# A Championship English Lesson

An author hopes to inspire the next generation of writers after holding a workshop at Priory on Tuesday.

Local author, Michael Barrett, has written a graphic novel about Preston North End's famous league and cup winning season of 1888-89. Michael visited the school to speak to pupils from years 7, 8 and 9 about how and why he wrote his book about the legendary invincibles.

Michael spoke about the trials of producing his book and the pleasures he took in researching and bringing to life the players that he had only ever read about.

Filing through match reports from over a century ago to imagine how the goals had been scored and learning about different players and their characters was a huge part of the process for Michael.

Working with the illustrator of the famous Roy of the Rovers comics, David Sque helped Michael to accurately bring the goals that were scored to the pages of the graphic novel.

After speaking with pupils about how he created his book, Michael helped them to write a narrative about other famous football stories from their lifetime.

Michael was keen to help them understand the importance of planning a successful story using more recent examples of footballing heroics.

English teacher, Mr Howarth said: "Michael held a hugely successful workshop with the group. Through research and carefully exploring how to develop story ideas, all students came away inspired to both read and write more. They all thoroughly enjoyed it."

## ASTRONOMY CLUB PUPILS HAVE SOMETHING OUT OF THIS WORLD!

These Priory pupils are certainly reaching for the stars – and they have a piece of meteorite billions of years old to prove it.

We are one of the few schools in the area which offers an Astronomy GCSE.

Two years ago three Priory students



took the exam for the first time and received A\* grades including Jamie Edwards, who became the world's youngest person to create nuclear fusion aged 13. Assistant Headteacher, Ms Young, also took the exam, got top marks and is now a member of PADAS – Preston and District Astronomical Society.

PADAS has acquired some meteorite which was found in the Western Sahara Desert and has been certified as a type called 'Chondrite' meaning it's composed mainly of rock with small amounts of iron and other minerals. It's believed to be around five billion years old.

Priory is the first school to be loaned this meteorite from PADAS for their astronomy students, who use the £750,000 open space science labs at the school which have their own 'universe' on the ceiling.

Four Year 9 students are taking their Astronomy GCSE this year - May Robinson, Miya Atherton-Patel, Verity Buckley and Colin Chan - and are using the meteorite to help them.

"It's amazing," said May. "I have always had an interest in the stars so it's great to be able to take it to GCSE level."

PADAS Secretary Graham Mcloughlin: "The PADAS meteorite is a NWA 308g Chondrite meteorite found in the desert of North West Africa. Chondrites are some of the oldest space rocks left over from the formation of our solar system and contains iron. It was purchased to give members the opportunity to view and examine a piece of space rock and is popular at our society public outreach events."

# **ROSLA Block Update**

Building work on Priory's new £1.4M IT suite and community space is moving forward.

The ROSLA block, or 'B Block' as it was also known, will be demolished in the coming weeks to make way for a new IT suite along with a space downstairs which will be used by the school and the community.

The ROSLA block (Raising Of The School Leaving Age) was built in the late 1960s when the school leaving age increased, as a temporary structure with a timber frame.

Mr Bolton, Priory's Facilities Manager, said, "We're starting to see external demolition taking place and some of the cladding has been removed to check

that the bats have now left".

Builders are starting to knock the rooms out downstairs and remove plasterboard from walls. All materials will be recycled where possible.
