Anne Frank Exhibition Brings The Past To The Present at Priory

Year 9 pupils have been guiding younger pupils through the story of Anne Frank as they use the exhibition which has been set up in school to highlight the dangers of intolerance and hatred.

Anne Frank Trust's Lucy Allan spent time with the Year 9s at Priory who volunteered to teach the Anne Frank story to Year 7 & 8 pupils this week, as well as Year 6 pupils from Penwortham Primary School.

Teenager Anne was a German-born Jewish girl who kept a diary while she was hiding in an attic in Amsterdam during World War II and the Nazi persecution. Anne died in Bergen-Belsen concentration camp aged 15.

Lucy said: "We came in for two days and trained Year 9 tour guides about Anne's life and its significance.

"This week they have told Anne's story to Years 7 and 8 in order to help them learn from history. It's to challenge any discrimination today so that history does not repeat itself.

"The pupils at Priory are always so keen to learn, the Year 9s were a great group who really impressed me with their public speaking and delivery. They were determined to get the message across."

Ramadan 'Experience Iftaar' Evening Meal Friday, 27 February (Open to all)

This is an exciting opportunity for pupils to participate in a cultural experience as part of our ongoing activities to promote understanding and inclusivity.

On Friday, 27 February, we have organised a trip to Olive of Sinai (178 Ribbleton Lane) to Experience Iftaar – a special evening meal that Muslims enjoy to break their fast during the holy month of Ramadan.

The cost of the trip is £17 per pupil, which includes a three-course meal and one drink. If your child is interested in joining this event, payment must be made via SCOPay by 13 February, and at the same time you will be required to select their meal choices.

The event will provide pupils with the opportunity to:

- Taste traditional foods often eaten to break the fast, such as dates and water
- Hear the Adhan (call to prayer), which marks the time to break the fast
- Observe and learn about the significance of prayer in Islam

Please note that parents will need to arrange their child's transport to and from the venue. The event runs from 5.30pm-8.15pm. Pupils may wear their own clothes.

This trip is open to all pupils, regardless of faith, offering opportunities to socialise, ask questions, and learn more about the Muslim faith and culture.

Year 9 MEGA Day at Runshaw College – Inspiring the Next Generation of Digital Innovators

On Wednesday, 21 January, our Year 9 students took part in an exciting MEGA Day at Runshaw College, a unique experience designed to open their eyes to future career opportunities in the fast-growing digital and technology sectors. The event was delivered by the award-winning IN4 Group, and was fully funded — giving all students the chance to take part in this inspiring, future-focused day.



The day aimed to develop students' digital skills, raise aspirations, and demonstrate the scale of opportunities emerging across technology and innovation. With the North West alone predicted to see over 30,000 cyber-related jobs by 2035, the MEGA Day offered an early insight into an industry full of high-skilled and well-paid roles.

Becoming AI Entrepreneurs for the Day - Year 9 pupils stepped into the role of AI Entrepreneurs, working in teams to design and pitch an AI-powered solution to a real-world challenge. The experience mirrored industry practice and encouraged creativity, problem-solving, teamwork, and confidence.



Big Ideas for Real World Problems - Students explored the UN Global Goals and selected an issue they cared deeply about. Using this as inspiration, they developed an early concept for a product or app powered by artificial intelligence.

Rapid Prototyping with AI - Pupils learned how designers quickly bring ideas to life using digital tools. They experimented with AI-powered prototyping apps, creating early versions of their designs and learning how to iterate at speed.

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Pitch, Polish, and Present - The final session was a high-energy challenge. Teams refined their ideas and delivered a pitch in a Dragon's Den-style presentation, showcasing their communication skills, creativity and teamwork.

Ajuna said, "We learnt about how different companies use Ai. We all designed different Ai for different problems that would help people globally. We also made a presentation about how our Ai works and how it would benefit the future and today."

Max added, "We did three sessions creating Ai prototypes. In the first, we talked about how Ai is used in the real world such as GPS and Netflix recommendations and other things like TikTok feeds. In the second, we came up with ideas for Ai prototypes that could have positive impacts on social and environmental problems in the world. In the third and final session, we presented the ideas for our prototypes to the rest of the class and the judge board where everyone was ranked from 1-10. Overall, everyone had lots of fun and enjoyed it as well."



We are delighted to share that Priory's 'Team Price Route Pro' and 'RunWild' teams and achieved an impressive second and third place in the final pitch challenge. Their innovative ideas, clear communication, and confident teamwork stood out to the judges and demonstrated the incredible talent and potential within our Year 9 cohort.



Head of Technology, Mrs Qadri concluded "This fantastic result reflects the effort, creativity, and enthusiasm students brought to the challenge - and we couldn't be prouder of their achievements."



Year 10 Girls Raise Funds to Protect Endangered Tigers

A group of Year 10 pupils has taken action to support endangered wild cats by organising a hugely successful bake sale in aid of Panthera, an international charity dedicated to the conservation of the world's big cat species.

