Duke of Edinburgh Pupils Ready To Celebrate Bronze and Silver Awards

The Bronze Award involves the DofE Participation Award where pupils have to complete three official DofE sections: Volunteering, Physical and Skill. To achieve the actual Bronze Award, pupils also have to complete a two-day expedition, with overnight camping where pupils put up their own tents and cook for themselves, working as a team.

From the very beginning, our pupils have shown incredible commitment. Week after week, they stayed after school for training sessions, learning everything from map reading to tent pitching, all in preparation for their expedition. Their dedication didn't stop there — they embraced the three core areas of the DofE Award with enthusiasm.

Volunteering: Pupils gave back to their communities in meaningful ways — dog walking, litter picking, supporting youth groups, and more. Some were so inspired by their experiences that they've chosen to continue volunteering beyond the programme.

Skills: From learning new languages to mastering the art of cooking and even knitting, our pupils have broadened their horizons and picked up talents that will stay with them for life.

Physical: Whether it was football, netball, or yoga, pupils pushed themselves to improve their fitness and wellbeing — and had fun doing it!

reflect, applaud, and maybe even relive a few of those expedition stories.

Congratulations to all our Bronze Award achievers you've done yourselves, and your school, proud.








From "Never Again" to Making History: Pupils Take on Silver DofE

Introducing DofE For Year 9

Humanities teacher Mrs Cauchi has launched Priory's new-look Duke of Edinburgh scheme to our current Year 9s.




This year all Year 9s will undertake some kind of outdoor award – whether it's the Priory Outdoor Award, the DofE Participation Award or the DofE Bronze Award.

The Priory Outdoor Award will be in three drop-down days in school and will involve volunteering activities such as litter picking and food bank deliveries, and core expedition skills such as map reading and route planning.

The DoE Participation Award is where pupils complete three DofE sections: Volunteering, Physical and Skills. These are done in pupils' own time and completed through clubs, community involvement or personal hobbies.

The Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award is where pupils complete the first two and then undertake a two-day expedition, where pupils walk for six hours each day with overnight camping, and activities such as kayaking or raft building.

Mrs Cauchi: "We have tried to make it more inclusive so every pupil can come away with something.



"The Priory Outdoor Award will be done in school time so it overcomes barriers for pupils who may not be able to take part in the sessions after-school, due to other commitments.

"All these awards push pupils out of their comfort zones and they also see teachers in a different perspective which can help their learning in school.

"It allows them to enjoy different activities, try new things and come away with a qualification which is looked on positively on their CV.

"We want as many pupils as possible to complete the full DofE Bronze Award, the expedition is tough but it is also extremely rewarding. Just talking to the pupils who have done it, they speak about the memories they have made, the skills they have picked up and the fun they had, and that makes it all worth it."

Year 10 Unhealthy Relationships - Relationship Abuse, What to do when relationships go wrong

Forming and maintaining respectful relationships. Abusive relationship characteristics. End of relationships including the effects of change, including loss, separation, divorce and bereavement. Sources of help and support for themselves and others.

Year 11 My Money - Understanding and Managing Debt, Money and Work
In preparation for leaving Priory pupils will gain an understanding of
finances in the adult world and will learn about work-related finance
such as tax and pensions. They will also learn about debt and how
to avoid and deal with it.



Priory's friendly and approachable Year 11 Peer Mentors are based in the Year 7 dining area at break and lunch and are ready to help.

Phoebe, Freya, Kayalnila, Jessica, Harry and others underwent training earlier this year as Year 10s and are willing and ready to assist any of the new intake who need them.

Lead Practitioner for Personal Development, Ms Smith said, "At Priory we realise that our older pupils are excellent role models for younger pupils and so we have a very successful peer mentoring programme in place. Our qualified peer mentors will help pupils cope with everyday life and worries at school and will offer guidance on both social and academic areas of school life."



All Peer Mentors have attended structured training sessions in

school with an external trainer where they were given an introduction to mentoring and 'buddying' younger ones.

Each learner participated in activities across five challenges to gain an accredited ASDAN certificate. This nationally recognised certificate qualifies their competence in the role.


To mark the occasion, Alyx, Imogen and Alba were invited back to Whitefield to help unveil the sculptures and place them in the garden.

"I decided to walk 127km in July as 127 children in the UK lose a parent each day.


"I had fundraised for Cash for Kids a while ago but I decided to do something that was more personal to me and chose Child Bereavement UK.



Riley is following in some very big footsteps, with the likes of Lewis Hamilton and Lando Norris, having all previously competed in the British Kart Championships!

Year 7 Riley has been go-karting for three years and now competes all over the UK and will be competing in Europe at some point next year.

He started his motorsport journey at the arrive-and-drive track near Euxton, going on from there to start owner-driver kart racing at Hooton Park Circuit near Liverpool.



From there he branched out to race in the Teesside Sprint Series in the Northeast before entering The Kart Championship and the British Kart Championships last year, where he finished 7th overall in both Championships in 2024, winning the Most Improved Driver of 2024 award at The Kart Championships awards night.

In 2025, Riley competed in three National Championships - The British Kart Championships, Super One Series and The Kart Championships. It's been a very successful year for him, becoming the Super One Series Champion

as well as British Champion. He narrowly missed out winning The Kart Championship too!

Officially, it means Riley is now ranked number one in the UK in the Honda Cadet class, a class which regularly sees up to 34 karts racing on track at speeds in excess of 60mph.

"I am very proud," said Riley.




This is also an interhouse competition and the leaders will be those with the most individual entries. There'll be an interhouse prize at the end of the year.


