You may be aware that school attendance is a growing concern across the country. At Poole High School, we are committed to helping every student understand the critical link between attendance and academic success, particularly how missed lessons directly impact GCSE outcomes.

GCSE results show a clear correlation:

Attendance matters - every lesson counts, every absence adds up.

My name is Sam Bury, and I am delighted to introduce myself as the Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) here at Poole High School. My role is to oversee all aspects of safeguarding within the school, ensuring that every student feels safe, supported and cared for.



Safeguarding is at the heart of everything we do, and it's something that every member of staff takes responsibility for. We are proud to have a dedicated and well-trained team who work tirelessly to maintain a safe and nurturing environment for all our students.

This term, we are especially proud of how our students have demonstrated self-regulation, responsibility, and maturity. While our new Year 7s may not know any different, the wider student body has embraced the increased independence that comes with our open campus model. With access to designated activity zones for football and basketball, year group classroom areas, computer suites, and a variety of lunchtime clubs - alongside the opportunity to mix socially with all other year groups - our young people have managed these freedoms exceptionally well.

Following on from recent newsletters highlighting our commitment to digital safety, we're excited to announce the launch of the Twynham Learning Online Safety Hub, a fantastic resource for both students and parents. This hub offers practical tools, advice, and guidance to help families navigate the online world safely. In addition, we're pleased to introduce Qustodio — a free parent app now available to Poole High School families. Qustodio supports healthy and balanced online habits by allowing parents to monitor screen time, view online activity, and manage which apps and websites their child can access. Key Information

Accessing Microsoft 365/Teams from home

During their time at Poole High School your child will need to access learning and homework from our online system. We are using Microsoft 365 and Teams for this.

In order for your child to be able to access this at home please follow these instructions:

- Before starting make sure the browser you are using is not logged into any other account
- In your web browser type; www.office.com
- Click on SIGN IN
- Your child will need to use their school email address e.g. 22mouse.mickey@poolehigh.poole.sch.uk
- Their password, is the password they use to log in at school -Students were given a sticker for their planner in September with their log in information. This will then log them into Microsoft 365 where they can access Teams, OneDrive and the main Microsoft tools.

To access any of the above click on APPS and then choose the package they wish to access.

If there are any issues with your child's password please email loginissues@poolehigh.poole.sch.uk with your child's name and the issue you are encountering. Please note this inbox is not monitored all the time.

Free School Meals

Free School Meals (FSM) are available to school-aged children from families receiving certain benefits. As well as a free, healthy lunch, eligible children are also entitled to additional funding (Pupil Premium), which helps support their learning, confidence, and wellbeing.

Free School Meals are provided for children who are attending a school on a full-time basis. You can claim for any child who you are the parent of i.e. any child whom you have parental responsibility for or is in your care, if you are in receipt of any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit. You must also have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018, your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Degree Apprenticeships

Understanding Degree Apprenticeships: A Guide for Parents/Carers

Degree apprenticeships offer an alternative to traditional university routes, combining academic study with practical work experience.

What Is an Apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a paid job that includes training and study. Apprentices work for an employer while gaining qualifications related to their role. They earn a wage, receive holiday pay, and gain hands-on experience in their chosen field. A degree apprenticeship allows young people to work towards a full bachelor's or master's degree while working. Tuition fees are covered by the employer and the government, meaning apprentices graduate debt-free. They typically take 3-5 years to complete.