Lily, Amelia, Megan, Reese, Ria, Catherine and Georgia spent the past few weeks learning about the threats facing tigers and felt compelled to raise awareness within the school community. They created an informative PowerPoint presentation for Learning for Life lessons explaining why conservation is so important and highlighting the alarming decline of wild tiger populations.

In their research, the girls discovered that three tiger subspecies have already become extinct and that the remaining six are all classified as endangered. With only around 5,000 tigers left in the wild, they wanted to take positive action to support organisations working to protect these magnificent animals.


On Wednesday, the group held their bake sale at breaktime, offering a delicious assortment of cakes and treats. The event drew plenty of eager customers and proved to be a tremendous success, raising a fantastic £61.50 for Panthera.

The girls also shared some fun facts. Did you know:

- A tiger's roar can be heard up to 3km away!
- No two tigers have the same stripes – each pattern is completely unique.
- Tiger cubs are blind!

All proceeds will be donated directly to Panthera, supporting the charity's work to restore tiger habitats, protect key populations and help increase tiger numbers in the wild.

Well done to the whole team for their enthusiasm, initiative and dedication to a worthy cause.



Why raise awareness for the tigers?



These animals are a key species to maintain the health of eco systems, and their conservation provides numerous benefits to humans and the planet. By helping tiger habitats, it preserves forests which are crucial for tackling climate change. It also defends a vast ray of biodiversity within their ecosystems as a tiger's presence protects a variety of other species. 3 of the tiger subspecies have been wiped out and the remaining 6 are all endangered, there being approximately 5000 tigers left.

So why are they dying?

Habitat loss: The expansion of human activities such as logging and building roads has led to mass deforestation. This reduces the total area of land for tigers to live and hunt, forcing them into isolated lands of limited genetic diversity.

Poaching and illegal trade: This is the most immediate threat to tigers today. They are murdered to supply the black market demands for their parts which are used as status symbols, decorative items and in traditional Asian medicines.

Human-wildlife conflict: As tiger's habitats shrink, they are coming closer to human communities resulting in attacks on livestock or people. Ending with revenge killings by local people.

These threats have caused a 95% decline in wild tiger population over the last century. Leading to three sub-species going extinct and the remains six ALL being endangered.

Year 11 Pupils Represent Priory At Holocaust Memorial Day Event

For a third year, Priory was honoured to be invited to participate in South Ribble's Holocaust Memorial Day commemorations.

Holocaust Memorial Day is a national day that takes place on 27 January. It commemorates the six million Jewish men, women and children murdered during the Holocaust, and the millions more murdered under Nazi persecution.

Held at the Leyland Civic Centre on Monday, 27 January, Mr Eccles and Mr Taylor were accompanied to the community event by three Year 11 pupils.

Kacper and Hannah were asked to light a candle which represented the victims of Nazi Persecution between 1933 and 1945. Molly-Grace then performed a stunning rendition of 'Lean On Me' as part of the musical programme for the afternoon.

Lead Teacher of History, Mr Eccles, said, "The pupils were praised by the organiser who commented that their presence and contributions helped to "make the event very special."



This year's HMD marks the 81st anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp by the first Ukrainian Front on the 27th of January 1945, and the 31st anniversary of the genocide in Bosnia. Prejudice still continues today within our communities and across the UK, and we remember where persecution led in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur.

The theme for this year's commemoration is 'Bridging Generations'. Holocaust Memorial Day is a time when we seek to learn the lessons of the past and recognise that genocide does not just take place on its own – it's a steady process which can begin if discrimination, racism and hatred are not checked and prevented. There is still much to do to create a safer future and HMD is an opportunity to start this process.

During Learning Life Lessons on Monday, pupils were shown a short video produced by the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust.

Year 9: Car Passenger Safety

#YOLO Performance in Education



On Tuesday, 20 January Year 9 pupils took part in a performance workshop about Car Passenger Safety. This workshop was commissioned by Lancashire County Council to assist in pupil education, to prevent the increase in car accidents which have impacted passengers.

The hour-long performance and subsequent workshop focused on the importance of passengers in driver concentration and safety. The performance included three actors who took on the roles of Dad, Son and Daughter in a car and provided an insight into the family following a fatality from a car accident and its impact on a sibling and parent.

#YOLO looked at how behaviour in a car as a passenger, especially wearing seatbelts, can massively influence outcomes and highlights the responsibilities of passengers as well as drivers for safety.



The performance investigated the role of a passenger and their responsibility within a car to keep themselves safe and not impede or negatively impact the way the car is being driven. This is done by focusing on how a passenger can have a negative influence within a car by: distracting a driver with music, questions and technology (ie, mobile phones); or by encouraging them to speed; and finally the importance of seatbelt use at all times.

Lead Practitioner for Personal Development, Ms Smith, said,

"The #YOLO presentation reminded young people that driving a car is a massive responsibility and they have their part to play in helping to keep it safe."

"By showing the consequences to those left behind, #YOLO encourages students to not only change their own behaviour and attitudes as a passenger but also to intervene when others display this behaviour."
