as amended, and Regulations under that section, Academy Trust Determination of Admission Arrangements.

Year 7 Enjoy an Inspiring MEGA Day at Runshaw College



A group of Year 7 pupils took part in a MEGA Day at Runshaw College on 5 December, where they explored real-world computing, problem-solving and digital literacy.

A MEGA Day is an interactive, themed experience where students explore modern and emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence, cybersecurity, and digital innovation. The day was packed with hands-on workshops designed to stretch their thinking, spark curiosity, and give them a glimpse into skills highly valued in future careers.

The day began with an introduction to robotics using Sphero BOLT robots. Pupils learned how to use block-based coding to control movement, speed, lighting and direction. Working in teams, they programmed their Spheros to navigate through a series of mazes and activities, requiring precision, planning and teamwork.

In the second workshop, pupils were introduced to the BBC Microbit. They explored physical computing by coding simple interactive games using button controls and the Microbit's LED matrix.


The final session of the day pushed pupils' problem-solving skills even further. Working in groups of six, they tackled a series of challenges designed to test their logical reasoning, OSINT-style research, cypher skills and their knowledge of computing history.







Each session encouraged teamwork, perseverance and creative thinking - skills that will be invaluable both in school and in future careers.

Head of ICT & Computing, Mrs Qadri, said, "Participating in a MEGA Day will help students raise aspirations, develop transferable skills, and make informed decisions about their next steps in education and employment."




Christmas Jumper Day was more than just festive fun, it was about giving back. Pupils donated £1 to Barnardo's, helping support
