Grassroots Glory as Priory's Pitches Earn Advanced Status

Priory has some of the best school football pitches in the area to hire out with a Pitch Power Report marking four of the six pitches 'Advanced' – the highest mark!

The other two have been marked 'good' with Priory's Estates team aiming to have all their pitches with 'Advanced' rating as soon as they can.

It's primarily been down to the hard work of Estates Supervisor Tim Bamber.

He said: "I have been at Priory for five years. I started taking an interest when my son played for Penwortham St Theresa's, one of the clubs that use the school's facilities, and the pitches weren't the best and needed upgrading.

"I talked to Facilities Manager Keith Bolton and we applied for a Football Foundation grant which we got and we were able to receive training and buy equipment.

"We have progressed and improved the pitches over the years and now we get a lot of positive comments about our pitches and it is a big source of pride at school.



"They are used from March-September on weekdays by grassroot teams and, because they are good pitches, they can be used for longer. They are also used at weekends.

"Pitch Power assess our pitches every six months and it's great to see where we have come from, from Poor to Advanced. We do take really good care of them with the time and budget and everyone is proud of how far we have come."

Mr Bolton said: "Both myself and Tim have had training by the Grounds Maintenance Association and attended conferences to learn how we can improve the pitches. We have also received equipment such as a tractor and a robotic line marker.

"The pitches have improved dramatically. It shows we are doing the right things by being graded 'Advanced' on four of our pitches – and we are aiming for all six to reach the top mark!"

Contractual agreements for the use of Priory's grass pitches are currently with Penwortham Town FC, Penwortham St Tereasa's FC, AFC Penwortham, and Kingsfold FC.

The 3G pitch has availability every Wednesday 9-10pm (2 x 7v7 pitches). The 3G can also be available on a Saturday from 2-4pm by arrangement.

In addition to the grass and 3G pitches, Penwortham Priory Academy has a wide range of facilities for hire from conference suites, classrooms, netball courts and a dance studio to a sports hall, gym and hall. Empowering Pupils, Building Futures: Peer Mentor Training at Priory



ASDAN Peer Mentor training has proved so popular that we have two cohorts of Year 10 pupils undergoing training each year.

It's two days of training led by Tahir Mahmood and Gemma Appleton from 'We Are With You', commissioned by Lancashire County Council.

Peer Mentoring can support children and young people by:

- Enhancing social competence
- Building security within the setting and wider community by realising their worth as social beings
- Improving attendance and educational attainment
- Developing friendship skills in a positive environment

During the sessions pupils will develop their listening and team working skills, they will discuss scenarios that they could come across and how they can manage them effectively. Among other tasks, pupils participate in role plays and communication challenges across five strands to gain a 10 hour ASDAN accredited certificate. They also bag themselves a £25 gift voucher as a reward.

Tahir said: "We deliver a Peer Mentor short course to Year 10 pupils who are aspiring to be prefects or Head Boys or Girls.

"It's teaching the skills they need to be a prefect and the issues they may come across. It's accredited by ASDAN and delivered by us. It's around 10 hours and it's teaching pupils skills to use in school but also skills to take into their life and into their careers."

Jacob said: "I took this course because I thought it would look good on my CV. We have been through



ice breakers so far – ways to introduce yourself to people."

Sophie said: "I have signed up to this course because I want to be a prefect."

Lainie added: "I am learning how to communicate better, how to talk to people so it isn't awkward, it's a good skill to have."

Lead Practitioner for Personal Development, Ms Smith, added, "At Priory, we always look for opportunities to develop our pupils' life skills and provide leadership experiences. Our current Peer Mentor team has assisted younger pupils in the school, and our new additions will enable us to have more widespread coverage and provide some relief to our Year 11s as they approach their exams".






Class of 2025 **GCSE Certificate** Collection

Class of 2025 can now collect their GCSE certificates from the school office.

Certificates will be available to collect during school hours by our former pupils and must be signed for. If any other person - including parent/carer - is



collecting the certificates on their behalf they must have a note, signed by the pupil, giving their consent for school to release them.

Any medals, certificates and other prizes not collected during the leaver's celebration event on their last day, as well as the event programme, will be available to take at the same time.

We would like to take this opportunity to emphasise how important it is that the exam certificates are collected, as they are very important documents that are likely to be needed throughout their career and particularly if a path to university or a professional career is planned.

School is only legally obliged to keep certificates for 12 month period, after which time they are disposed of. If copies of certificates are needed after that time, pupils will need to contact the appropriate awarding bodies directly and pay to obtain copies.

"I put a lot of work in. I train five days a week at the Lancashire School of Boxing in Preston and there is also the gym and running and I have to fit it around my studies.


"I have had 12 fights in my career and lost two so far but I think you learn a lot from the ones you lose.

Year 11 pupil Harry is third in Europe in the 63kg category at taekwondo.

Harry, who trains four times a week at Total Taekwondo in Preston, took part in the Tusah Open in Moldova, his first international taekwondo competition.

He was competing against contenders from Russia, Moldova, Turkey, Romania, Tunisia and Bulgaria while Harry's team represented Great Britain.

Harry was in the A class 63kg category and reached the quarter-finals where he point-gapped his opponent by 12 points.

This meant he had secured a place in the semifinals but he couldn't quite reach the final, finishing with a bronze medal.



Harry said: "I got into taekwondo about 18 months ago through my grandad. I thought I would give it a go and I took to it.

"It's got exercise, discipline, you make friends and you see the world. I also coach the little kids to help out as well.

"I am proud to be third in Europe in my age category.

"I have my Blue Belt at the moment so the next stage is to get my Black Belt.

"I want to go to the Olympics, that's the pinnacle and I am sure it's everyone's dreams but, whatever happens, I enjoy it as a hobby."

Year 7 pupils enjoyed an unforgettable trip to Lancaster last week, diving deep into the city's fascinating past.


The day began at the Priory Church, a beautiful landmark dating back to the 1400s. Students explored its stunning architecture and learned about its centuries-old role in the community.










Year 8 Shake Up Learning To Build Earthquake-Resistant Structures




This term in Geography, Year 8 students have taken on a dynamic new challenge: designing and constructing buildings that can stand up to powerful earthquakes.

Using simple, everyday materials such as paper straws, string, cardboard and wooden skewers, pupils have been testing their engineering skills in a hands-on and memorable way.

The project encouraged students to think like real structural engineers. Their models showcased a wide range of creative safety features, including pyramid-shaped buildings, shock-absorbing foundations and hanging pendulum ball. Many groups also experimented with different frame shapes, discovering how diagonal supports and interlocking joints can disperse the energy produced during ground shaking.

One particularly impressive aspect of the students' designs was their use of paper straw, string and cardboard to create a window shutter. Any movement will force the shutters to close preventing 'glass' from shattering onto the possible civilians. The pupils demonstrated a strong understanding of how buildings can create opportunities to reduce impacts to people - an essential concept in earthquake-resistant architecture.
