Class of 2025 Daniel McCall returned to Priory to officially open the new SEND and well-being facility, the Nest.

The Nest stands for Nurture, Encourage, Support and Talk and it's a room dedicated to supporting and developing the social and emotional needs of our young people.

Daniel, who took GCSE Art, donated one of his paintings to be displayed in the room.

ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistant) Mrs Eastham said: "We asked Daniel to paint a calming picture, including nature and tranquil colours, and what he produced was outstanding.

"We decorated the room thanks to a £3000 grant from the Crescent Purchasing Consortium and their 'Give Back' grant funding which included a new soft seating area as well as a new meeting table and chairs."

A range of people will use the Nest, including the school nurse every alternate Monday (Medical referrals via Mrs Holland plus lunchtime drop-ins); Compass Bloom, a mental health charity in school every Tuesday (Referrals via Mrs Willis, Family Support Manager); ELSA sessions which run every Wednesday *Continued over...*

Having a revision guide as a regularly used point of reference and review is a step towards success. For that reason, we are offering revision guides for purchase at the beginning of the course.

The Oxford Revise series includes far more embedded opportunities for practice - from quizzing to exam style questions - as well as a more structured presentation of content.

Otherwise, the choice is between Combined Higher Tier and Combined Foundation Tier. If your child is not sure which they need, please direct them to ask their teacher before purchase.

Priory Pupils Head to Iceland for a Trip of a Lifetime



Iconic waterfalls, lagoons, tectonic plates and more, Iceland promises to be a trip of a lifetime for our pupils.

The Humanities department, led by Mr Metcalfe, will be taking a group of Priory pupils to Iceland, all wearing their special hoodies, which will be both educational and entertaining.

The five-day trip includes a full day excursion of the Golden Circle, a visit to Hellisheidi Power Station to learn about geothermal power and the development of the power plant as well as visiting a number of impressive waterfalls and the Great Geysir.

There will also be visits to Iceland's famous thermal pools as well as time in the capital Reykjavik.

Mr Metcalfe said: "The Iceland visit has been over 12 months in the planning, and we are now very much looking forward to getting on that plane and taking our students to see some wonderful Geography.

"Iceland is a place for anyone - not just a Geographer - but the stunning scenery and contagious history of its volcanic activity has all tourists - young and old - gripped. With trips to colossal waterfalls, active geysers, thermal bathing pools and the magnificent capital city of Reykjavik, we are squeezing quite a bit in during our five day visit. This year sports a strong electromagnetic activity yield, and so we hope for a clear night to get the opportunity to see the Northern Lights!

"We feel lucky to be taking 43 of our students to experience this beautiful country. It should be a great trip, and students and parents can follow our visit on the school's Facebook page.

"It's worth giving a nod to our now retired Lead Teacher of Geography, Mr Watters who paved the way for such visits in years gone by, and who led the previous Iceland visit where we learnt a lot from him.

Joining us on the visit this year are Mrs Cauchi, Mr Eastham, Mr Eccles, Mrs Ham and Mrs Kursitis.



Year 9 Freya said: "I have never been so it's a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to see all the sites and also have fun with my friends. I like Geography so it should be interesting."

Year 10 Will said: "I have never been so I am excited. It's got a special place for me as my grandad was a trawlerman and his ship sunk there. His Mayday was picked up by the Icelandic coastguard who helped him."

Year 10 Ben said: "It's a great chance to experience a different country."

Year 10 Matthew said: "I am looking forward to the glacial walks."

Emily added: "I am excited about the visit to the Blue Lagoon and seeing what it's all about!"

Year 11 Swimmer Completes Swim No 1 of her World Record Attempt!



Divya came to Priory from India for Year 11, having swum for 12 years there.

In September, Divya completed a remarkable feat in itself, completing the Catalina Channel solo swim in California, covering the 34km stretch in 15 hours and 23 minutes. This makes her the youngest Indian swimmer, at 15, to complete the Catalina Channel solo.

However this is just one of her 'Ocean's Seven Challenge' where she aims to complete the seven

world's toughest open-water Channel

swims.

Her challenge is named 'Mission Sapt Sagar' with its vision to raise awareness for 'Empowering Girls through Education and Sports.'

Divya, who had literally tested the Catalina Channel waters as part of a six-person relay the two days before her solo attempt, said: "The Pacific was a big test, there were high swells and strong currents. We set off at 11.30pm so it was pitch dark, the water was choppy.

"However when it was sunrise, it was inspirational. I saw dolphins and fish.

"I had my dad and a coach on the boat next to me, along with official observers, and they couldn't touch me. They had to throw food and drink into the water for me.

"There are strong rules – it was only swimming goggles, swimming hat and swimming costume. There was no wetsuit but the temperature wasn't too bad.

"It was mentally hard, after eight hours it was all in my brain but quitting was never an option.



"There were tears and yelling at my dad and I did question myself at times but I kept reminding myself: the



mountains are not moving, I am moving towards them." Divya trains around 10 hours in a pool overall on weekdays, she does gym work every day, and then at weekends she trains at Capernwray, in open water.

"I wanted to swim the English Channel at the start of October but Storm Amy stopped it so I have to wait for the slots to open again."

Divya has high ambitions: "The youngest person to do all seven oceans is a 20-year-old New Zealand girl so I want to break the world record and do them all by the time I am 19. That's the plan.

"I want to highlight female sports and what females can do. Every girl has such potential and can achieve so much if they put their mind to it. I want to empower females."



As well as all this, Divya has also been using her efforts to fundraise for Children In Need and has raised over £1,200.

- Add a beaten egg & vanilla extract
- Add the flour and combine to make a dough
- Roll on a floured surface to required thickness
- Cut shapes & transfer to over
- Cook for 8-10 minutes



Year 9 Embarks on Chinese Language and Culture Programme in Collaboration with UCLan



Eleven Year 9 pupils have been given an amazing chance to learn all about Chinese Language and Culture, in lessons delivered in school by UCLan.

Teacher Mia Liu will come into school every week and pupils will explore one of the world's most widely spoken languages as well as learning about Chinese traditions and culture.

The course, organised by Head of Languages, Mrs Scully, will run for the full academic year with pupils able to sit the Chinese Youth Test (YCT), a nationally recognised qualification for young learners of Chinese.

Mrs Scully, explained, "As a school, we chose to collaborate with UCLan to deliver Chinese language and culture lessons because it offers our pupils a unique opportunity to broaden their global understanding, experience an exciting new language, and



develop valuable cultural awareness for the future. What a fantastic opportunity!"

Amna said: "Some of my family are bilingual and I like languages so this was interesting for me. I want to push myself and this is different."

Corey said: "I really wanted to do this course. It sounds interesting and it's an opportunity to learn something new. I can't speak any other language so this will be helpful and I can also learn about new cultures."

Marshall said: "Some of my family are Chinese so it will be good for me to speak to them in their first language."

Pharaoh said: "It's cool and I am hoping it will help me in the future."

Jacob said: "I want to be a pilot and you need a language for that and also it's a new skill for my Duke of Edinburgh award."


